Bradley receives \$10,000 award from Ameritech

Bradley has been chosen as one of five Illinois recipients of a \$10,000 "Ameritech Partnership Award."

The Ameritech award, given to the Multimedia Program in the Slane College of Communications and Fine Arts, will fund the development and presentation of a series of workshops in instructional multimedia content creation for faculty in the College. Faculty chosen to participate in the workshops will consult with colleagues from the Multimedia Program in the planning of instructional projects. Projects will include text, pictures, audio and video media elements. During the series of workshops faculty will learn the techniques of digital editing of each of these media types as well as the process of inserting them within a

multimedia presentation for use in the classroom.

The workshops will be offered starting in the Spring semester.

The award program was developed to encourage the innovative use of technology in higher education at private institutions in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Wisconsin.

Small business centers receive funding

Bradley's small business assistance centers recently received \$278,000 in additional funding from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs.

"There is an increasing demand for services to help companies expand business opportunities and the additional funding will help our centers meet that demand," said Roger Luman, Director of BusinessSource at Bradley.

The programs funded are:

*\$100,000 for the establishment of a new eBusiness Center that will assist small businesses in understanding and developing their eBusiness strategy;

*\$75,000 for the International Trade Center to convert the Certificate in International Business course to an interactive web based course to be

offered through the State of Illinois International Trade Office;

*\$23,000 for international travel including a trade mission to Southeast Europe (Dubrovnik, Sarajevo, Zagreb & Budapest);

*\$50,000 for the NAFTA Opportunity Center to hire an additional Trade Specialist and develop an executive training program on Mexico;

*\$20,000 for the Small Business Development Center to expand the part-time position of Education and Training Coordinator to a full-time position.

The centers which make up BusinessSource provide business counseling, technical assistance, training, and educational activities for existing and start-up businesses.

Orchestra to perform November 19

The Bradley Community Chorus and Chamber Orchestra, directed by Dr. John Jost, will present Mozart's Solemn Vespers, K. 339, and Bernstein's Chichester Psalms on Sunday, November 19, at 3 p.m. in Dingeldine Music Center.

The Solemn Vespers, one of Mozart's greatest works of sacred choral music, is a set of five vesper psalms plus the Magnificat, set for chorus, vocal quartet, strings, trumpets, and timpani. The Chichester Psalms, one of Bernstein's most appealing works, is full

of exuberant rhythms and scored for a full battery of percussion as well as brass, strings, choir, solo quartet, and boy soprano. The piece is sung in Hebrew and sets several well-known psalms including Psalm 23.

Featured soloists on the program include soprano Jenni Carbaugh, boy soprano Kyle Luebke, and eleven select soloists from within the Community Chorus.

Admission is \$5 for adults and free for students.

WCBU completes drive

WCBU FM 89.9 recently completed its fall membership drive raising more than \$76,000. More than 771 people pledged during the drive, 171 of them making their first financial commitment to WCBU.

Thirty-three percent of the funding for the station comes from individual members.
