Join Alf and Joan Berg on an architectural tour of Indiana. Our exploration will begin with a tour of Columbus, Indiana which has earned world-wide recognition for its modern architecture. From the 1874 county courthouse that crowns a dynamic downtown to an era of modern architecture that dawned in 1942 with the dedication of Eliel Saarinen's First Christian Church, the Columbus landscape still expands today on the shoulders of other architects such as Weese, Birkerts, Kennon, Meier, Roche, Pelli, Venturi, Pei, and Eero Saarinen.

Thursday we depart for the West Baden Springs Hotel, which was hailed as the eighth architectural wonder of the world. Then we travel to French Lick, a famous resort area, and then to New Harmony, home to 2 utopian experiments. Featured will be a beautiful, modern visitor center by Richard Meier.

*Nauvoo, Illinois*

*Nauvoo Illinois Temple*

Situated on the horseshoe bend of the Mississippi River, Nauvoo is nearly surrounded by the river. The Sac and Fox Indians settled in this area first. Later Captain James White traded two hundred sacks of corn for the Indians' vast acreage. Captain White then established a fur-trading village on the banks of the river.

We will have a guided tour of the newly constructed Nauvoo Illinois Temple. The original structure was lost in the middle 1800s and remained deconstructed until April 1999. President Gordon B. Hinckley, a man sustained as "prophet, seer, and revelator" by members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, announced the Church was going to rebuild the Nauvoo Temple on the original site. The limestone exterior of the new temple is a near duplicate of the original temple, including the design elements. Cameras and video recorders are not permitted inside the temple.
