



If you think OLLI classes are like traditional school, you'll be surprised to learn that we take a different approach. Imagine learning only about the topics you choose, taught by engaging instructors, on a college campus, with people your age, and no tests or grades. Add time for socializing, and you have a sense of what we do. It's learning - our way!

I. Colored Pencil for Beginners

Join our instructor, Mel Turner, as he assists you through the art of colored pencil. Mel's 16 years of experience with colored pencil techniques enable him to help you awaken vour hidden artistic talent. A different project will be introduced each week. A supply list will be provided, and the class is limited to 10. (RI/RC)

2. Introductory Meditation for Spiritual Awareness

Meditation helps reduce stress, increases productivity, and improves concentration. More importantly, it helps us grow spiritually. We will cover the physical,



mental, emotional, and spiritual benefits

of meditation, developing the meditation technique, sitting still and focusing, and stilling the mind. A \$5 workbook fee will be collected on the first day of class by the instructors: Mary Kay Berjohn, a retired school psychologist; Harold Berjohn, a retired school administrator; Prem Bhatia, a family practice physician; and Suraaj Bhatia, a retired mechanical engineer at Caterpillar. 3. We Are What We Eat: The Human Body, Sciences, and Food

How does the food we eat impact our physical health (including our genome) and our minds? What foods has the human body evolved to eat? This class is designed to answer these and other questions related to the impact of diet from the social sciences, health sciences, biological, and clinical perspectives. The foundation of the material is taken from an expansion of a series produced by National Geographic. The class instructor is Marjorie Getz, associate professor, UnityPoint Health-Methodist College, and frequent OLLI instructor and facilitator. (RI/NC)

4. Women Who Cover War

For much of the last century and a half, women had to battle just to be up there alongside men reporting on war. That is no longer the case, but women war



correspondents still face special challenges. We'll learn about these women, what attributes they share, what challenges they've faced, how they compare to their male counterparts, and what special contributions they've made to our understanding of war and its victims. The class instructor is Barb Drake, retired Journal Star editorial page editor, writer, and columnist. (RI/NC)

5. Advance Care Planning – Who Will Speak for You?

National Healthcare Decisions Day (April 16, 2018) is a

day set aside to encourage people to have discussions about their values and how they impact potential health care decisions. This interactive class will help you think about what kind of care you



want, who you would want to make these choices, and the steps you can take to complete advance care planning. It is important for everyone to pick someone to speak for them when they cannot, and to make sure that person knows how to make a decision with which you would be comfortable. Join us and learn how to have this important conversation. The class instructors are Karen Renken, OSF Advance Care Planning Program Coordinator, and Bonnie DePalma of the UnityPoint Health-Methodist's Advance Care Planning Program. (RI/NC)

6. The Economic Law of Moses

The ancient Israelites were the most prosperous people of their time, experiencing an economy that resulted in the first middle-class nation. Virtually unknown in the modern world, this unique and potent collection of economic rules is well laid out in scripture. Jesus railed against their near destruction by his time, and that may have contributed to his execution. We will trace the observance and success of the law using lively narration, visuals, and familiar Biblical stories, from 1200 BC through the law's gradual corruption under the kings. We'll also discover whether some or all of these ancient rules still work in today's very different economies. The class instructor is John Kelly, retired from Morgan Stanley after forty years. (RI/RC)

7. Enlightenment Europe

In this class, we'll learn about the 18th century Enlightenment, also known as the Age of Reason, and how it revived the rationalism, humanism, and secularism of the classical Greeks and Romans in which the natural and physical worlds were seen as knowable and controllable by human minds if reason and the scientific methods are employed. The class instructor is Dr. Gregory G. Guzman, emeritus professor of history at Bradley University. (RI/NC)

8. Getting to Know the Peoria County Sheriff's Department

Sheriff Brian Asbell, Superintendent Ronda Guyton, and Captain Doug Gaa will present four sessions with the goal of sharing the inner workings of the Sheriff's Department. (NIs/NC)

April 4 – Overview of Peoria County Sheriff's Office

We will review the duties and responsibilities of the Peoria County Sheriff's office, including patrol, corrections, court security, and civil process. Additional discussions on issues currently facing the Sheriff's office and community will be discussed.

April II – Peoria County Sheriff's Office Corrections Division

During this class, we will discuss the daily activities and programming within the Peoria County Corrections Division.

April 18 – Law Enforcement Principles and Practices for Managing Dangerous Persons

This class will explain an officer's use of force options, the law, and decision making as it relates to managing dangerous persons. RI = Returning Instructor NI = New Instructor RC = Repeat Class NC = New Class

April 25 – Jail Management

On this day, we will take a closer look at the Peoria County Jail. We will discuss how inmates are classified upon intake, how behavior is managed, and how medical and mental health programs are offered. Additionally, we will discuss programs designed to reduce recidivism rates.

9. How to Listen to Music

David Commanday is the Artistic Director/Conductor for the Heartland Festival Orchestra (HFO), Director of Instrumental Music at Eureka College, and Music Director of Youth Music Illinois. In this class, Maestro Commanday will share insights into how music works, including the physics of musical sound, the elements of musical art, and the psychology of musical expression. You will learn about different types and periods of music, and what is both common and distinct among them. He will also lead a discussion of what you hear, what you do not hear, how you can learn to listen "better," and how you can expand your musical horizons. Optional attendance at the HFO concert on April 21, 2018, will significantly enhance your benefit from the class; tickets will be available at a discounted rate. (RI/RC)

10. Ian Fleming: The Man Behind James Bond

We will study the personal and professional life of Ian Fleming, the author who created super spy James Bond. Attendees will learn about Fleming's wealthy upbringing, his destructive lifestyle, his military career in MI-6, and his literary creation of the most recognizable name in pop culture, James Bond. The class instructor is Chuck Collins, member of the Ian Fleming Foundation. (RI/RC)

II. Legal Services Series

In this series, we will learn about the services provided by Prairie State Legal Services (PSLS), including its pro bono program, nursing home and Medicaid assistance, domestic violence and elder abuse protections, guardianships for grandparents raising grandchildren, and reverse mortgages. The class instructors are PSLS attorneys: Denise Conklin, Kate Whestone, Megan Wood, Aliesha Graves, and Jesse Hodierne. (RI&NI/RC&NC)

Matters of the Heart – and More April 4 – Type 2 Diabetes

Terri Shumway, assistant professor at the OSF College of Nursing, will present an overview of the disease, its symptoms, treatment options, and lifestyle changes that will help control blood glucose. (NI/NC)

April II – Acute Myocardial Infarction (Heart Attack)

Nancy DeHaan, clinical nurse practitioner at the OSF Cardiovascular Institute, will review coronary artery disease, its symptoms, diagnostic tests, interventions, and medications. (NI/NC)

April 18 – Atrial Fibrillation

Gerri Hellhake-Hall, assistant professor at the OSF College of Nursing, will discuss this condition, its pre-disposing factors, symptoms, treatments, and complications. (NI/NC)

April 25 - Heart Failure

Amy Grugan, assistant professor of nursing at Bradley University, will explore the pathophysiology of heart failure, its causes, medications, activity, and how diet changes can impact your health. (NI/NC)

13. Beginning Water Color Pencil

Come join our instructor, Mel Turner, as you learn the basic techniques of water color pencil. Each week will feature a different project designed to fit this one-hour class. A material list will be supplied for the class, and the class is limited to 10. (RI/RC)

14. Elijah and Elisha

As far as prophets go, there are none greater than Elijah and Elisha. Between the two, the hungry were fed, the dead were raised, and the lepers were cleansed. In the midst of their ministries is the story of two very human prophets. Join us as we explore the stories of these prophets and their relationship with God and his people in Israel. The class instructor is Bill Dohle, pastor at St. Paul's Lutheran Church and frequent study group facilitator. (RI/NC)

15. Flying Colors and Pollinator Gardens

As flying colors flutter near flowers in your garden, their

beautiful wings catch your eye! Can you identify what you see? Is it a moth, a butterfly, or a hummingbird? This class will help you learn specific techniques to identify native butterflies in Central



Illinois. The challenge: learn at least five. Butterflies are particular about the plants they visit, thus we will learn about pollinator plants upon which butterflies depend. If you find a caterpillar on one of your plants, this class will teach you how to raise it to become a butterfly. Lastly, we will learn about tropical butterflies, how they are different from natives, and where to view these winged seraphs in our community. The class instructor is Patricia Melaik, retired teacher, Peoria County master gardener, and naturalist. (RI/NC)

16. History of the Future

Many people are fascinated by the future and enjoy speculating about what it might be. This class will study the future as history, a perspective that is rarely explored. We will examine the accuracy of past predictions, thoughts on current predictions, and explore the reasons why some of these predictions were so awful. John Amdall, frequent class instructor and learning trip guide, will share his historical research on the future and thoughts on what can be learned from past predictions. A handout will be provided so that participants can continue to explore the future on their own. (RI/NC)

17. History of Sea Power

In this class, we will discuss sailors, ships, and war at sea, and learn how seafaring and maritime conflicts have shaped human history from ancient times to the present. The class instructor is David Thompson, professor of history at Illinois Central College. (RI/NC)

18. iPad Catch Up

In this class we will catch up with the latest iPad features. Topics covered will include file management, photography and picture organization, the Apple Pencil, finding and keeping online information, the iCloud, essential apps, lifelong learning resources, and the latest tips and tricks to optimize your own iPad experience. Most of the class material will also be applicable to the iPhone. Participants can attend with or without an iPad. The class instructor is Greg Peine, frequent study group facilitator and class instructor. (RI/NC)

19. Literary Lions

April 4 – L. Frank Baum

How many times have you seen the 1939 film *The Wizard of Oz*? Have you ever read the book on which it was based, *The Wonderful Wizard of Oz*, by L. Frank Baum? During this session, we will review Baum's life and learn more about the children's story that the Library of Congress declared "America's greatest and best-loved homegrown fairytale." The class instructor is Roberta Koscielski, assistant director of the Peoria Public Library and frequent OLLI instructor, facilitator, and moderator. (RI/NC)

April II – Annie Dillard

Annie Dillard won the Pulitzer Prize in 1974 at age 29 for her non-fiction book, *Pilgrim at Tinker Creek*. For the next 25 years, she wrote numerous books of poetry, meditations, and memoirs, and received countless honors and awards. And then, she was silent – until last year and the release of her new book *Abundance*. In this class, we will consider selections from *Pilgrim* and discuss Dillard's search for meaning. The class instructor is Jane Hense, retired teacher and school administrator, frequent OLLI facilitator, and chair of the study groups committee. (RI/NC)

April 18 – Anne Frank

Anne Frank was a typical teenager until the German dictatorial government changed her family forever. In this class, we'll learn about Anne from her early years up to the discovery of her secret diary. The class instructor is Jennifer Bass, retired teacher, OLLI president, and frequent OLLI instructor. (RI/NC) April 25 - Kevin Stein, Illinois Poet Laureate Poet, scholar, and retired Bradley University professor of English, Kevin Stein, will discuss the writing process and read selections from his work, featuring a sampling of handwritten postcard poems he has been exchanging with poet Dean Young over the past few vears. The postcards themselves are scissored from boxes of common household items such as Wheaties cereal, Kashi cookies, and Pabst Blue Ribbon beer. On them, Stein's handwritten poems address topics both engaging and springing away from the milieu of social, communal, and cultural ideas associated with the chosen product or brand highlighted on the accompanying postcard. 20. Now What: Nine Years After a Bull Market

In the last nine years since the Great Recession, the stock market and your investments (hopefully) are up from where they have never been. What should you be doing to protect your assets and these gains? What should you be selling? Should you be worried? These are good questions and should be very important to you. Join Carl Williams, senior vice president at Chapin Davis Investments, as he sheds some light on these and other concerns in the market. (RI/NC)

21. Organize and Downsize!

Are you tired of dealing with clutter? Time to downsize? This class, back by popular demand, covers organizing and downsizing basics, including why letting go is so hard, how to manage paper, and strategies to reach your home organizing goals. Participants will be given (optional) weekly "homework," and class discussions will provide opportunities to make progress and learn from one another. Now is a great time to get organized! The class instructor is Kate Varness, CPO-CD®, COC®, MA, owner of Green Light Organizing and Coaching and member of the National Association of Productivity and Organizing Professionals (NAPO) and the Institute for Challenging Disorganization (ICD). 22. Resolving Legal Conflicts – Not Necessarily in a Courtroom

Most people are aware that legal conflicts can end up in a courtroom before a judge and sometimes a jury. Conflicts,

however, can be resolved outside the courtroom. This class will discuss mediation and arbitration as well as civil and criminal court efforts to resolve legal conflicts without a trial. The class instructors are Ed Murphy, mediator and U.S. Government Accountability Office retiree; James Murphy, arbitrator and attorney for 50 years; Doug Stephens, attorney; and Jerry Brady, Peoria County State's Attorney. 23. Those Remarkable Bradford Model T Girls

This course recounts the true story of a group of young, single, and local women who were doing extraordinary things in an era when women were not encouraged to do extraordinary things. They were also having the time of their lives! Based on the book, Darlene's Silver Streak and The Bradford Model T Girls, the author/instructor takes you along on the nine adventurous and historic fun-filled summer vacations of Darlene Dorgan and her friends during the 1930s and early 1940s, always in her faithful Ford Model T nicknamed "Silver Streak." They would meet Henry Ford twice, visit three World's Fairs, and travel coastto-coast, sleeping in country schoolyards, tourist camps, and even jails. The class will include trip photos, letters, and first-hand accounts from interviews with four of the women. The class instructor, John Butte, extensively researched the story and will provide an in-depth view into the trips, the girls, and that old Model T. (RI/RC)

24. When in Rome: As the Romans Did

Everyone knows about the famous Romans, such as Julius Caesar, Augustus, Caligula, and Nero. But did you ever wonder what the ancient Romans were really like? The Roman Empire was composed of as many as 80 million people, most of whom were ordinary people, just like us. What were their lives like? In this class, we will review

the everyday life of the Romans: what they ate, what they wore, where they lived, how they worked, and what they did for fun. The class will be based primarily on the writings of the time and the archaeological findings from the ruins of the Roman Empire. The class instructor is Janene Mattingly, OLLI secretary, retired Latin teacher at East Peoria Community High School, and avid Italy traveler. (RI/NC)

During lunch on April 18, we will have a special panel discussion featuring Dr. Shannon Vallor, department chair of Philosophy at Santa Clara University, and representatives from Bradley's Ethics minor program to talk about virtue ethics and emerging technologies of social media. Her recent book, Technology and the Virtues: A Philosophical Guide to a Future Worth Wanting, provides a groundbreaking application of virtue ethics to the modern condition of community as it is problematized by emerging social media and automated technologies. Dr. Vallor will give a free lecture on campus on Tuesday, April 17, 2018 at 7 p.m. for the 3rd Annual Bradley Ethics Lecture Series, co-sponsored by the generous donations of OLLI members; the OLLI email newsletter will provide additional information about the lecture in mid-March.

25. 10th Judicial Circuit Court

Over the course of four sessions, participants will learn about various areas of the local state court system from 10th Judicial Circuit Court judges.

April 4 – Judge Stephen A. Kouri: Overview of Our System

Judge Stephen A. Kouri will provide an overview of the circuit, our criminal justice system, and felony jury trials. (RI/RC)

April II – Nathan Bach, Public Defender: Role of the Public Defender

Nathan Bach, Peoria County Public Defender, will discuss his role in the criminal court system. (NI/RC)

April 18 – Chief Judge Paul Gilfillan: Secrets of the 10th Judicial Circuit

Judge Paul Gilfillan, Chief Judge of the Circuit, will give a talk on the circuit's organization, operation, structure, and personnel. (NI/RC)

April 25 – Judge Lisa Wilson: Peoria County Problem-Solving Courts

Judge Lisa Y. Wilson will discuss the circuit's specialty courts: veterans, drug, mental health, and DUI. (RI/RC)

26. Animals of the Coral Reef

Judy Greer, scuba diver and underwater photographer for 30 years, will take you on a photographic journey to the extraordinary animals that live on the coral reef. This class will include discussions of many species and their behaviors. (RI/RC)

27. The Drone Revolution: Entrepreneurial Adventures in Drones

Drones are small, unmanned, aerial vehicles that can be controlled remotely or can fly autonomously. In recent years they have become relatively cheap and easy to operate, so their use has tremendously increased. This class will first lay a foundation for understanding drones, their capabilities, and their limitations. The last two sessions will include presentations by teams of Bradley students who are taking a class about drones; they will propose innovative business opportunities based on drones. The class instructor is Bob Podlasek, associate professor of mechanical engineering at Bradley University. (RI/NC)

28. Financial Planning for the Golden Years

It's a common refrain: in life, you can count on two things for sure – death and taxes. In retirement, however, you count on a third – healthcare. In this class, we will review financial strategies retirees can use to plan and prepare for these three inevitabilities. The first week will cover the reasons why everyone needs an estate plan and ways to protect your interests in case of incapacity. Session two will cover charitable giving options and tax control. In week three, we will examine healthcare, long-term care, and retirement communities. Finally, in our last

class, using real-life scenarios, we will look at optimizing financial resources in retirement. The class instructors are Fran McKay, CFP, CRPC, and AAMS, a financial advisor with Edward Jones, and Jeremy Heiple, attorney with Heiple Law Offices. (RIs/NC)

29. *Hamilton*, King of Broadway, and Those Battling the Kingdom

Join Stan Ransom, retired teacher and

frequent OLLI instructor, in an exploration of *Hamilton*, the man and the musical, the other characters in the history of the "ten dollar founding father," and an exploration of the Broadway scene in New York (what's new on Broadway, where to find theater information, and first-hand observations). From brief biographies of Hamilton's family, friends, and enemies, to video excerpts from *Hamilton* and the newest shows of the past six months, we will take a look at the mega-hit, its composer/star, and the New York theatrical scene. (RI/NC)

30. History of the 77th Illinois Volunteer Infantry During the Civil War

The Illinois 77th Volunteer Infantry Regiment, comprised of volunteers primarily from Peoria County, served during the Civil War from 1862 to 1865. The regiment was formed through the efforts of Charles Ballance, under authorization from Governor Yates, in response to a request from President Lincoln for an additional 300,000 troops after the battle at Shiloh. Originally consisting of 882 men, the regiment served through the end of the Civil War. This class will focus on the experiences of the regiment within the context of the overall history of the Civil War. The class instructor is Mark Johnson, retired engineer and past president of the Peoria Historical Society. (RI/NC)

31. ISIS and Modern Islamic Reform

This class will analyze ISIS (Islamic State of Iraq and Syria) in the light of Islamic reform movements over the past

200 years. ISIS is a violent political movement carrying out extreme reforms, but we will learn that there have been several Islamic reformers in modern history who have pursued more constructive, respectful agendas. Participants will discover influential Islamic thinkers and their ideas that shaped Arabic Islamic perspectives on the Western world since the time of Napoleon (1790s). The class will also cover ways to interpret the propaganda of ISIS by analyzing specific statements, and explain why the movement has appeal to some Muslims. The class instructor is Jason Zaborowski, associate professor of religious studies at Bradley University. (RI/NC) RI = Returning Instructor NI = New Instructor RC = Repeat Class NC = New Class

32. Live Big Bands and Dixieland



LEARNING TRIPS

LEARNING TRIPS

Learning trips are educational travel experiences that enable you to interact with experts who offer behind-thescenes looks at area businesses, regional attractions, and domestic / international destinations.

On OLLI trips, you get to investigate and explore with your peers while receiving top-notch customer service – all travel arrangements are organized by staff so you can focus on learning and fun. All land excursions travel via our comfortable, easy-access OLLI shuttles or by charter coach. All trips depart from CampusTown shopping center, near Bradley University, and we provide reserved parking in the lot on trip days.

To make your trip even more enjoyable, please note:

- All learning trip times in this brochure are approximate and subject to change. Please refer to your confirmation handout (mailed upon registration) for specific departure, tour, and arrival times.
- Many of our learning trips require walking and standing in various terrains and environments. To ensure your safety and to respect our hosts' regulations, everyone is required to wear closed-toed shoes on all our trips.

ACTIVITY LEVELS

Each learning trip includes an activity level symbol. **Before** you register, make sure the activity level matches your abilities. This will ensure an enjoyable trip for you and those who travel with you.

- Enter/exit vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.
- Stand for over an hour, climb some flights of stairs, and walk on uneven surfaces, plus all Level 1 requirements.
- Be able to stand and walk for over 2 hours with minimal chance for sitting, be active for an extended period of time, be healthy, mobile, and able to participate in 3-5 hours of daily physical activity, plus all Level 1 and 2 requirements.

Be able to participate in extended walking and standing beyond normal trip expectations, be able to participate in 6 hours of moderate physical activity, plus all Level 1, 2, and 3 requirements.

LOCAL TRIPS

Get to know your community on these half-day excursions to local sites. The price includes meal, shuttle transportation, entrance fees, and tour guides. Detailed itineraries are mailed upon registration. Register early – these trips are usually limited to 28 and fill quickly. **Please note: all times listed are approximate and subject to change.**

ACTIVITY LEVEL

All trips listed in this section may require participants to enter and exit a vehicle with minimal assistance, climb some stairs, stand for up to an hour, and walk a few blocks indoors or out.

1. OSF Richard L. Owens Hospice Home **1** Monday, March 5, 11:15 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

Join us as we tour this peaceful "home away from home" dedicated to serving the terminally ill. Supported by a generous \$2 million donation from Hootie Owens, this hospice care facility is a reflection of the Owens' family commitment to philanthropy. Hootie knew first-hand the difficulties of caring for loved ones with terminal illness, and her gift enabled the facility to be named after her late husband, a former hospice patient. On our tour of Richard L. Owens Hospice Home, the first hospice home in central Illinois, we will learn how the staff provide comfort and support during this difficult time of life. \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

2.Trefzger's Bakery **1** Tuesday, March 6, 8:45 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

Established in 1861, Trefzger's Bakery is Central Illinois' oldest bakery! After a two-year-long restoration project, Trefzger's moved into a building that is almost as old as the bakery itself. The bakery now occupies the first floor of the Trefzger's Building in downtown Peoria Heights, a warehouse building once home to a late-1800s bicycle factory. On our visit, we'll talk with owners Jeff and Martha Huebner, tour the building, and learn how Trefzger's has been a household name in Peoria for generations.

3.The Cookery with Chef Amanda Pyle **1** Monday, March 12, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

On our visit, we'll learn more about the classes it offers on cooking skills that are fun, unique, technique-driven, and designed to take cooking skills to the next level. 4. Hindu Temple of Central Illinois **1** Thursday, March 22, 11:30 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

The Hindu Temple of Central Illinois is Peoria's place of worship for the Hindu faith. Founded in 1994, the Temple serves over 1,000 families with weekly activities and serves as the religious, cultural, and philosophical hub of the Hindu community. During our visit to the facility, located atop the Farmington road hill, we will experience a short tour of the Temple, enjoy a presentation about the beliefs and practices of the Hindu religion, learn about the Sanctum (the shrine inside the Temple), and watch as priests perform a short Pooja (prayer ritual). \$25 – includes lunch, gratuities, tour, and shuttle transportation

5. Creating Collage with Judith Koren-Shanahan **1** Tuesday, April 3, 11:00 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

The art of collage, which means "to glue" in French, emerged in the early 20th century. As we tour her studio, she'll discuss how she combines collage techniques using paint, colored papers, and found ephemera. We'll have an opportunity to create art as we explore the smallest collage form, artist trading cards. No previous art experience is necessary, and all materials will be provided for you to discover your creative self!
