If you think OLLI classes are like traditional school, you'll be surprised to learn that we take a different approach. Imagine learning only about the topics you choose, taught by engaging instructors, on a college campus, with people your age, and no tests or grades. Add time for socializing, and you have a sense of what we do. It's learning - our way!

I. Behind the Scenes: Coroner's Office and Illinois State Police Forensic Sciences Command

In this intriguing class, Peoria County Coroner Jamie Harwood and Joanne Liu, laboratory director for the Illinois State Police Forensic Sciences Command, will provide an in-depth look at their day-to-day work. You'll learn what the Coroner does, how the office operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and how deaths are investigated. Participants will also discover the types of forensic testing conducted at the Command and the science involved with the analyses. In addition, you'll find out what it takes to become a forensic scientist and how the lab ensures confidence in its results.(NIs/NC)

2. Ceramics from the Ground Up

Ceramic production is an enduring record of human artistic activity. This class is an introductory experience for those who want to understand the vocabulary of ceramics as well as distinguish between some of the technical and aesthetic issues concerning specific ceramic production. We will address a brief overview of materials, types of clay and clay fabrication through history, and significant evolutionary firing developments that advanced ceramic art. Lecture and demonstration of various development phases of ceramic process will be used to illustrate the entire process. Class instructor is Randy Carlson, professor of art and ceramics at Bradley University. Please note: this class will be held in the Heuser Art Center at Bradley University; shuttle transportation will be provided. (NI/NC)

3. Evil: Its Origin, Reality, and Relevance

Evil – we think we know it when we see it, but we struggle to define it. Does it even have an objective existence, or is it just another term for what we don't like? If it is a metaphysical reality, what is it, what is its origin, and what does it tell us about the rest of reality? This class will investigate the mystery of evil and follow where the evidence leads. Class instructor is Kirk Schoenbein, associate judge for the Tenth Judicial Circuit. (RI/NC)

4. Fiber and Mixed-Media Art Cards

Trish Williams, a well-known and highly regarded fiber artist and quilter, will share her expertise as you create your own, personally designed and constructed art cards, ready for framing or sharing as a gift. A variety of materials, including fabrics, papers, and embellishments will be provided. Trish will guide you on basic design elements, color choices, and techniques for success. This is a great class for those who like to re-use, recycle, or otherwise create environmentally friendly art. Please note: this class will be held in the Heuser Art Center at Bradley University; shuttle transportation will be provided. (NI/NC)

5. Great Rulers of Russia

What made Yaroslav and Ivan IV great leaders? What about Peter I, Catherine, II, Alexander II ... and even Vladimir Putin? Bradley professor Angela Weck, a member of the faculty of the Institute of International Studies and the Department of History at Bradley University, will explore what made these leaders great and how they impacted Russian history. 6. How to Live Your Best Life

This class will provide the tools you need to stay healthy and to live your life to its fullest. Participants will learn how to improve balance and strengthen your core, how to manage and prevent chronic pain, and how to prevent incontinence and bladder organ prolapse for men and women. Class instructors are Jovie Murtha, Michaeleen Atkisson, Caleb Johnson, and Jeremy Calame, physical therapists from Athletico Physical Therapy who have a passion for the health and happiness of their community. 7. Literary Lions

The Mysterious and Uncommon Agatha Christie

Mystery writer Agatha Christie once disappeared for 10 days in 1926. We shall investigate the disappearance and look at the other uncommon features of the author, who wrote 84 books in 85 years. Class instructor is Sandy Stemler, a retired English teacher. (RI/NC)

January 8 at 10:30 a.m. Charles Dickens: An Overview

Charles Dickens was a prolific writer in England in the mid-19th century, and many of his works reflect the social climate of his times. In this hour, we'll look at both his own life and his attempts to improve the living and working conditions of the poor. Class instructor is Gary Black, a retired English teacher from Bradford High School. (RI/NC)

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January 10 at 9:00 a.m. Peoria's Own Betty Friedan

One of the foremost "literary lions" of all time grew up in Peoria – Betty Friedan. Historians say her first book, *The Feminine Mystique*, is among the most influential books ever written. Friedan is rightfully remembered for launching and leading a feminist movement that vastly changed our expectations and our laws, but we shouldn't forget that it all began with a book published in 1963. She went on to write five more books, including an autobiography that talks about how Peoria affected her life. Her last book, *The Fountain of Age*, applied some of the same critical thinking to aging that *The Feminine Mystique* applied to women's roles. We'll look at these books and the Peorian behind them. Class instructor is Barb Drake, retired *Journal Star* editorial page editor. (RI/NC)

January 10 at 10:30 a.m. Ernest Hemingway: The Code and Curse

On a summer day in 1961, Ernest "Papa" Hemingway rose early, donned his favorite robe, placed his shotgun in his mouth, and pulled the trigger. Why? His fiction gave us prose that rang clear, crisp, and clean. He used words sparingly, often leaving the reader to fill the spaces he had left. Was he the greatest prose writer of the 20th century? We can debate, but probably not answer this question. In our hour, we will discuss examples of his best writing. We'll also discuss the Hemingway "code," the Hemingway "curse," and the factors that led to his final moment of despair. Bring your theories and opinions about "Papa." Class instructor is Murv Pretorius, retired attorney. (NI/NC)

8. The Total Percussion Experience

This class will explore the world of percussion. You'll see, hear, and experience playing different percussion instruments in the band and symphony world. You will walk away with a new understanding and appreciation of the world of percussion. Class instructor is Peggy Bonner, percussionist and affiliate instructor of music at Bradley University. 9.You Need Estate Planning

Whether your net worth is \$5 or \$5 million, you need estate planning (unless you want to leave Uncle Sam a large tip). Not all your assets should be treated equally for tax purposes, especially when they are passed on to your beneficiaries. This class will cover the pros and cons of different estate plans and how to avoid costly mistakes, as you are provided with simple-to-understand techniques on how to better organize your planning. Daryl Dagit, with Savant Capital Management, will make you feel comfortable with this complicated topic and explain why he has CFP®, CRPS®, and CEP® after his name. (RI/RC)

10. The Babylonian Conquest of Israel

Old Testament prophets and New Testament writers cite the Babylonian Captivity as a pivotal time in Israel's history. Prophets forecast it as punishment for Israel's pagan idolatry; it occurred between the rule of the great empires of Assyria and Persia, which impacted the Jews, and its relevance was made current by Saddam Hussein, who intended to repeat it. Class instructors are Tom Ewald, professor emeritus of Lincoln Christian University and Seminary, and Mark Mangano, an Old Testament scholar and professor at Lincoln Christian University and Seminary. II. Encaustic Painting: Ancient Times to the Present

Encaustic is an ancient, versatile, and compelling medium composed of beeswax and damar resin. The addition of pigment creates paint that is vibrant and luminous. Encaustic pieces are built up in heat-fused layers, scraped back, and built up again – a process of conceal and reveal. The transparency of the wax allows previous marks and layers to show through. In this class, you will learn about the history of encaustic painting, the process of developing an encaustic work of art, and artists who use the medium. Class instructor is Elizabeth Davis, a local artist specializing in encaustic painting. Please note: this class will be held in the Heuser Art Center at Bradley University; shuttle transportation will be provided. (NI/NC)

12. Insurance: What You Should Know

Let's be honest, when it comes to financial planning, insurance generally isn't what first comes to mind. Without a solid insurance plan, however, you may be leaving yourself financially exposed to unpredictable life events in retirement. In this class, we'll explore the

Chief McCoy will describe the St. Jude Run experience from the inside out – including the sleeping, showers, meals, blisters, and exhaustion – all to benefit sick kids. (NI/NC)

17. U.S. Grant: The Making of a General – the Western Campaigns

U.S. Grant is considered the greatest Union general of the Civil War. He learned how to be a general in his western campaigns. In this class, we will learn about Grant's early life, how he went from failure to great general, and the battles of the western campaigns of the Civil War. Class instructor is Bernie Drake, former president and interim executive director of the Peoria Historical Society who has led several Civil War learning trips. (RI/RC)

18. Combating Poverty in Peoria

Peoria has a long history of faith-based and private organizations whose mission has been to lessen the burden of poverty. This class will look at poverty in the Peoria area



and how several organizations are focused on this mission in their own unique ways. Cathy Wilhite, executive director of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Peoria Council, will describe what poverty looks like today, and participants will hear from representatives from seven organizations on the front line of combating poverty. Presentations will be provided by the Dream Center, Friendship House, Southside Mission, Peoria Citizens Committee for Economic Opportunity, Midwest Food Bank, Helping Hand Resource Center, and Neighborhood House. Sharron Santure, OLLI volunteer, will moderate a question and answer session at the end of each day. (NIs/NC)

19. Hands-on Math and Art

Come and explore the linkages between math and art by creating an Escher Tessellation, constructing an ellipse for a whispering gallery, moving your Mobius strip to fracture a fractal, and sketching a curved triangle to solve an art gallery problem. Your creativity will find no limits in this class. Bring a pencil or two (colored pencils optional); string, rulers, scissors, glue, and paper will be provided. Class instructor is Mary Jane Sterling, retired mathematics instructor at Bradley University and author of many *For Dummies* books and workbooks. (RI/NC)

20. The Impacts Photography Had on the Civil War

Photography was coming of age during the Civil War. Initially used as a form of art in 19th century culture, photography quickly developed into a profitable national enterprise. Mathew Brady and other photojournalists brought the carnage, suffering, and sacrifice of war to the home front. Soldiers posed in their uniforms to send final mementos home to their loved ones. Photography also documented the war from beginning to end with huge impacts on the nation's morale. This class will examine how photography was used not only for news propaganda and documenting the ravages of war, but also in remembering and memorializing the dead. Class instructor is Christina Lea Smith, a scholar who focuses on nineteenth century American history and Civil War seminars. (RI/NC)

21. It Takes a Region: Economic Development Beyond a City's Borders

Economic development is described as a very local issue, but good jobs don't recognize municipal borders. Come learn how our region is approaching economic development, what strategies and tools it is employing, and why it is important to you. Class instructor is Chris Setti, CEO of the Greater Peoria Economic Development Council and previous assistant city manager/director of economic development for the City of Peoria. (RI/NC)

22. J.S. Bach and G.F. Handel: The Legacy of Two Musical Giants

Join us for an exploration of the music and influence of Bach and Handel, two German composers, both born in 1685, who never met each other but together changed the course of Western music. Class instructor is John Jost, professor of music emeritus at Bradley University, and artistic director of the Peoria Bach Festival. (RI/NC)

23.The Next "Big Thing" – Blockchain and Why It Will Be Everywhere

Blockchain is the next new "big thing." Brian Anderson, owner of Notionovus, a software company that is building Blockchain software to share supply chain data, will explain Blockchain, various crypto-currencies, and how Blockchains can create transparent supply chains. (NI/NC)

24. Peoria Police Department

Get ready for an interactive class where questions are encouraged and multiple areas of policing are covered. Chief Loren Marion and his staff will discuss the Peoria Police Department's administration, history, and current policies and practices. Officers will also cover multiple aspects of use of force in today's policing, case law, policies, and tactics that guide officers in their use of force. (NIs/RI/NC)

25. Peoria Reads 2019:

Can't We Talk about Something More Pleasant?

The Peoria Reads selection for 2019 is *Can't We Talk About Something More Pleasant?* by longtime New Yorker cartoonist Roz Chast. The memoir tells the story, through cartoons, of Chast's parents' final years, family photos, found documents, and narrative prose. Chast uses humor to explore the often grim and stressful subject of our parents' final years. Join Roberta Koscielski, deputy director of Peoria Public Library, and Wayne Cannon, manager, Peoria Area Food Bank, in a discussion of the book and how our society deals with old age and death. We'll also evaluate the graphic memoir style of writing. (RIs/NC)

26. The Role of Faith in the Changes of Life

Life is a series of changes, which, as we age, seem to come more quickly. How does faith help us deal with the sometimes unwanted, apparently unworthy, events we may think we don't need to grieve? What does healthy grieving look like and how can we move forward confidently? Pat Edwards, a licensed clinical social worker specializing in geriatrics with the Antioch Group, will share the role of faith in her life from a professional and personal point of view. (RI/NC)

29. The Charley Steiner School of Sports Communication

Bradley University's renowned identification with major intercollegiate sports is integral to its modern history as a strong comprehensive university. The sports industry today is also much more than athletes. It is a major economic and global cultural phenomenon that has rapidly evolved to embrace fully the media forces of journalism, broadcasting, marketing, public relations, entertainment, and management. Taken together with the popularity of Bradley's nationally prominent mass communications programs, a major in Sports Communication was a natural for Bradley. Join class instructor Paul Gullifor, Henry Means Pindell Endowed Chair in Communication and professor in sports communication and television arts, as he describes how Sports Communication was launched as a handful of courses in 2009, became a major in 2013, and in 2015 became the Charley Steiner School of Sports Communication. (RI/NC)

30. Gardening for Pollinators

Some scientists estimate that one out of every three bites of food we take is made possible by the ecosystem services provided by pollinators. Many insect and pollinator populations, however, are in decline around the world. In this class, we'll learn about the important role of pollinators, what they need to live, and what you can do in your corner of the world to help support them. We'll also learn about gardening practices that support pollinators, plants that are important sources of their food, and how you can incorporate pollinator habitat into your landscape. Class instructor is Vicki Morrical of the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Department, and Ella Maxwell of Hoerr Nursery. (RI/NI/NC)

31. History of the Future

Many people are fascinated by the future and enjoy speculating about what our future might look like. This class will study the future as a history topic, a perspective of the future that is rarely explored. We will examine the accuracy of past predictions, discuss current predictions, and determine why some of these predictions were so awful. John Amdall, OLLI volunteer, will share his historical research on the future and thought on what can be learned from past predictions. A handout will be provided so class participants can continue to explore the future on their own. (RI/RC)

32. The History of Mathematics: Who, What, and Where?

The history of mathematics is rich with people, places, and stories. Mathematics has developed over the centuries thanks to the efforts of many. In this class, we will hear about some of these pioneers and their impact on

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mathematics, science, and the world. No mathematical background is necessary to appreciate this class. Class instructor is Dr. Herbert Kasube, associate professor of mathematics at Bradley University. (NI/NC)

33. Interfaith Dialogue

This class will address basic questions of faith, and the instructors will answer from their respective traditions: Hindu, Baha'i, and Christianity. Participants will learn the similarities and differences among these belief systems, keeping in mind that each tradition has followers with differing perspectives. Class instructors are Dr. Prakash Babu, leader at the Hindu Temple of Central Illinois, Susan Brill-deRamirez, a lay leader at the Peoria Baha'i Center, and Jeff Smith, a lay leader of Christian scriptures. 34. The Man Behind The Music Man

Fresh from her 2018 Winter class on Rodgers and Hammerstein, Denise Adams turns her focus to Meredith Wilson, who was much more of a music man than you might know. Hint: he was not the model for Harold Hill. Be ready for many surprises and live performances! Class instructor is Denise Adams, a pianist, oboist, musical director, and retired teacher. (RI/NC)

35.To Sleep, To Dream: An Update on What We Should Know About Sleep

OLLI members have shown support of our lifelong learning community through consistent and generous donations to our annual fundraising campaigns.



For this fiscal year (ending May 31, 2019), **the OLLI Executive Committee has set a monetary goal of \$55,000 to purchase new audio-visual equipment for the Marty Theater, site of many of our large classes each season.** This new equipment should greatly enhance your learning experiences during OLLI classes. In addition, it will be a wonderful benefit to our campus, as the new sound system will improve the events held in the theater year-round.

Your donations have funded audio-visual improvements and the construction of a soundproof wall in the Michel Student Center ballrooms, the purchase and ongoing maintenance of two 14-passenger shuttles, the sponsorship of cinema and lecture programming, and the support of Bradley University students through student volunteer awards.

- All learning trip times in this brochure are approximate and subject to change. Please refer to your confirmation handout (mailed upon registration) for specific departure, tour, and arrival times.
- Many of our learning trips require walking and standing in various terrains and environments. To ensure your safety and to respect our hosts' regulations, everyone is required to wear closed-toed shoes on all our trips.
- Each learning trip includes an activity level symbol. Before you register, make sure the activity level matches your abilities. This will ensure an enjoyable trip for you and those who travel with you.
 - Enter/exit vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.
 - Stand for over an hour, climb some flights of stairs, and walk on uneven surfaces, plus all Level 1 requirements.
 - Be able to stand and walk for over 2 hours with minimal chance for sitting, be active for an extended period of time, be healthy, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of daily physical activity, plus all Level 1 and 2 requirements.
