LOCAL TRIPS

Get to know your community in these half-day excursions to local sites. The price includes food, van transportation, entrance fees, and tour guides. After you register, you will receive a detailed itinerary for each trip. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 20 and fill quickly.

Midwest Food Bank Wednesday, March 3, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Midwest Food Bank, a faith-based, non-denominational, nonprofit organization, was founded in 2003 when the Keiser family began providing food out of a building on their family farm in McLean County. Today, the organization serves more than 600 food pantries and organizations throughout the Midwest with warehouses in Bloomington, Peoria, and Indianapolis. Join us as we tour the Peoria facility and talk with Larry Hermann, division director, about the donations, distributions, and volunteers that allow Midwest Food Bank to feed more than 225,000 people each month.

Cranes & Equipment Corporation 🕅 Wednesday, March 10, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Knuckleboom cranes are a common sight around town – they haul concrete foundation, drywall, and are used in the construction of boats, planes, and bulldozers. We'll learn about these cranes and much more during our visit to Cranes & Equipment Corporation, the exclusive United States distributor for Copma2000 cranes and authorized importer/distributor for PM cranes since 1988. Company President Joan Ausbury will lead our tour and explain how the company evolved from a part-time business in her basement to a five-acre facility in downtown Peoria that sells and services cranes around the world. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation.

Murray Building Artists D Thursday, March 11, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Join us as we spend an afternoon inside the Murray Center for the Arts, the largest complex of working artists in central Illinois. Lori Luthy, creative director for Bradley's Undergraduate Admissions Office (and freelance painter), will guide us through the 76-year-old industrial building and introduce us to a handful of the 25 local artists who rent studios in the facility. As always, participants will get an exclusive look at the artists at work, watch demonstrations, and learn how each artist got his or her start in the business.

United States District Courthouse Thursday, March 25, 2010, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Federal courts are established under the U.S. Constitution by Congress to decide disputes involving the Constitution and laws passed by Congress. On this trip, we'll learn about this legal process during a visit to the United States District Court for the Central District of Illinois, located just minutes from the Bradley University hilltop. We will receive a private tour of the building from Holly Kallister, Division Manager of the Federal Court Clerk's Office, view a trial in session, and visit with Magistrate John A. Gorman, who will answer our questions about the court. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation.

Peoria County Sheriff's Office and County Jail Thursday, April 1, 2010, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Back by popular demand, Peoria County Sheriff Mike McCoy will lead a behind-the-scenes tour of his department and the attached jail. We'll learn how highly qualified officers handle criminal investigations and protect Peoria County residents as we visit administrative offices, briefing rooms, and the crime lab. In addition, we'll walk through the lockup portion of the facility and experience the jail's new technological advances, including a closedcircuit bonding system, computerized mug shot and booking system, and a live scan fingerprint process system. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation.

Illinois Historical Water Museum Thursday, April 15, 2010, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Join us for a private tour of this national landmark before it is closed for construction updates in late spring. The museum, which recently reinstated its public tours for the first time since September 11, 2001, is housed in a 119year-old red sandstone pumping station that features turrets and gargoyles on the roof. We will visit the observatory, fish hatchery, and learn about the production of clean water, and have an opportunity to view the historical instruments, displays, and replica of an early laboratory. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation.

OSF Milestone Project Wednesday, April 28, 2010, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Experience a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity when OLLI visits the soon-to-be-completed Milestone Project at OSF St. Francis Medical Center. Slated for an August 2010 opening, the 440,000 square-foot building has nine floors for an emergency department, surgery and cardiovascular procedures, neonatal intensive care, pediatric critical care, St. Jude Midwest Affiliate, adult heart unit, general pediatrics, and helipad. Our private, hard hat tour will be guided by two of the managers of the \$280 million project that began in July 2007.

Case International Harvester Plant 🥻 Thursday, April 29, 2010, 11:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Case International Harvester is a world leader in the agricultural and construction equipment business, employing 31,500 people worldwide with a network of 11,300 dealers in 170 countries. The company's product offerings include tractors, grape harvesters, combines, and hydraulic excavators. Join us as we visit the Case plant in Goodfield, one of the company's 40 manufacturing facilities across the world. During our visit, we'll learn how the facility, founded in 1961 by a local farmer, now produces the "Cadillac" of tillage equipment. \$22 - includes lunch, tour, and van transportation.

A Day in Pekin 🚺


Wednesday, May 5, 2010, 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

Janet Lange, Executive Director of Continuing Education, will be our guide as we spend the day touring attractions in her hometown. Our trip will include tours of the Tazewell County Courthouse, Mineral Springs Park and its historic pavilion, the World's Greatest Sundial, and the Dirksen Congressional Center. After lunch, we'll drive along Washington Street to see the historic homes, then visit the river bottom, ending at Pekin Union Mission, which was built to serve "the river folk."

A Day in Peoria Heights 🕅 Tuesday, May 11, 2010, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Peoria Heights lies in the center of a metropolitan population base of 300,000, but the quaint village is best known for its unique business district of 75 independently owned shops and restaurants. Spend a day with us as we meet local entrepreneurs who have made an impact on the village and hear first-hand accounts of how family-owned businesses began. Of course, we'll also stop at Tower Park for a panoramic view of the Illinois River Valley and take a leisurely ride along Grandview Drive, proclaimed by President Theodore Roosevelt as the world's most beautiful drive when he visited the village in 1910. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation.

Eureka College 🚺

Wednesday, May 19, 2010, 11:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Founded in 1855 by anti-slavery activists, Eureka College is now home to 770 students on a 112-acre wooded campus in the small Woodford County town of Eureka. Join OLLI as we take a private tour of campus followed by a guided tour of the Ronald Reagan Museum. The museum features a collection of over 2,000 items from President Reagan's student days at Eureka, his movie and television career, his eight years as Governor of California, his campaign for presidency, and his two terms in office. It is the largest collection of Reagan memorabilia outside the Reagan library in California.

\$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation.

Greater Peoria Sanitary District 🕅 Thursday, May 27, 2010, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

During our visit to the Greater Peoria Sanitary District (GPSD), we'll learn how wastewater is collected and treated to protect the environment in Peoria County, especially the creeks, streams, and Illinois River. The private tour of the Darst Street facility will offer a peek at some of the 650 miles of pipes used to collect the wastewater, details about how the plant treats an average of 25 million gallons from residential, commercial, and industrial customers, and a look at how the laboratory monitors the treatment process in order to meet the requirements of the Environmental Protection Agency.

Rock Island Arsenal and John Deere Experience Friday, March 19, 2010, 7:00 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.

Our trip to the Quad Cities will begin with a guided tour of the Rock Island Arsenal, an active U.S. Army facility located on a 946-acre island on the Mississippi River. Our step-on docent will highlight more than a dozen sites at the National Historic Landmark, including the Confederate Cemetery, Colonel Davenport House, Fort Armstrong, and the Government Bridge. Before we leave the island, we'll have time to visit the Arsenal Museum, renowned for its premier firearms collection. In the afternoon, we'll tour the John Deere Harvester Works and Seeding Factory, the largest, most modern combine manufacturing facility in the world. We will ride on moving carts during the tour of the 200-acre plant and experience the main production line from start to finish. We'll end our day at the John Deere Pavilion, Illinois' most popular and comprehensive agricultural exhibit. \$69 - includes tours and docents, buffet lunch, and charter coach transportation.

Champaign: Kanfer Photography and Frasca 🚺 Thursday, April 8, 2010, 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Experience an incredible day of private, behind-the-scenes tours when we travel to two commercial ventures in Champaign County. The trip will begin with a visit to the studio Larry Kanfer, a premier photographer of Midwest landscapes whose artwork is showcased in collections nationwide. Kanfer will speak about his photography and lead us through the gallery he opened nearly 30 years ago, which features five rooms of his original artwork, an atrium gallery, and an outdoor courtyard. After lunch, we'll head to Frasca International in Urbana, a company that designs and manufactures a variety of flight simulators and training equipment for airlines, flight schools, and military organizations worldwide. \$69 – includes private tours and presentations, lunch, snacks, and charter coach transportation.

Twin Groves Wind Farm and Ropp Jersey Cheese 🕅 Tuesday, April 13, 2010, 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

You've seen the massive wind turbines popping up all along the interstates, and now it's time to learn about the technology first-hand. Join us as we visit Twin Groves Wind Farm in eastern McLean County to get the inside scoop on the 240 Vesta turbines that produce enough energy to power nearly 118,000 Illinois homes each year. Our tour, which will include time on an outlook platform to view one of the turbines, will be guided by one of the 130 landowners who prticipate in Twin Groves with long-term leases that cover the wind rights. Before we visit the wind farm, we'll spend time at Ropp Jersey Cheese, a family-owned working farm in Normal. While at Ropp's, we will have the opportunity to watch the cheese-making process, feed calves, milk cows, and sample fresh cheese curds.

St. Louis with Terese Bolla Friday, April 23, 2010 7:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m.

Get an insider's look at St. Louis when we travel south with Terese Bolla, expert on the hidden gems of the city and wife of our Interim Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Bob Bolla. During our visit, she will give us an inside look at the city and lead us on tours of many attractions, ranging from religion, art, architecture, neighborhoods, and historical sites. Our day will include a visit to the Museum of Contemporary Religious Art, Samuel Cupples House on the campus of St. Louis University, the Historical Old Courthouse (site of the Dred Scott trial), the neighborhoods of Lafayette Square and Soulard (the largest restored Victorian neighborhood in America), the Cathedral Basilica of Saint Louis, and of course, a trip to the top of the Gateway Arch.

\$99 – includes private tours and presentations, lunch, snacks, and charter coach transportation.

Geology Hike with Ed Stermer 🕅 🕅 Friday, May 7, 2010, 7:30 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Professor Stermer of Illinois Central College is back by popular demand for another fascinating day of hands-on geology and exploration. We'll start with a two-mile hike at Rock Creek Canyon Trail at Kankakee River State Park to visit the limestone cliffs and waterfalls that provide evidence of the shallow tropical sea that once covered Illinois 400 million years ago. We'll be exploring a region once used by Illini and Miami Indians, the Potawatomi, Ottawa, and Chippewa nations, and near the site of the last great Indian Council in 1830. After lunch, we'll visit the Mazonia-Braidwood State Fish and Wildlife Area to explore the World Famous Mazon Creek Fossil Beds. This geologically unique locality was formed 300 million years ago when northeastern Illinois was a tropical swamp. When they were discovered in the mid-19th century, the beds provided the best and earliest representations of the oldest plants and animals known, and continue to preserve exceedingly rare and fragile fossils in distinctive ironstone nodules.

Archeological Adventure with Michael Wiant 🚺 🕅 Thursday, May 13, 2010, 8:00 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.

Join one of OLLI's favorite instructors, Michael D. Wiant, as he leads us on an archeological adventure to two historic sites in Illinois: Starved Rock and the Sinnissippi Mounds. During the drive to Utica, he will uncover the far-reaching story of Starved Rock and discuss the late Ice Age landscape between Peoria and the historic site, which was once an equatorial beach shaped by a colossal flood, a home to numerous Native American encampments, and a perch for a French fort. After lunch, we will travel to Sterling to visit Sinnissippi Park, home to some of the few remaining Native American cemetery mounds in Illinois. The mounds are a product of the Hopewell tradition that thrived in the Sterling area around 2,000 years ago, when it was the center of a vast trade network that stretched up and down the Mississippi River. While at Sinnissippi, Wiant will describe the silent testimony to the tradition of cemetery mounds and discuss the landscape between Utica and Sterling.

Fermilab and Cantigny 🕅 🕅 Thursday, May 20, 2010, 7:00 a.m. – 7:30 p.m.

Particle physics, philanthropy, patriotism, and plants ... delve deeper into all of these intriguing topics when we visit two amazing sites to the north – the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory and Cantigny. We'll begin our day with a guided tour of Fermilab, a United States particle physics research facility in Batavia. The tour will

start in the 16-story Wilson Hall (a unique structure inspired by a Gothic cathedral in Beauvais, France) and will include a walk through the linear accelerator facility, the Cockcroft-Walton voltage multiplier, and the main control room. A Fermilab scientist will participate in a 30-minute question-and-answer session with OLLI after the tour. In the afternoon, we will visit Cantigny, a sprawling, 500-acre park with formal gardens, two history museums, and a military heritage research center. We will enjoy lunch at a restaurant in the park, take a guided tour of the Robert R. McCormick Museum, then have time to roam the beautiful grounds, take a selfguided tour of the First Infantry Division Museum, enjoy the famous gardens, and explore the visitor's center. \$89 – includes private tours and presentations, lunch, snacks, and charter coach transportation.

Bennett Johnson's Chicago Architecture 🔯 🚺 Wednesday, May 26, 2010, 7:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m.

As a follow-up to his incredibly popular Fall 2009 class of the same name, Bennett Johnson, retired architect and past president of the Chicago Art Deco Society, will be our guide as we explore Chicago's famous architecture on foot and by boat! During the trip, he'll discuss Chicago's reputation as a world-class architectural city and lead us on a walking tour of Chicago's Loop. Our morning will include visits to buildings with Chicago School, International, Deco, and Post-Modern designs, and a wonderful discussion of the architects who brought the buildings to life. After lunch downtown, we'll get another perspective of the home of the skyscraper ... this time from a boat on the Chicago River. The guided, 90-minute tour will provide further details about the Chicago skyline, as well as the parks, monuments, and bridges that made Chicago the "Florence of the Midwest." \$99 – includes private tours and presentations, lunch, snacks, and charter coach transportation..

The Civil War with Bernie Drake, Randy Saxon, and Sue Manley Tuesday, April 27 – Tuesday, May 4, 2010

OLLI members have asked for a trip to Gettysburg, and we have planned a great opportunity to learn more about the Civil War and visit a variety of related historic sites.

Join these veteran travelers this spring on a trip to Civil War battlefields and more. Bernie Drake, former President of the Peoria Historical Society Board of Directors, has led several trips for the Peoria Historical Society and has taught many Osher Lifelong Learning Institute classes. Bernie was also our instructor for the 2008 and 2009 tours of Presidential Museums.

Randy Saxon, a former Gettysburg guide, will enrich our historical perspective of the Civil War through his personal insights. Randy has led many tours to Gettysburg, and we are excited that he has agreed to join us on our 2010 exploration of Gettysburg. Both Bernie and Randy are popular and knowledgeable OLLI instructors, and they will contribute much to our understanding of the sites we visit.

Sue Manley, Conference Services Director in Continuing Education, will make all the arrangements so that you travel worry free! Peoria Charter Coach will handle transportation for the group.

By touring the battlefields at Gettysburg and Antietam, you'll learn the history of some of the most significant Civil War battles. The three-day Battle of Gettysburg was a turning point in the Civil War and ended Robert E. Lee's invasion of the North. The Battle of Antietam ended the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia's first invasion into the North and led to Abraham Lincoln's issuance of the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation.

Additional sites on this trip will include Harper's Ferry; the National Civil War Museum in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania; and Cincinnati's National Underground Railroad Freedom Center – a fitting end to our exploration of the Civil War.

Always working to enrich your educational travel experience, we'll also make stops along the way at the Museum of the United States Air Force and John Glenn's home in Ohio.
