OSHER LIFELONG LEARNING INSTITUTE AT BRADLEY UNIVERSITY

As my time as your OLLI President comes to a close, I wanted to revisit some 2014 highlights:

- ✓ \$53,074 was donated by generous OLLI members, allowing us to purchase two shuttles; fund free Lecture and Cinema events; award two Bradley undergraduates \$1,000 each for our Student Volunteer of the Year awards; set aside funds to provide ongoing maintenance for the shuttles; and place 5% into the OLLI endowment account.
- ✓ We continued our tradition of presenting high-quality Classes and Study Groups, serving 1,102 class registrants who chose from 143 courses and 566 Study Group registrants who chose from 50 multi-week groups. Two additional satellite locations for Study Groups were again added in 2014, allowing us to continue to expand our programming to northern Peoria.
- ✓ Relationships with businesses and organizations in the area were further solidified, allowing for more OLLI members to experience behind-the-scenes Learning Trips. A total of 126 trips were offered last year, serving 2,959 registrants.
- ✓ The Lectures Committee, with new Chairperson Sharon Amdall, worked diligently in its third full year of organization, planning 12 Lectures that attracted 1,048 registrants. OLLI Lectures are free of charge and funded by member donations.
- ✓ Under the direction of new Cinema Chair Carol May, our Sunday Cinema program was modified and renamed Free Flicks. A new program, Cinema Conversations, was also launched. This program combines the viewing of a movie with two additional meetings to further discuss the film and related readings with a volunteer moderator.
- ✓ We celebrated our 20th Anniversary with a luncheon for nearly 400 members, volunteers, and Bradley staff that featured 13 ILR/OLLI past presidents; the surprise announcement of a second \$1 million endowment from The Bernard Osher Foundation by Bradley President Joanne Glasser; and a keynote address by Janet Lange, Executive Director of Continuing Education and Professional Development, which detailed the history of ILR/OLLI.
- ✓ Finally, for the first time ever, the OLLI Executive Committee began a strategic planning process. Under the volunteer guidance of Dr. Aaron Buchko, Professor of Management, Foster College of Business, Bradley University, members of the committee are working diligently to determine issues, priorities, purpose, critical factors, key metrics, and priority action items. It is our goal to present this plan to the membership in April 2015.

2014 was a great year, and I'm sure 2015 holds even more promise for our OLLI.

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LEARNING TRIPS

Learning Trips are educational travel experiences that encourage you to interact with experts who offer behindthe-scenes looks at area businesses, regional attractions, and international destinations.

On OLLI trips, you get to investigate and explore with your peers while receiving top-notch customer service - all travel arrangements are developed by the staff, so that you can focus on learning and fun.

Learning Trips travel year round and utilize our comfortable easy-access OLLI shuttles. Longer land excursions travel by charter coach.

To make your trip even more enjoyable, please note:

- All Learning Trip times in this brochure are approximate and subject to change. Please refer to your confirmation handout (mailed upon registration) for specific departure, tour, and arrival times
- Many of our Learning Trips require walking and standing in various terrains and environments.
 To ensure your safety and to respect our hosts' regulations, everyone is required to wear closed-toed shoes on our trips.
- Each Learning Trip includes an activity level symbol. Before you register, make sure the activity level matches your abilities. This will ensure an enjoyable trip for you and those who travel with you.
- (1) Enter/exit vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.
- (2) Level 1, plus: climb some flights of stairs and walk on uneven surfaces.
- (3) Levels 1 & 2, plus: healthy, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of daily physical activity.
- (4) Levels 1 3, plus: able to participate in 6 hours of daily moderate activity.

LOCAL TRIPS

Get to know your community on these half-day excursions to local sites. The price includes meal, shuttle transportation, entrance fees, and tour guides. Detailed itineraries are mailed upon registration. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 28 and fill quickly. **Please note: all times listed are approximate and subject to change.**

I. Heddington Oaks (Activity Level I) Monday, March 2, 8:45 a.m. – I:00 p.m.

On this trip we'll visit Heddington Oaks, an elder care facility that replaced county-owned Bel-Wood Nursing Home. We'll meet Executive Director Matt Nieukirk and learn about the process of constructing a tax-supported facility, including determining the size of the building, funding options, and more. Nieukirk will give us a private tour of the 214 bed, state-of-the-art facility that was built to LEED Silver design and construction standards and offers secure housing for 80 Alzheimer's patients. Following the tour, we'll meet with representatives from the county's TRIAD program, a safety organization that focuses on reducing crime victimization of seniors. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

2. Caterpillar Global Research and Development Headquarters (Activity Level 3)

Tuesday, March 3, 8:15 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

During this tour, we will learn how Caterpillar spends \$8 million on research and development each day. We'll also find out more about Caterpillar's testing, simulation, and validation work that

ensures its equipment delivers value over the entire lifecycle of the equipment. Join us as we find out how employees at this facility help keep Caterpillar up-to-date on regulations, product certifications, and industry standards. Steel-toed shoes are mandatory on this trip, and jewelry cannot be worn. Caterpillar will supply shoe covers, but please be aware they may cause some discomfort while walking in the plant. Before you register, please ensure you meet the activity level requirements for this Level 3 trip.

3. Peoria Brewing Company (Activity Level I) Wednesday, March 4, 9:15 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

Peorian Todd Hayes made his home beer brewing debut in the late 1980s, and has spent the past 25 years perfecting his skills. Recently, he and his good friend and former neighbor Christian Payne formed the Peoria Brewing Company in partnership with Doug Cekander, who owns ten Buffalo Wild Wings restaurants in Central Illinois. On this trip, we'll learn how three local friends

worked together to bring North Peoria the newest brewing company that is the talk of the town. We'll also learn how the brewmaster makes large batches of high-quality, superpalatable craft beers with unique names such as Yippy IPA, Honey Do, Moody Cow, and Captain Tony's. After the tour, participants can enjoy samples of the homemade brew! \$25 – includes brunch, gratuities, tour, beer samples, and shuttle transportation

4. J.K. Williams Distilling (Activity Level 2) Monday, March 9, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Back by popular demand, we're making a return visit to J. K. Williams Distilling, a distillery formed to bring craft whiskey- and bourbon-making back to the Peoria area. During our tour of the facility in East Peoria, we'll learn how J. K. Williams was a man ahead of his time, stubbornly refusing to sacrifice quality when crafting his bootleg whiskey. We'll also learn (and taste) how the family recipe is being revived four generations later, using local grain to produce whiskey and bourbon. At the end of the tour, owner Jon Williams will mix a cocktail for each participant who chooses to sample the product. Please note, you will be standing for the entire two-hour tour; ensure you meet the activity level requirements for this Level 2 trip.

\$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, cocktail, and shuttle transportation

5. State Farm Headquarters (Activity Level 4) Thursday, March 12, 8:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.

On this day, we'll visit three of insurance giant State Farm's corporate complexes in Bloomington. First, we'll visit the Class #33 Corporate Main Complex, where we'll see the State Farm Museum, historic vehicles, a television studio, and the company store. Next, we'll tour State Farm's original downtown building and see the company's very first offices and auditorium. At our last stop, Corporate South, we'll have lunch and tour the massive complex that employs 12,000 workers. Please note, we will be on our feet and walking throughout large buildings during the day; ensure you meet activity level requirement for this Level 4 tour. In addition, you must have a photo identification card to be allowed into all buildings. \$29 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, cocktail, and shuttle transportation

6.Toraason Glass (Activity Level 1) Monday, March 16, 11:00 a.m. – 2:30 p.m.

Toraason Glass is OLLI's most popular trip, with more than two dozen visits in the past 20 years! For those who haven't yet experienced this tour, please join us as we get an exclusive, up-close look at local artist Hiram Toraason's 4,000-square-foot glass-blowing studio and gallery. Hiram will demonstrate his techniques of working

with 2,000-degree molten glass and create a one-of-a-kind work of art. He will also discuss the artwork he created for Caterpillar Inc., for the renovated entrance to UnityPoint-Methodist Medical Center, and for a newly renovated downtown nightspot. Cameras are welcome, but Hiram requests no video recordings.

\$28 – includes lunch, gratuities, presentation fees, and shuttle transportation

7. Wheel Art Pottery Studios (Activity Level 2) Thursday, March 19, 8:45 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Our first trip to Wheel Art was such a success, we've partnered with the artists to offer it twice this season! Born and raised in Central Illinois, Bradley University alum Jacob Grant co-owns Wheel Art Pottery Studios, which emphasizes instruction, and Jacob Grant Ceramics, a studio through which he sells his artwork. His pottery has been on display at Disney World and The Four Seasons Hotel in Washington, D.C. On this trip, we will visit with Jacob and his co-owners to see first-hand how he draws inspiration from the human form and nature for much of his design and colors, as well as learn about the amount of chemistry involved in the firing and glazing process. \$37 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, materials and firing fees, and shuttle transportation

8. Komatsu (Activity Level 3) Friday, March 20, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Komatsu America is the second-largest manufacturer and supplier of construction equipment in North America. The Peoria facility is part of the company's network of 12 plants in North America dedicated to the manufacture, marketing, financing, and distribution of equipment and parts. On this tour, we'll see a large truck frame welded from start to finish and walk through the assembly line of mining trucks. We will be walking and on our feet for the entire tour. It is imperative that you meet the activity level requirements for this Level 3 trip before registering. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

9. Peoria County Jail with Sheriff Mike McCoy (Activity Level 2)

Tuesday, March 24, 8:45 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

Peoria County Sheriff Mike McCoy will lead a behind-thescenes tour of his department and the attached jail while providing a narrative about the county's law enforcement services. During our visit, we will walk through the lockup portion of the facility and experience the jail's newer technological advances, including a closed circuit bonding system, computerized mug shot and booking system, a live scan fingerprint process system, and an interactive indoor shooting range.

\$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

I 0. Maui Jim (Activity Level I)Friday, March 27, 8:45 a.m. – I:00 p.m.

Now the fastest growing premium polarized sunglass maker in the world, Maui Jim got its start in the 1980s as a one-man business on the beach in Lahaina, Hawaii. During this trip, we'll tour the company's headquarters in Peoria and see first-hand how it engineers its PolarizedPlus lenses, which combat the sun's intense glare and harmful UV rays. We'll get a close-up look at the lab and see employees at work throughout the facility. In addition, Maui Jim staff members will discuss the company's "Aloha Spirit" philosophy, its move from Hawaii to Peoria, and discuss how the company's "ohana" (Hawaiian for family) has steadily built a cult following for its products. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

II. Simantel (Activity Level I) Tuesday, March 31, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Simantel is a local, independent, award-winning marketing and communications firm headquartered in Peoria's Warehouse District. On this tour, we'll meet the staff and learn how the company has partner agencies in more than 23 countires, embraces the latest technology, and masters the newest industry trends in business-to-business markeeting. We'll also learn about the company's video production and animation tools, research, and marketing automation. In addition, we'll learn more about Simantel's work with Caterpillar, The Weather Channel, Bradley University, Easter Seals, and more. Participants on this tour will also have the opportunity to take part in a small focus group during our time on site!

\$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

12. Homeway Homes (Activity Level 2) Thursday, April 2, 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

On this popular trip, we'll travel to Deer Creek to tour the Homeway Homes Factory and learn all about the company's design and construction processes. We'll see the staff at work throughout each step of the building stages, including floor and wall build, roof set, plumbing and insulation, siding, and final inspection and wrap. We'll then head to Goodfield to tour completed model homes and enjoy lunch at local favorite Busy Corner Restaurant. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

13. Studios on Sheridan (Activity Level 2) Friday, April 3, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

In 2012, the former Sunbeam Bakery at the corner of Sheridan and Main streets was transformed into Studios on Sheridan, a 22,000 square-foot haven for local artists to display their works and create new art in private studios. On this trip, we'll be treated to a private tour of the facility,

learn about the redevelopment process, visit with artists at work preparing for that evening's First Friday exhibit, experience a short glass blowing demonstration with Jeremie Draper, and have an opportunity to explore the many other businesses located throughout the building. \$35 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, presentation fees, and shuttle transportation

14. Rothan Millworks (Activity Level 2) **Monday, April 6, 8:45 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.**

Founded in 1873, Rothan Millwork Company specializes in the manufacturing of customized fine wood products, including standard items such as cabinets and doors to cabinets, desks, bars, and counters. Still located in its original location in downtown Peoria, the company serves customers throughout the United States. On this tour, we'll get a behind-the-scenes glimpse at how the experienced Rothan carpenters design and fabricate products, learn about the history of this family-owned business, and discuss how Rothan continues its tradition of expert craftsmanship and quality.

15. Peoria Marriott Pere Marquette (Activity Level I) **Tuesday, April 7, 8:45 a.m. – I:00 p.m.**

The Peoria Marriott Pere Marquette, a 12-story hotel in downtown Peoria, was built in 1926 for \$2.5 million. In 2011, it closed for an extensive renovation and expansion into a full-service, upscale Marriott hotel. On this trip, we will take a private, guided tour of the hotel and adjacent Courtyard Marriott, with a chance to see some of the 286 guest rooms, (including the Presidential Suite and the Bridal Suite, if available) and 18,840 square feet of meeting space.

\$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

16. Monument Tour with Jim Ludwig (Activity Level I) **Friday, April 10, 10:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.**

Ranging from Vanna Whitewall to Lydia Bradley; from religious figures to a famous agnostic; from silly to serious, there is a surprisingly rich and varied collection of public sculpture that we all see in Peoria (they are in plain sight), but don't really notice. Jim Ludwig, Professor Emeritus of Theatre at Bradley University, will provide commentary as we drive by dozens, stop at a few, and hear some history and anecdotes about treasures of the community. \$27 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, presentation, and shuttle transportation

Kuusakoski Recycling is a Finnish company that partnered with Peoria Disposal Company to create an innovative process for safely disposing of old televisions and CRTs that results in an environmentally-safe product used as landfill cover. On this trip, we'll visit the Kuusakoski facility on Townline Road, learn about the method of processing chemicals from the CRTs, then visit the Pottstown Road facility where the waste is sent. Seating on this trip is limited to 20 participants. \$25 – includes breakfast, gratuities, tour, and shuttle

19. Eureka College (Activity Level 2) Monday, April 20, 8:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

Founded in 1855 by anti-slavery activists, Eureka College is now home to more than 700 students on a 112-acre wooded campus in the small Woodford County town of Eureka. Join OLLI as we take a private tour of campus led by Mike Murtagh, Vice President of Development and Alumni Relations, and learn about the experience of the college's most famous alum, President Ronald Reagan. We'll also get a glimpse of Sanders Hall, the newest building on campus that was funded by a donation from frequent OLLI instructor Dick Sanders. As a special treat, we'll enjoy a catered lunch on campus. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle

20. Dieters Funeral Home and Crematory (Activity Level 1)

Tuesday, April 21, 8:30 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.

Having both a passion for their work and a desire to be closer to family, Washingtonians Gary and Stephanie Deiters opened Deiters Funeral Home and Crematory in 1999, which has been honored with the National Funeral Director Association "Pursuit of Excellence Eagle Award" five times. On this trip, we'll learn about the history of funeral services, trends in the industry (including cremation and personalized funerals), and how the owners are deeply involved in community service. In addition, we'll receive a private tour of the funeral home facility, the human crematory, and the pet services and crematory. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

21. Funks Grove (Activity Level 2) Thursday, April 23, 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Spend a day with OLLI as we explore the hidden gems (literally) in the small McLean County town of Funks Grove. First, Bill and Emma Funk will provide a private tour of the Funk Prairie Home and its adjoining Gem Museum, the largest one-owner gem and mineral collection in the world. Next, we'll enjoy a lunch buffet at the Dixie Trucker Stop, a Route 66 historic site in nearby McLean. In the afternoon, we'll enjoy private tours at the Funks Grove Pure Maple Sirup cabin, where we'll pop inside the sugar house and learn how the famous sirup is produced. Tastings will be provided, of course! Finally, we'll visit the Sugar Grove Nature Center, the largest remaining intact prairie grove in the state of Illinois, to learn about its interpretive exhibits, live animals, and wildlife viewing room.

On this trip, we'll visit the Peoria Historical Society's John C. Flanagan House Museum and Pettingill-Morron House Museum to experience life in Peoria at the end of the Civil War from both a pro-slavery and abolitionist standpoint. At our first stop, the

abolitionist standpoint. At our first stop, the Flanagan House, docents will provide a tour of the oldest standing house in Peoria while explaining the pro-slavery beliefs held by some residents in the 1860s. Next, we'll tour the Pettingill-Morron House to learn about the abolitionist movement and how Peoria played a major role in the Underground Railroad.

23. Behind-the-Curtain at Peoria Players (Activity Level 2)

Monday, April 27, 11:00 a.m. - 2:30 p.m.

Did you know that Peoria is home to the nation's fourth longest consecutively running community theatre? Peoria Players Theatre has been entertaining audiences for 97 years and currently runs approximately 10 productions each year. On this trip, we'll will learn about the logistics of operating a non-profit theatre, meet directors for the 2015-2016 season, and watch as local performers preview scenes from the upcoming musical production of *Damn* Yankees. Join OLLI as we get this rare, behind-the-scenes glimpse of how theatre "plays in Peoria." \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle

24. Mackinaw Valley Vineyard (Activity Level 2) Tuesday, April 28, 10:15 a.m. - 2:45 p.m.

Learn about wine making and wine tasting with this behind-the-scenes look at Mackinaw Valley Vineyard, located just east of Mackinaw in Tazewell County. Bradley University alumnae Diane Hahn and her husband Paul, owners of the working vineyard, will guide our private tour of the winery that sits on a glacial moraine and features an amazing 30-mile view of the valley and farms below. Our tour will include a walk-through of the wine making room, a formal tasting of at least six wines, and the opportunity to learn more about the 20 different wines available for purchase, including six varieties named after the Hahn children.

Class #57 The Jump Trading Simulation and TIE-IN Education Center is a virtual care delivery setting that replicates patient care using actual medical equipment and state-of-theart simulation devices that provide the highest level of medical research, training, and innovation and to attract the finest minds in clinical education. On this visit, back by popular demand after our Winter tour filled up quickly, participants will spend nearly five hours at the Center, participating in four separate "labs," including a simulation lab, a pig heart dissection lab, a suturing lab, and a tour of the overall facility.

During our behind-the-scenes look at the new facility, we'll see the current exhibits and planetarium, including *The Street*, a dramatic exhibit designed with a sense of grandeur, with a large media display to immerse visitors in more than 300 years of Peoria's rich history. In addition, we'll learn about the features of the building and practices that make it an environmentally sustainable museum, including the use of primarily local resources and labor during construction that reduced fuel usage for travel and shipping, a design that makes as much use of natural light as possible, and a roof

28. Peoria State Hospital Walking Tour (Activity Level 3)

Tuesday, May 12, 8:45 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

The Peoria State Hospital, established in
1895 for the "incurably insane," has remained empty since its 1972 closure. On this trip, Bill Turner, a retired health administrator who worked at both the Peoria State Hospital and Zeller Mental Health Clinic, will explain the history of the facilities, and take us on an active walking tour of several cemeteries on the grounds of the hospital in Bartonville. He will also debunk the stigma of hauntings at the site, including the myth of a patient on burial detail who supposedly wailed after each ceremony, even after his death. Please note: this will be an active, outdoor, walking tour. Before you register, please ensure you meet the activity level requirements for

Join us as we visit the Peoria Fire Academy, a 15-acre training facility near Galena Road utilized by local, state, and federal public safety agencies for upgrade training and continuing education. It is also designated as the regional training site for the Illinois Fire Service Institute. Captain Byron Yang and his staff will provide an in-depth look at the Peoria Fire Department, demonstrate the equipment used by firefighters (including fire gear and breathing apparatus), lead a walk-through of the facility's fivestory burn tower (walking to the top will be optional), oversee a vehicle extrication practice (depending on staff availability), and give willing participants a chance to put out a fire on their own in a controlled burn environment. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

30. Rocky Glen Hike (Activity Level 4) Monday, May 18, 8:15 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

Rocky Glen, comprised of 97 acres along Kickapoo Creek Road in West Peoria, is a hidden gem of geologic importance. In late 2012, the Peoria City Council voted to purchase this land for public use. We'll learn about the site during a two-hour private hike with David Pittman of the Friends of Rocky Glen, a group dedicated to the site's preservation. David will provide further insight about the land's history and update us on the purchase and how the Friends of Rocky Glen are continuing the hard work to preserve the property, lead hikes, begin restoration work,

32. Peoria County Coroner's Office (Activity Level I) Thursday, May 21, II:30 a.m. – 3:45 p.m.

On this day, we'll meet Peoria County Coroner Johnna Ingersoll, an elected official charged with investigating sudden, unusual, and traumatic deaths and assuring those bodies are examined, identified, and if necessary, autopsied. Our visit is expected to include an observation of a jury inquest, which is held weekly to determine the manner of some deaths in Peoria County. We may also have an opportunity to see the on-site autopsy room and morgue. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

33. Broad Branch Farm (Activity Level 3) Friday, May 22, 8:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Broad Branch Farm is a chemical-free farm located in the rural Peoria County town of Wyoming. Since 1998, the Poeppel family has been committed to producing clean, delicious, and local food for their community. On this trip, we'll learn about how the farm's growing practices surpass USDA organic standards for all of their products (vegetables, chickens, eggs, beef, and pork) and how those products are marketed through the farm's Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program. In addition, owners Brian and Anita Poeppel will provide a tour of the greenhouse, and participants will get the chance to meet some of the pigs and chickens on the farm.

34. Kickapoo Creek Winery (Activity Level I) Tuesday, May 26, 8:45 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Beginning in 2001, Dr. David Conner began planting the varietal of grapes that are found today at Kickapoo Creek Winery. Spend a day with us in Edwards, where Dr. Conner will give us a private, in-depth tour of the beautiful lakes, bridges, and vineyards of his winery. We'll start the trip with a hands-on presentation about the winemaking and bottling process, then Dr. Conner will fire up the Grape Train to transport us through the vineyards while he describes how the winery uses certain grapes and specialized trellis systems to produce its variety of fine wines. After the tour, we'll enjoy lunch and wine tasting in the dining room. Before we depart, participants will have time to browse the gift shop and tasting room and purchase local products.

35. Hummingbird Haven (Activity Level 2) Friday, May 28, 8:45 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Hummingbird enthusiasts from around the world have visited Hummingbird Haven in Smithfield (about an hour from Peoria) to learn about these birds, named after the sound created by their beating wings which flap at high frequencies audible to humans. Join OLLI as we enjoy a private visit with Lois White, who has owned Hummingbird Haven for more than 30 years. She'll show us how she attracts hundreds of birds in more than 40 feeders, discusses how to care for hummingbirds, and talks to us about her three-times yearly banding events, in which a biologist "bands" (marks) the birds for research purposes. \$27 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

I. Historic Charleston (Activity Level 2) Thursday, April 9, 8:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.

Kit Morice, curator of Eastern Illinois University's Tarble Arts Center and member of the Charleston Historic Preservation Commission, will be our guide as we explore several historic gems in the small college town of Charleston, Illinois. First, we'll visit the Lincoln Log Cabin State Historic Site, which was once the 1840s home of Thomas and Sarah Bush Linoln, father and stepmother of our 16th president. The site includes a working historic farm developed around a two-room cabin. After lunch downtown, we'll visit Charleston's Downtown Square, the site of the Coles County seat since 1835. As a young lawyer, Abraham Lincoln practiced law in a previous version of the coursthouse; today, the late 19th centrury Romanesque building sits in the center of the square, home to historic buildings with stunning architectural details. We'll end the day with a visit to the campus of Eastern Illinois University, including the Greenwood School Museum, an authentic one-room schoolhouse that provides a glimpse at education from 1985-1945, and the Tarble Arts Center, where we'll see a new exhibition on Navaho and Pueblo art, which may be an interesting preview for those OLLI members planning to take our September trip to New Mexico.

2. Randy Saxon's Springfield: 150th Anniversary of Lincoln's Funeral (Activity Level 2) Tuesday, April 14, 7:30 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.

will be abuzz in early May with thousands upon thousands of re-enactors and dignitaries who will pay tribute to President Lincoln and re-create the funeral procession to Oak Ridge Cemetery. OLLI will visit Springfield two weeks prior to these events for a more intimate and private look at how the nation reacted to the assassination of the beloved president. Frequent OLLI instructor Randy Saxon will accompany us on a day-long trip that will feature

visits to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum, where we'll see an amazing display of artifiacts in the Illinois Room, including the bed in which Lincoln died. We will also visit the Lincoln Tomb, Lincoln Home, Old Capitol, and, depending upon availability, the Governor's Mansion and Dana-Thomas House. As always, Randy Saxon will provide an intriguing and engaging presentation throughout the day that will enhance our knowledge about President Lincoln and the town in which his funeral procession ended.

3. John Deere Headquarters and More (Activity Level 2)

Thursday, April 30, 6:45 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.

Get acquainted – or reacquainted – with John Deere history and equipment when we spend a day touring factory sites and visiting a real working farm in the Quad Cities. Our first stop will be a tour of the John Deere Harvester Works, the largest, most modern combine manufacturing facility in the world. Next, we'll visit John Deere World Headquarters, featuring a giant display floor with vintage and current equipment; a three-dimensional historical timeline mural "Reflections of an Era" following 177 years of history; and an award-winning building design set on 1,400 beautiful acres of land. After lunch at the Machine Shed, we'll visit Cinnamon Ridge Farms in nearby Donahue, Iowa, where we'll meet the family who operates the farm. We'll see the robotic dairy barn where cows can be observed being milked by robots and a viewing room of the hog barn to see how the animals are raised in a clean, healthy environment. You'll be able to purchase items in the farm store, so be sure to bring a small cooler for the ride home. We'll end our day at the John Deere Pavilion, Illinois' most popular and comprehensive agricultural exhibit.

4. Frank Lloyd Wright in Oak Park (Activity Level 3) Thursday, May 7, 6:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m.

Oak Park is home to the world's largest collection of Frank Lloyd Wright-designed buildings. On this daylong trip, we'll learn how Wright used his first home to experiment with design concepts that contain the seeds of his architectural philosophy. In addition, we'll tour his adjacent studio, where Wright and his associates developed a new American architecture - the Prairie style. Throughout the day, trained interpreters will offer insights into Wright's family life and architectural career. We'll also walk the Historic District surrounding the Home and Studio at our own pace, viewing the exteriors of a rich selection of architecturally significant buildings supplemented by archival photographs. After lunch at local favorite Winberie's, we'll visit the Unity Temple,

Wright's only surviving public building from his Prairie period. Constructed of exposed, poured-in-place reinforced concrete, Unity Temple was perhaps the first house of worship to be built from a material reserved for factories and warehouses.

5. Barn Again – Midwest Barns and Churches (Activity Level 3)

Spend a leisurely day exploring some of the Midwest's most historic barns and churches as we tour five unique farms and houses of worship in the Champaign-Urbana area. Our stops will include the University of Illinois round barns, which helped lead the way for similar types of construction on farms throughout the Midwest; Libka Place Barn, home of cow herds and feeding steers for auctions at the famous Chicago stockyards; Immanuel Lutheran Church, founded in 1874 by Ostfriesian immigrant farmers; Doug Miller's Centennial Farm, which features a farm history museum; and University Place Christian Church, built after a disasterous fire that destroyed the former facility in 1932. Dick McGuire, retired minister and step-on guide with the Champaign Convention and Visitors Center, will be our guide throughout the day. As a unique treat, we'll enjoy a home-cooked lunch at one of the church stops!



Discussion topics will include the overall historical and judicial background for the trials, profiles of the defendants, the indictment, the prosecution and defense cases, the closing arguments, and the verdicts rendered. I. Cahokia: The First City in North America

About 900 years ago, thousands for Native Americans resided in the Mississippi River Valley near present-day St. Louis. Archaeologists call the settlement Cahokia. Within a century, circa AD 1200, Cahokia was the largest community in North America, the population of which would not be exceeded by an Illinois city until 1850. Archaeologists have long studied Cahokia and nearby settlements to determine what factors led to its development and its demise, for it survived less than three centuries. In the course four presentations, we will explore the history of archaeological research at Cahokia, the history of the community, and current evidence and theories for its rise, everyday life, influence on far-flung settlements, and its eventual fall. 


