Wow, what a winter!

Not only did we have an abundance of cold weather and record snow, it was a momentous season for OLLI at Bradley. As fall gave way to winter, we started using our new OLLI shuttle bus. Thanks to the generous giving of OLLI participants, we raised over \$95,000 in the spring of 2013, and the OLLI Executive Committee voted to use the majority of these funds to purchase a 14-passenger shuttle. The new vehicle is more comfortable and easier to enter and exit than were the Bradley vans we had been using. The bus was first used during fall classes to "shuttle" members between the Michel Student Center and Westlake Hall; we've also used it on OLLI trips. In this short time, the shuttle proved so popular that OLLI members asked if we could get another one. With this as a goal, we asked OLLI participants to support another fund drive during the winter and were happy to announce at the March luncheon that we raised more than \$50,000. The Executive Committee will study the possibility of purchasing that second shuttle during the summer.

The March luncheon was also a momentous event in another way. Executive Director Janet Lange and the Continuing Education staff did a wonderful job of putting together a celebration of the 20th anniversary of the founding of the Institute for Learning in Retirement, now known as OLLI. A highlight of the celebration was President Glasser's announcement that we have received a second million-dollar grant from The Bernard Osher Foundation. This grant, which will allow us to broaden our Study Group, Lecture, Cinema, and Learning Trips, recognizes the hard work of the Continuing Education staff and hundreds of volunteers who make all of the OLLI programs possible.

Finally, every two years The Bernard Osher Foundation sponsors a conference for all of the 117 OLLI programs throughout the United States. At this year's event, Michelle Riggio (OLLI's interim director) and Jon Neidy (OLLI's former director) will present a workshop for new directors on how to organize and run an OLLI program. For them to be asked to do this is high praise for OLLI at Bradley. Our congratulations go to Michelle and Jon.

The rest of this brochure outlines the OLLI summer programs. Do come and join us as we celebrate lifelong learning. And have a great OLLI summer.

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LEARNING TRIPS

What could be better than a travel adventure that takes you off-the-beaten-path and behind-the-scenes? Better still – how much more fun would it be if someone else made all the arrangements for you? Now you have a sense of what it's like to join an OLLI Learning Trip. We like to travel, but our purpose is to investigate and explore our destinations. So you can expect that a local expert will be on the trip, or at the site, who can explain the significance of what we see and do. On the road, we have fun too whether it's a scenic pull-off, snack stop, or movie on the bus. Our goal is to provide a door-to-door experience in travel learning.

Participation in Learning Trips is worry-free. All travel arrangements are made by staff in Continuing Education, parking for your car is reserved during the trips, and most fees are included in the price. To make your trip even more enjoyable, please note:

- All Learning Trip times in this brochure are approximate and subject to change. Please refer to your itinerary (mailed upon registration) for specific departure, tour, and arrival times.
- Many of our Learning Trips require walking and standing in various terrains and environments.
 To ensure your safety and to respect our hosts' regulations, everyone is required to wear closed-toed shoes on our trips.
- Each Learning Trip includes an activity level. Before you register, make sure the activity level matches your abilities. This will ensure an enjoyable trip for you and those who travel with you.
- (1) Enter/exit vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.
- (2) Level I, plus: climb some flights of stairs and walk on uneven surfaces.
- (3) Levels I & II, plus: healthy, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of daily physical activity.
- (4) Levels I III, plus: able to participate in 6 hours of daily moderate activity.

Get to know your community on these half-day excursions to local sites. The price includes meal, shuttle/van transportation, entrance fees, and tour guides. Jeremie Draper Glass (Activity Level I) Tuesday, June 3, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

On this tour, we'll experience a private viewing of hot glass demonstrations as the Jeremie Draper Glass team blows and sculpts hot glass into something exciting and beautiful. The team members will narrate throughout the demonstration and answer our questions about the art of glass blowing. We'll also have time to walk through the Studios on Sheridan during our visit and experience the new exhibit in the main gallery.

Peoria County Jail with Sheriff Mike McCoy (Activity Level 2)

Wednesday, June 4, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Peoria County Sheriff Mike McCoy will lead a behind-thescenes tour of his department and the attached jail while providing a narrative about the county's law enforcement services. During our visit, we will walk through the lockup portion of the facility and experience the jail's newer technological advances, including a closed circuit bonding system, computerized mug shot and booking system, a live scan fingerprint process system, and an interactive indoor shooting range.

\$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Linden Hill Farms (Activity Level 2) Thursday, June 5, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Linden Hill Farms is a fourth generation working dairy farm in Peoria County. During our visit, owner Miriam Rosenbohm and others will discuss the procurement of the feed for livestock, explain some of the difficulties facing dairy farmers today, and talk about animal welfare, genetically modified corn, and organic food. We'll also

have the opportunity to see the milking and feeding process of animals on the farm.

Children's Home (Activity Level 2) Monday, June 9, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Children's Home has been caring for the children in our community for nearly 150 years. Operating from six locations in the Peoria area, the staff of 400+ professionals provide community-based, family-focused programs that offer counseling, education, and support to more than 1,100 children and families each month. On this trip, we'll take a tour of the historical facility on Knoxville Avenue and learn first-hand about the agency.

Pettengill-Morron House (Activity Level 2) Tuesday, June 10, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Experience entertaining in a Victorian era home and the fine art of hospitality by Miss Jean Morron and her staff when we tour the Pettengill-Morron House. Built in 1868 in the Second Empire architectural style, the house has 11 rooms, a colonial revival porch, a porte-cochere, and contains a unique collection of objects from several Peoria families. During our visit, we'll learn all about Miss Morron, her contributions to the Peoria area, and her many philanthropic efforts.

Forest Park: 50th Anniversary History Hike (Activity Level 3)

Wednesday, June 11, 9:45 a.m. – 1:30 p.m. OR

Tuesday, August 5, 9:45 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.

In 2014, Forest Park Nature Center will celebrate its 50th anniversary. The 540-acre park is designated as a state nature preserve and features more than seven miles of hiking trails, an open woodland with unique prairie plant species, and many forms of wildlife and bird species. On these trips, we'll take guided hikes with naturalists and learn all about the history of the park, its inhabitants (deer, chipmunks, squirrels, and birds), and its programs. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, presentation fees, and van/shuttle transportation

WEEK-TV 25 Studios (Activity Level I) Thursday, June 12, 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

We'll take a private tour of the WEEK-TV studios in East Peoria, view editing bays and the control room, and have an opportunity to see reporters and anchors at work. In addition, our tour will include a behind-the-scenes viewing

of the midday news broadcast and a question-and-answer session to learn more about the station. Depending on the broadcast schedule, we may also have a chance to talk with midday anchors Garry Moore and Sandy Gallant. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Central Illinois Alpaca Farms (Activity Level 3) Monday, June 16, 8:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.

Alpacas, a domesticated species that resemble small llamas, were a cherished treasure of the ancient Incan civilization and were first imported to the United States in 1984. Join us as we visit three area family-owned farms in the Chillicothe/Sparland area – Autumn Sky Alpacas, Walkin With Alpacas, and Yankee Lane Alpacas – to learn more about the breeding, showing and birthing of alpacas. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Peoria Marriott Père Marquette (Activity Level I) Tuesday, June 17, 8:45 a.m. – 1:30 p.m. OR

Tuesday, July 22, 8:45 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.

The Peoria Marriott Père Marquette, a 12-story hotel in downtown Peoria, was built in 1926 for \$2.5 million. In 2011, it was closed for an extensive renovation and expansion into a full-service, upscale Marriott hotel. On this trip, Bradley University alumna Mackenzie Camp will be our guide as we take a private tour of the hotel and get a look at some of the 286 guest rooms and 18,840 square feet of meeting space.

Science for Lunch (Activity Level I) In Search of Mr. Spock's Tricorder: Applications and Advances in Plant Analytical Chemistry in the 21st Century Wednesday, June 18, 11:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

The search for new functional foods, environmentally friendly pest control, bio-fuels, and biodegradable consumer products and packaging is the ongoing challenge to 21st century agriculture research. Join Dr. Mark Berhow, a research chemist at the USDA NCAUR (Peoria Ag Lab), as we lunch and learn about the cutting edge approach to innovative research for healthier living through plant compounds.

Monument Tour with Jim Ludwig (Activity Level I) Friday, June 20, I 0:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m.

Ranging from Vanna Whitewall to Lydia Bradley; from religious figures to a famous agnostic; from silly to serious, there is a surprisingly rich and varied collection of public sculpture that we all see in Peoria (they are in plain sight), but don't really notice. Jim Ludwig, Professor Emeritus of Theatre at Bradley University, will provide commentary as we drive by dozens, stop at a few, and hear some history and anecdotes about treasures of the community. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

Summer Social: Saving Rocky Glen (Activity Level 2) Thursday, June 26, 12:00 p.m. – 2:00 p.m.

The summer social is another cherished OLLI tradition. This year, we'll meet at Ravina on the Lakes in Peoria for a delicious lunch featuring chef-carved meats, pastas, dessert, and a cash bar, followed by a presentation by Ed



Stermer, Professor of Geology at Illinois Central College and one of OLLI's most popular Learning Trip experts. Professor Stermer will present "Saving Rocky Glen: How Public Education and Community Awareness Helped Preserve a Geoheritage Site." Join us as we learn about Rocky Glen, a 97-acre hidden gem of geologic importance located along Kickapoo Creek Road in West Peoria. As an added bonus, every participant will also receive a copy of *Horse Shoe Bottoms* by Tom Tippett. Originally published in 1935 with a new introduction by local author Bill Knight, this historical novel features coal miners from Europe who have arrived in the Illinois River Valley, and a portion of the story takes place in Rocky Glen. \$44 – includes presentation, lunch, and book.

J.K.Williams Distilling (Activity Level 2) Monday, June 30, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. Or

Friday, July 11, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

After World War I, distillery worker J.K. Williams was left without a way to earn a living, so he resumed whiskey making in secret. His descendents are now the owners of J. K. Williams Distilling, a distillery formed to bring craft whiskey- and bourbon-making back to the Peoria area. During our tour of the facility in East Peoria, we'll learn how the family recipe is being revived four generations later, using local grain from area farmers to produce whiskey and bourbon.

Caterpillar Global Research and Development Headquarters (Activity Level 3)

Tuesday, July 8, 8:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

During this tour, we will learn how Caterpillar spends \$8 million on research and development each day – that's more than \$2 billion a year! We'll also find out more about Caterpillar's testing, simulation, and validation work that ensures its equipment delivers value over the entire lifecycle of the equipment. Join us as we find out how employees at this facility help keep Caterpillar up-to-date on regulations, product certifications, and industry standards.

Peoria County Emergency Management Agency (Activity Level 1)

Tuesday, July 15, 11:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

In 1965, Peoria County built a civil defense facility and developed its first emergency plan in preparation for a nuclear attack. A decade later, the threat of such an attack diminished and the facility expanded to become the Emergency Management Agency (EMA). On this trip, we'll visit the EMA near Edwards and learn how it coordinates all phases of comprehensive emergency management, mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery for Peoria County.

\$25 – includes lunch, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Joan's Trophy & Plaque Company (Activity Level 1) Wednesday, July 16, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Joan's Trophy & Plaque Co. originated in the Peoria residence of Don Whitesall in 1970. Now incorporated with more than 20 employees, Joan's has grown from a small trophy shop to a multi-faceted corporation retailing awards locally and worldwide. On this trip, we'll get a behind-thescenes look at the work taking place in the downtown Peoria facility and learn how the company advertises and markets its products.

Wayne Printing (Activity Level 2) Thursday, July 24, 8:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

On this trip, we'll take a private tour of the company that prints, binds, and mails the OLLI brochure! Wayne Printing is headquartered in a 37,000 square foot facility in Edwards and features state-of-the-art printing equipment, including computer-to-plate technology, a Heidelberg QMDI four-color press, and a five-color 28x40 Heidelberg press. During our tour, we'll learn all about the printing process in the company's direct mail division. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Pat Sullivan's Downtown (Activity Level 2) Wednesday, August 6, I I:45 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Pat Sullivan, Peoria native, entrepreneur, and co-developer of the city's Warehouse District, will be our host as we learn about buildings that have been revitalized in recent years. Participants will get a private, behind-the-scenes look at the Le Vieux Carre ("small quarters") building on Water Street, a former buggy and implement warehouse built in the 1800s which was also rumored to have once housed Al Capone's whiskey stills and gambling devices. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Cottage District Garden Walk with Dan Callahan (Activity Level 3)

Thursday, August 7, 9:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

In the third installment of his popular OLLI walking tours of the Moss-Bradley Neighborhood, florist and gardener Dan Callahan will lead our walking exploration of the Cottage District. Dan will give our group commentary on the architectural highlights and social background along the two-mile loop. We'll also experience up close the interweaving of creative gardening and enlightened historic preservation and get a peek into some private gardens and water features.

Peoria Journal Star (Activity Level 2) Wednesday, August 20, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Join us as we go behind the scenes at the *Peoria Journal Star*. We will take a peek into the newsroom, take a private tour of the print shop, and swing by the "cavern" left behind when the old press was dismantled once the new press was put into service. Following the tour, we'll meet an editor and/or reporter who will share his or her perspective on the news business and the future of print journalism. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and van/shuttle transportation

Peoria County Coroner's Office (Activity Level I) Thursday, August 21, II:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

On this day, we'll meet Peoria County Coroner Johnna

Ingersoll, an elected official charged with investigating sudden, unusual, and traumatic deaths and assuring those bodies are examined, identified, and if necessary, autopsied. Our visit is expected to include an observation of a jury inquest, which is held weekly to determine the manner of some deaths occurring in Peoria County. We may also have an opportunity to see the on-site autopsy room and morgue.

Komatsu (Activity Level 3) Monday, August 25, 8:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Komatsu America is the second-largest, fully-integrated manufacturer and supplier of construction equipment in North America. The Peoria facility is part of the company's network of 12 plants in North America dedicated to the manufacture, marketing, financing, and distribution of equipment and parts. On this tour, we'll see a large truck frame welded from start to finish and walk through the assembly lines of mining trucks.

USDA National Center for Agriculture Utilization Research (Activity Level 2)

Thursday, August 28, 11:30 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.

Take advantage of this rare opportunity to get a first-hand look at NCAUR, home to more than 100 Ph.D. research scientists who invent industrial and food products and develop technologies to improve environmental quality. We'll see the interdisciplinary science at work, learn how the laboratory was created in 1940 in response to a chronic farm depression, and get a chance to meet scientists who conduct the research that has led to hundreds of new commercial products.

Spend time with OLLI enjoying travel throughout Illinois and nearby states. The price of each trip varies, but includes meal, charter coach transportation (unless otherwise indicated), entrance fees, gratuities, snacks, and tour guides. Detailed itineraries are mailed upon registration. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 40 and fill quickly. Please note: all times listed are approximate and subject to change.

Lincoln's Springfield with Randy Saxon (Activity Level 2)

Tuesday, June 24, 7:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m.

Join one of OLLI's most popular instructors, Randy Saxon, as we travel to Springfield to spend a day discovering the hidden history of Abraham Lincoln. Our first stop will be a visit to the Lincoln Presidential Library, where we'll explore the "Lincoln: From History to Hollywood" exhibit, which features sets from the Academy Awardwinning film, that are on temporary loan from director Steven Spielberg and DreamWorks Studios. While at the museum, we will also view the Annie Leibovitz photography exhibit, "Pilgrimage," which features Lincoln's hat and bloody gloves. We'll also tour the Old State Capitol, the Lincoln Tomb, Lincoln's Home, and enjoy a bountiful lunch buffet at local favorite Saputo's. \$99 – includes admission fees, tours, lunch, gratuities, snacks, bottled water, and charter coach transportation

Princeton: Festival 56 and Lovejoy Homestead (Activity Level 1)

Wednesday, June 25, 8:00 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.

Festival 56 is a professional theatre festival in Princeton that features professional artists assembled from across the country. Our day in Princeton will begin with a backstage look at the Princeton Theatre with Dexter Brigham, a Bradley University alum and Executive Director of Festival 56. Next, we'll take a private tour of the Lovejoy Homestead, one of the most important stations on the Underground Railroad in Illinois. After lunch at Kramer's Kitchen, we'll head to the Grace Performing Arts center for a matinee performance of The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee, a hilarious Tony Award-winning hit musical about six adolescent misfits vying for a spelling championship.

Historic Heritage Corridor (Activity Level I) Thursday, July 10, 7:30 a.m. – 6:00 p.m.

Spend a day with OLLI as we explore historical sites along the Heritage Corridor near Utica, Ottawa, and Streator, Illinois. On the ride north, we'll watch the documentary *Radium City*, about the women who worked at Radium Dial Company (manufacturer of Westclox clocks) and fell victim to radium poisoning in Ottawa during the 1920s. Our first stop will be a tour of the Weber House

and Garden, a storybook cottage that features two acres of meandering paths, where we'll visit each room of the home and hear stories about the rich and famous who once walked the halls. Next, we'll tour and dine at the Reddick Mansion in Ottawa, visit the Ottawa Historic Museum, then end the day with a private tour of the Hegeler Carus Mansion in nearby LaSalle.

Illinois Shakespeare Festival: Much Ado About Nothing (Activity Level 2)

Thursday, July 17, 4:00 - 11:45 p.m.

The Illinois Shakespeare Festival is a cherished OLLI summer tradition. As always, we've secured centersection, platinum-plus tickets for the performance of *Much Ado About Nothing*, generally considered one of Shakespeare's best comedies. Our trip will include an outdoor catered picnic dinner (with wine), a behind-thescenes tour with the festival staff (including actors) prior to the performance, and plenty of time to stroll the beautiful gardens of Ewing Manor before the performance. Dr. Susan Hillabold, frequent OLLI instructor, will accompany our group to provide insight throughout the trip. \$109 – includes tour, dinner, wine, center section platinum seats, gratuities, snacks, and charter coach transportation.

Effingham: Boos, Firefly, and More (Activity Level 1) Wednesday, July 23, 7:00 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.

Discover the hidden gems of Effingham when we spend a day exploring some of the most interesting industries in this southern Illinois town. First, we'll tour John Boos and Company, which has produced butcher blocks and cutting boards since 1887. Its products are used by celebrity chefs throughout the nation, including Mario Batali and Emeril Lagasse. Next, we will enjoy a presentation and meal at The Firefly Grill, where the menu changes daily and features local ingredients, including herbs and vegetables from the chef's own garden. Our day will conclude with a visit to My Garage Museum, an authentic, restored 1910 gas station with vintage cars and thousands of pieces of Corvette memorabilia on display.

Homeland Security Education Center and Fermilab (Activity Level 2)

Tuesday, July 29, 6:45 a.m. - 7:00 p.m.

Spend a day in the Chicago suburbs learning about homeland security and the latest in scientific research. First, we'll tour the College of DuPage's Homeland Security Education Center, a \$25 million multijurisdictional training center that features a full-scale indoor street scene for force-on-force exercises, forensics and cybercrimes labs, an outdoor scaling and rapelling tower, and a command center. After lunch at Waterleaf Restaurant on campus, we'll tour Fermilab, home to the Tevatron, once the most powerful particle accelerators in

the United States. During the tour, we'll view laboratories, components in the linear accelerator gallery, and speak with a scientist during a question-and-answer session. \$109 – includes guided tours, lunch, gratuities, snacks, bottled water, and charter coach transportation.

Aurora Architecture (Activity Level 2) Tuesday, August 19, 7:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m.

Aurora's architectural marvels will be the focus of this trip as we visit the Farnsworth House, Tanner House, Two Brothers Roundhouse, and the Paramount Theatre. First, we'll tour Ludwig Mies van der Rohe's Farnsworth House, a world famous example of modernist domestic architecture, which represents the builder's minimalist expression of structure and space. Next, we'll dine at Two Brothers Roundhouse, the oldest roundhouse in North America that was renovated and reopened by football star Walter Payton in the mid 1990s. Next, we'll walk through the Tanner House, an 1857 Italianate-style house that was home to the prominent merchant William Tanner and his family. Our last stop will be a backstage tour of the Paramount Theatre, designed by Rapp & Rapp with a fashionable Art Deco influence.

You'll be accompanied by Bernie Drake, incoming OLLI President and frequent class instructor for a four-day, three-night exploration of Kansas City's world-class museums, vibrant arts scene, striking landscape, fantastic architecture, and, of course, delicious barbeque! We'll stay in the heart of Country Club Plaza, a 15-block district with more than 150 shops and dozens of fine restaurants.

Some of our trip highlights will include:

- A private, guided tour of the city's diverse architecture and history by experts from the Historic Kansas City Foundation, including the Art Deco City Hall;
- A guided tour of the National World War I Museum, an 80,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art museum and the Edward Jones Research Center underneath the Liberty Memorial;

OLLI RECEIVES A SECOND ENDOWMENT!

The Bernard Osher Foundation awarded Bradley University a second \$1 million endowment grant for the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. The announcement was made in mid-March during OLLI's 20th anniversary celebration on campus.

"We are truly grateful to The Osher Foundation for this second endowment and for its confidence in and support of our lifelong learning community," said Janet Lange, Executive Director of Continuing Education and Professional Development. "We are also very thankful to Bradley, which values OLLI's presence on campus and understands the importance of our program."

The Foundation made the grant to Bradley's OLLI in recognition of the ongoing excellence of the Institute's programming and the unstinting commitment of its members. It cited the pioneering efforts and vision of the founders of the program saying they established a standard of excellence and a model of active member involvement.

In 2008, the Osher Foundation awarded Bradley a \$100,000 grant that established the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. A subsequent \$1 million gift from the Foundation in 2010 endowed OLLI, ensuring its long-term viability while recognizing it as a program of national distinction.

The Bernard Osher Foundation, headquartered in San Francisco, was founded in 1977 by Bernard Osher, a respected businessman and community leader. The Foundation seeks to improve quality of life through support for higher education and the arts.

What happens to \$1 million?

The \$1 million endowment will be invested by Bradley University. The funds will earn up to a maximum of 5% of the 3-year average market value of the endowment. The actual rate per year will be determined annually by the Bradley University Board of Trustees. The annual return on the endowment will be used to fund the salaries of staff that coordinate OLLI programming.

About Bernard and Barbro Osher

The Bernard Osher Foundation

Bernard Osher, a patron of education and the arts, started The Bernard Osher Foundation in 1977 which seeks to improve quality of life through support for higher education and the arts.

Mr. Osher, Founder and Treasurer of The Osher Foundation, is a native of Biddeford, Maine and a graduate of Bowdoin College. He has pursued a successful career in business, beginning with the management of his family's hardware and plumbing supplies store in Maine and continuing with work at Oppenheimer & Company in New York before moving to California. There he became a founding director of World Savings, the second largest savings institution in the United States, which was sold to Wachovia Corporation in 2006.

A collector of American paintings of the mid-19th to the mid-20th centuries, Osher purchased the fine art auction house of Butterfield & Butterfield in 1970 and oversaw its growth to become the fourth largest auction house in the world. In 1999, he sold the company to eBay.

Bernard Osher has been affiliated with a number of philanthropic and non-profit boards and currently serves as president of the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco Foundation and vice-chair of the American Himalayan Foundation. He is the recipient of numerous honorary degrees and is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences (Class of 2009). He also is a serious student of opera and an ardent fly fisherman.

Barbro Osher is Chair of The Bernard Osher Foundation and President of The Barbro Osher Pro Suecia Foundation, which supports Swedish-related cultural and educational projects in North America and Sweden. A native of Stockholm and a graduate of Stockholm University with a degree in languages and political science, Osher pursued a career in publishing and advertising in Sweden before moving to the United States in the early 1980s. Her first visit to America in 1962 was to Maine where she participated as a student in the Experiment in International Living program. Over the years, she has represented both the Royal Swedish Academy of Engineering Sciences and the Swedish Tourist Board.

Barbro Osher is Honorary Consul General of Sweden in California. For many years, she also was owner and publisher of *Vestkusten*, one of the few Swedish-American newspapers in the United States, established in 1886 as a source of news from Sweden on politics, business, and sports as well as information on the active Swedish-American community in the West. She also is an active member of the Consular Corps of San Francisco, an avid reader in six languages, and an enthusiastic skier.

Saving Europe's Cultural Heritage: The Monuments Men During World War II Mondays, June 9 – June 30 1:30 – 3:30 p.m. Peoria NEXT Innovation Center

The February release of *The Monuments Men* film brought attention to one lesser-known facet of World War II: the effort to rescue Europe's great artistic masterpieces from the hands of the Nazis. Using Robert Edsel's book, *The* Monuments Men, as our guide for discussion, this Study Group will explore the struggles, setbacks, successes, and significance of a group of artists, art historians, museum curators, and ordinary soldiers as they joined the front lines to recover stolen art treasures. Our meetings will closely examine artists and art works that were considered "prized possessions" for Hitler and his commanding officers. Many of these works were almost destroyed by war's devastation or by Hitler's devious intentions. Our discussions will not only highlight the important role *The* Monuments Men played in preserving European cultural heritage, but will also address how art helps cultural identity, and why this is still a concern in the twentiethcentury. Participants should read *The Monuments Men* by Robert Edsel which is available in paperback and e-book formats from local and online booksellers or from local libraries.

Janet Lange in Continuing Education and John Shorrock in Advancement explore the creation of an educational program for senior citizens...Bradley University welcomes the Institute for Learning in Retirement in 1994 with 10 classes and 84 members...Nancy Hinrichs Proehl is the first director...Classes double and membership triples within first year...Learning Trips, Winter Classes, and parking shuttle service introduced.

We Grow • 1999 - 2004

We host the first video "class" with Binghamton University in New York ... Website launches, membership brochure enhanced, and logo apparel introduced ... Local artists showcased with exhibits during Classes ... ILR hosts the regional meeting of the Elderhostel Institute Network ... We celebrate our 10th anniversary with a gala at the Hotel Pere Marquette... Online registration begins.

We're Nationally Recognized • 2005 – 2009

"1968: The Year that Changed Everything" is our first Study Group ... We are awarded a \$100,000 grant from The Bernard Osher Foundation and become the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute ... Our quarterly brochure is revamped with a new design for each season ... A second \$100,000 Osher grant is received, along with an invitation to apply for an endowment ...
