OSHER LIFELONG LEARNING INSTITUTE AT BRADLEY UNIVERSITY



LEARNING TRIPS

What could be better than a travel adventure that takes you off-the-beaten-path and behind-the-scenes? Better still – how much more fun would it be if someone else made all the arrangements for you?

Now you have a sense of what it's like to join an OLLI Learning Trip. We like to travel, but our purpose is to investigate and explore our destinations. So you can expect that a local expert will be on the trip, or at the site, who can explain the significance of what we see and do. On the road, we have fun too whether it's a scenic pull-off, snack stop, or movie on the bus. Our goal is to provide a door-to-door experience in travel learning.

Participation in Learning Trips is worry-free. All travel arrangements are made by staff in Continuing Education, parking is reserved during the trips, and most fees are included. To make your trip even more enjoyable, please note:

- All Learning Trip times in this brochure are approximate and subject to change. Please refer to your confirmation handout (mailed upon registration) for specific departure, tour, and arrival times.
- Many of our Learning Trips require walking and standing in various terrains and environments. To ensure your safety and to respect our hosts' regulations, everyone is required to wear closed-toed shoes on our trips.
- Each Learning Trip, Lecture, and Special Event includes an activity level symbol. Before you register, make sure the activity level matches your abilities. This will ensure an enjoyable trip for you and those who travel with you.
- (1)Enter/exit vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.
- (2)Level 1, plus: climb some flights of stairs and walk on uneven surfaces.
- (3) Levels 1 & 2, plus: healthy, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of daily physical activity.
- (4) Levels 1 3, plus: able to participate in 6 hours of daily moderate activity.

LOCAL TRIPS

Get to know your community on these half-day excursions to local sites. The price includes meal, van transportation, entrance fees, and tour guides. Detailed itineraries are mailed upon registration. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 20 and fill quickly. Please note: all times listed are tentative and subject to change.

Peoria County Coroner's Office (1) Thursday, September 6, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. OR

Thursday, October 11, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Our other visits to the Coroner's Office were so popular, we've decided to offer additional opportunities this fall for those OLLI members who weren't able to join us on recent trips. On this day, we'll learn about the responsibilities of Peoria County Coroner Johnna Ingersoll, an elected official charged with investigating sudden, unusual, and traumatic deaths and assuring those bodies are examined, identified, and if necessary, autopsied. Our visit is expected to include an observation of a jury inquest, which is held weekly to determine the manner of some deaths occurring in Peoria County.

USDA National Center for Agriculture Utilization Research (2)

Monday, September 10, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. OR

Friday, November 16, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

This trip is always in high demand each season, so we've scheduled two more for this fall! Most people never see past the front door of the 270,000 square-foot building commonly known as the Ag Lab. Take advantage of this rare opportunity to get a first-hand look at NCAUR, home to more than 100 Ph.D. research scientists who invent industrial and food products and develop technologies to improve environmental quality. We'll see the interdisciplinary science at work, learn how the laboratory was created in 1940 in response to a chronic farm depression, and get a chance to speak with the scientists who conduct the research that has led to hundreds of new commercial products such as biodegradable plastics, edible films, printing inks, novel flavors, and pigments.

PDC & Peoria County Landfill (2) Thursday, September 13, 10:45 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Join OLLI member Les Bergsten, Chairman of the Peoria City/County Landfill Committee, for a visit to the Peoria Disposal Company (PDC) offices and a tour of the landfill. As the city of Peoria's waste and recycling collection service contractor, PDC handles hazardous and non-hazardous waste collection and disposal, waste treatment, waste transportation and brokerage, consulting and engineering services, laboratory analysis, and equipment rental. During our visit, we'll discuss the history of the landfill, get an update on the construction of Landfill #3, and see the actual operations of the landfill in Edwards.

Caterpillar Inc. Building SS (3) Monday, September 17, 8:45 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. OR

Monday, October 15, 8:45 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.

OLLI has secured some of the last scheduled tours of the facility before they are discontinued for the opening of the new downtown Caterpillar Visitor Center. Building SS is a state-of-the-art assembly facility that offers the most technologically advanced and modern assembly processes in the world. The facility is used for the assembly of Caterpillar's mid-size to largest track-type tractor, including the new D7E electric-drive tractor. Our walking tour of the building will feature a look at some assembly stations, testing, quality adjustment, painting, finish attachments, and the shipping floor. Please note: full leg covering and complete foot covering is required, and finger rings are not allowed to be worn on this tour. Steel-toed safety shoes (or shop-provided metatarsal covers) are required if the tour deviates from the main aisles. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

General Wayne A. Downing Peoria International Airport (2)

Tuesday, September 18, 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. OR

Thursday, October 18, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

Here's your chance for another exclusive, behind-the-scenes look at the areas of the Peoria International Airport not normally accessible to the average passenger, including ticket counters, inbound baggage facilities, passenger screening rooms, waiting areas, and jet bridges. We will also learn how the new 125,000 square-foot terminal conveniently places ticket counters, baggage claim, and rental car desks on one floor in the main concourse, serving around 1 million travelers annually through 12 gates. In addition, there will be an opportunity for questions and one-on-one interaction with Director Gene Olson.

Peoria Area Churches (2) Wednesday, September 19, 9:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

Get a closer look at the beliefs, architecture, and history of four beautiful Peoria churches when we visit St.
Joseph's Catholic (St. Martin de Porres), Zion Baptist,
United Presbyterian Church of Peoria, and Redeemer
Lutheran Church during this daylong tour. Ed Barry, an architect with the Farnsworth Group, will accompany our group to provide architectural insight about each building, and church representatives will be on hand at each stop to discuss the stained glass, practices, and diversity of religions observed at the facilities.
Participants should be prepared and able to enter and exit the vans frequently throughout the day.

Peoria Public Library Branches (I) Monday, September 24, 8:45 a.m. – I:00 p.m.

Join us as we tour two Peoria Public Library branches – the Lincoln and the North – and find out more about the new and remodeled spaces. The Lincoln Branch, which was reopened in December, 2011, features a 12,000 foot addition with new computers and reading spaces, a dedicated children's story time room, youth area, computer lab, and a new entrance. The original Carnegie library, joined to the new addition by a glass passageway, has been returned to its original appearance and offers reading spaces and study rooms. The new \$11 million North branch, which opened in May, 2011, is a 30,000-square-foot building off Allen Road that was developed as part of a plan to provide equal library service across the city.

182nd Airlift Wing, Illinois Air National Guard (1) Tuesday, September 25, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

The 182nd Airlift Wing, Illinois Air National Guard, is a diverse group of citizen-airmen from our community serving the nation's call to duty. It also maintains and operates eight C-130 Hercules aircraft capable of transporting large amounts of personnel and equipment over long distances. During our visit, Colonel William Robertson ('83), the Wing Commander, will lead a tour to explore the Wing's mission to include the maintenance, flying operations, and air support to the Army, Security Forces, and much more. He'll also provide an update on the Wing's current worldwide missions.

Bradley University Campus Highlights (2) Tuesday, October 16, 9:00 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Come see Bradley through the eyes of a student! We'll visit the John C. Hench Production Studios, get a behind-the-scenes view of the Hartman Center & Heuser Art Center, learn how students conduct research alongside faculty in the Olin Hall of Science, and visit newly renovated Westlake Hall. In addition, we'll visit the food

labs in our award-winning Family & Consumer Science department and explore Renaissance Coliseum with student-athletes who will show us the state-of-the-art athletic training rooms, locker rooms, and practice facilities. Finally, we'll retreat to Heitz Hall to visit one of our recently renovated residence hall rooms. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Pekin Federal Correctional Institution (3) Monday, October 22, I I:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.

The Federal Correctional Institution (FCI) in Pekin is comprised of a medium security facility housing male inmates and a minimum security satellite prison camp that houses male offenders. During our tour, Executive Assistant Marie Wynia will guide us through the FCI and provide insight about the security, programming, and population of the prison. In order to comply with federal guidelines, participants will be required to provide documentation for a routine security screening prior to the tour. Also, due to security restrictions, OLLI's headset amplification system will be unavailable on this trip. Please bring photo identification on the day of the tour. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Toraason Glass (I) Thursday, October 25, II:30 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. OR

Tuesday, November 6, 11:30 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.

One of OLLI's most intriguing local favorites is back by popular demand! For those who haven't yet experienced this trip, please join us as we get an exclusive, up-close look at local artist Hiram Toraason's 4,000-square-foot glass-blowing studio and gallery. Hiram, a graduate of Southern Illinois University who apprenticed under William and Katherine Berstein in Celo, North Carolina, will demonstrate his techniques of working with 2,000-degree molten glass and create a one-of-a-kind work of art. Hiram will also discuss the artwork he created for the renovated entrance to Methodist Medical Center. \$25 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Behr Recycling (2) Monday, October 29, 8:45 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Have you ever wondered what happens to old cars, appliances, lawn mowers, and other machines once they have been scrapped by users? Now's your chance to learn all about the scrapping process and see Behr Recycling's new \$12 million monster shredder, a 300-foot long, five-story tall machine that can shred a car in two seconds. During our visit to the facility, we will also learn all about Behr's recent \$15 million expansion, find out why scrap has turned into big business, and discuss the global demand for iron, steel, copper, and brass.

Living Lands and Waters Floating Classroom (2) Tuesday, October 30, 8:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Living Lands & Waters, an environmental organization headquartered in East Moline, has removed (with the help of 60,000 volunteers) over 7 million pounds of debris from America's rivers. The organization's floating classroom is back in Peoria, and OLLI has secured a morning workshop to explore the ecology, history, and economic impact of the Illinois River. During our visit to the barge, we'll learn about the history of the organization, discuss how rivers have changed over the last 150 years, and explore other topics, including invasive species, water quality, climate change, water shortages, and infrastructure.

Farmdale Hike (2) Monday, November 5, 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

The Farmdale Reservoir is an integral part of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Farm Creek Flood Control Project. The project, designed in the 1940s to provide flood control for East Peoria (and the manufacturing facilities at Caterpillar, which were vital to the World War II effort), includes two dry reservoirs (Fondulac and Farmdale) located on tributary streams to the Illinois Waterway upstream of Peoria. On this tour of the Farmdale Reservoir, we'll learn about the Farm Creek Project, observe how the reservoir is designed to capture excess water in a 200+ acre lake, and see how the property is used for biking, hiking, and horseback riding. Brave participants may have an opportunity to climb stairs to the top of the dam for a spectacular view. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Peoria Civic Center (2) Wednesday, November 7, II:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

The Peoria Civic Center, located in the heart of downtown Peoria, is a city-owned building that is privately managed by SMG, a Philadelphia-based private management company. The facility hosts over 375 events per year and attracts more than 750,000 visitors annually. In 2007, the Civic Center completed a \$55 million expansion, making it the largest convention facility in Illinois outside Chicago. During the tour, we will visit each part of the facility, including the Great Hall, Ballroom, Lexus Club, Arena, Theater, and Exhibit Hall. Staff will explain the types of events held in each area, and discuss how each event comes together (from booking to marketing to the actual operation of a show). \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

Heartland Community College (2) Friday, November 9, 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

Heartland Community College in Normal, founded in 1990, is now home to more than 40 programs for career training and transfer preparation. Among the ten buildings that make up the main campus is the first state-funded LEED-Certified (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) building in Illinois – the Workforce Development Center (WDC). During our tour, we'll learn how the college, a founding member of the Illinois Green Economy Network, provides training and education that responds to the workforce needs of the regional green economy, helping to address state and national sustainability initiatives. We'll also visit the WDC, the renewable energy lab, Pregracke Center's turbine, and (weather permitting) the solar shed. \$25 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

FOLEPI Floatmaking & East Peoria Development Update (I)

Tuesday, November 13, 9:00 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Just days before the East Peoria Festival of Lights parade, you'll have the chance to see the "Folepi Construction Company" and some of its "employees," a merry band of volunteers who design and build the 40+ floats. During

our tour, we'll meet some volunteers who work year-round designing, welding, and maintaining the floats (and their 500,000 lights) and learn how the floats evolve from concept to actuality. In addition, Chamber of Commerce Director Rick Swan will provide an informative presentation about the latest commercial developments throughout the City of East Peoria.

Midwest Food Bank (1) Monday, November 19, 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Midwest Food Bank, a faith-based, ecumenical nonprofit organization, was founded in 2003 when the Keiser family began providing food out of a building on their family farm in McLean County. Today, the organization serves more than 600 food pantries and organizations throughout the Midwest with warehouses in Bloomington, Peoria, Peachtree City, and Indianapolis. Join us as we tour the Peoria facility and talk with Julie Brooks about the donations, distributions, and volunteers that allow Midwest Food Bank to feed more than 225,000 people each month. We'll even get "hands-on" during our visit to help prepare food for a delivery. \$22 – includes lunch, tour, and van transportation

REGIONAL TRIPS

Spend time with OLLI enjoying travel throughout Illinois and nearby states. The price of each trip varies, but includes meal, charter coach transportation (unless otherwise indicated), entrance fees, gratuities, snacks, and tour guides. Detailed itineraries are mailed upon registration. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 40 and fill quickly. Please note: All times listed are tentative and subject to change.

Art Institute of Chicago (I) Wednesday, September 5, 6:30 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.

Get acquainted – or reacquainted – with the Art Institute of Chicago when we spend a day admiring the collection of the second largest art museum in the United States. We'll explore the Modern Wing, a 264,000 square-foot addition designed by Pritzker Prize-winning architect Renzo Piano, and its amazing selection of contemporary art. In addition, participants will enjoy a keynote lecture in Rubloff Auditorium entitled American Impressionism: At Home and Abroad, which celebrates the recent publication of the Art Institute catalog, "The Age of American Impressionism: Masterpieces from the Art Institute of Chicago." Throughout the day, you'll have the chance to listen to docent-led presentations in front of many of the museum's masterpieces, and watch artist demonstrations throughout the museum. Jean Gronewold, a painter, teacher, and frequent OLLI instructor, will join us to enhance our experience of the exhibitions, some of which will include "Recent Acquisitions of Contemporary Japanese Art," and "Rarely Seen Contemporary Works on

Springfield's Hidden Treasures (2) Thursday, September 20, 7:30 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Spend a day exploring the hidden treasures of our state capital. We'll take a private tour of the Illinois State Capitol and State Museum, enjoy the spectacular sounds and views from the Thomas-Rees Carillon in Washington Park, eat lunch at local favorite Saputo's, explore the Illinois State Military Museum at Camp Lincoln, and tour the Illinois Fire Museum at the Illinois State Fairgrounds. \$75 – private tours and presentations, lunch, snacks, and charter coach transportation.

Historic Oregon, Illinois (2) Wednesday, September 26, 7:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m.

The historic town of Oregon, located two hours north of Peoria, is home to three working foundries, several art galleries, and abundant cultural and natural attractions. We'll spend a beautiful autumn day exploring the best of Oregon, beginning with a private tour and demonstration at Art Casting of Illinois, a locally owned bronze foundry specializing in fine art sculpture. Owners Harry and Karly Spell will walk us through their facility, explain the bronzing process, and show us how bronze sculptures are made. Next, we'll visit The Chana School, a two-room schoolhouse on the National Registry of Historic Sites. Following that tour, we'll pick up a representative from the Oregon Chamber of Commerce, who will hop aboard our bus and narrate our journey through the Oregon Sculpture Trail, a group of seven pieces of art along

Illinois Rt. 2 that includes Lorado Taft's "The Eternal Indian," "The Soldiers' Monument," and "The Fish Boys." After lunch at White Pines Inn, home to one of northern Illinois' landmark restaurants, we'll make our last stop of the day at the John Deere Historic Site, where we'll see a live blacksmithing demonstration, enjoy a Q-and-A with an actual blacksmith, and explore the archaeological site where Deere established his homestead and built his first "self-polishing" steel plow in 1837. \$88 – includes private tours and presentations, lunch, snacks, and charter coach transportation.

Fair Oaks Farm (2) Thursday, September 27, 7:30 a.m. – 7:00 p.m.

Witness how four million glasses of milk are produced daily by 30,000 cows when we travel to Fair Oaks Farm, a family-owned dairy located in northwestern Indiana. We'll learn how approximately 80 – 100 calves are born on the farm daily, and will have an opportunity to witness one of the real and extraordinary events in the Birthing Barn while the dairy midwife assists. We'll also get to see the nursery where newborns are hand-fed, tour the milking parlor, enjoy a 4-D presentation about the circle of dairy life, and learn how the farm's award-winning cheese and ice cream is produced on-site. In addition, we'll learn more about the harvest of the land and the sustainable practices the farm has pioneered with all that manure!

Vaughan Manufacturing & Pella Windows (2) Thursday, October 4, 7:30 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.

If you've heard about our previous visits to these intriguing manufacturing companies near Macomb, you'll want to definitely reserve your seat this season! Vaughan & Bushnell Manufacturing, founded in 1869 in Peoria, has grown from a small maker of hand tools to one of the world's largest producers of quality hammers and other hand tools such as pry bars, hatchets, saws, landscaping tools, hickory handles, and construction tools. During our visit, we'll watch as these tools are made with an exceptional attention to detail and learn how the five generations of the Vaughan family transformed the business from a one-man operation to the world's largest manufacturer of striking tools. We'll also get a chance to see some of the company's recently purchased heat treatment equipment, which uses induction heating for a safer, more efficient manufacturing process. After lunch in Macomb, we'll take a private tour of the Pella Corporation, one of Pella's twelve window manufacturing facilities in the country.

After marrying a woman from a prominent St. Louis family, Jay went on to work for General John Pershing in World War I and earned the French Legion of Honor. By the mid-1930s Dean was hired personally by J.P. Morgan to head the Paris Branch of the most important bank in the world. Join author Karl Taylor in a discussion of American and European history from Woodrow Wilson to John F. Kennedy through this Horatio Alger tale of a small-town boy who became an international figure.
