I. American History We Didn't Learn in School

We'll explore four events from American history that may not have been taught in school or included in our typical textbooks for political or cultural reasons. Recognizing that we only have time to learn a few of these stories during our class sessions, we will cover one event each week that hints at how we haven't always reflected American ideals expressed in the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights. For example, what do we know about the historical treatment of immigrants? What have been the challenges in melting some cultures into the U.S. melting pot? How important is a melting pot in a multicultural society? What lessons can we derive from the events we have studied?

2. Art Appreciation: A Focus on Impressionism and Post-Impressionism



What is art? How do we appreciate it, especially if we don't even like it, and what are the elements artists use to express their work? In this class we will discuss the answers to these questions and explore the cultural influences and events that led to the Impressionist and Post-Impressionist movements. The lives of several artists (and how their lives directly affected their work) will be discussed.

4. Exploring Solar Energy

Why is there such a big push for solar energy now? We'll start by explaining the important terms and current technology,


including various types of solar systems. We will dig into the many solar incentives and financing options, and explore the details of your electric bill. In the last class, we will discuss what happens to used solar panels and take a look into the future. The focus will be primarily on residential solar applications, but will also touch on churches, not-for-profits, farms, and commercial entities. \$30 – Class instructor is Yona Lunken, who has an MBA in Sustainability and Renewable Energy. He is President of Solar Harvest and an adjunct professor for the Bradley University School of Entrepreneurship.

5. How They Do It: Maximizing Impact of Charitable Dollars

In this class, we'll learn how charities maximize the impact of your dollars. We've invited four area organizations

to share how they do it: Heart of Illinois United Way, Community Foundation of Central Illinois, Impact Central Illinois, and ICC Educational Foundation. They will discuss the assessment process of deciding who will receive charitable dollars and how much should be distributed to recipients. They'll also cover how they measure the impact of the charitable dollars distributed. \$30 – Class instructors are Jennifer Zammuto, Heart of Illinois United Way; Stephanie Holmes, ICC Educational Foundation; Mark Roberts and Sarah Fletcher, Community Foundation of Central Illinois; Shelly Weaver and Kristin Zika, Impact Central Illinois.

6. Improving our Health: A Community Responsibility?

The United States continues to have the most expensive healthcare system in the world, but health outcomes are inferior

to those in most other industrialized countries. We know that only 25% of health outcomes are due to medical care. The rest are due to "social determinants" of health which are invariably associated with outcome disparities such as poverty, education level, and geography. The U.S. is the only developed country which does not have universal financial access to care. The payment system is not likely to change in the near future, so if we are to improve outcomes, private health systems must assume some responsibility for addressing social determinants. In this course, we will describe the current system and outcomes, discuss the social determinants of health, and conclude with a panel discussion among local providers and public agencies to determine what can be done locally to improve health outcomes in our central Illinois region. \$30 – Class Instructor is Dr. William Albers, Professor Emeritus of pediatrics and retired pediatric cardiologist at the University of Illinois College of Medicine Peoria.

7. What in the World Does That Mean? **Understanding Political Terminology**

A great deal happens in our world every day, and often the "talking heads" discuss it in ways they assume we all understand. Have you ever heard some term or phrase like "Demagogue" or "Dark Money" but didn't understand exactly what it meant? This course will explore the definitions of common terms used, and misused, to describe what is happening around the world. \$30 - Class Instructor is Angela Weck, Bradley University adjunct faculty and Executive Director, Peoria Area World Affairs Council.

8. Barbarians: The People Who Challenged the Might of Rome

IN PERSON OR ONLINE

The Carthaginians, the Gauls, the Britons, the Germans, and the Goths all fought against the power of the Romans. This class will look at these people whom the Romans called "barbarians" – their heroes, their culture, and their wars against Rome. Were they really barbarians?

\$30 – Class instructor is Janene Mattingly, retired Latin teacher, avid Italy traveler, and frequent OLLI instructor.

9. Exploring the Gospel of Mark

The Gospel of Mark is the earliest written gospel and serves as the source material for both Luke and Matthew. It gives unique insight to the life, teachings, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus from Nazareth. This course will explore this writing from three important areas of interest: first-century historical context, contribution to Christian theology, and Mark's view of Jesus from Nazareth. \$30 – Class instructor is Dr. Rob Collins, senior pastor at First Baptist Church of Peoria.

10. Family Tracks: Learning to **Trace Your Ancestors**

information, records, pictures, maps, and stories - to finally compiling all of this into a published work. We will give you options that will help you follow the tracks of your ancestors.

II. Introducing Bach

Discover Johann Sebastian Bach during our journey through Thuringia, Eisenach, Leipzig, Berlin, and more. In this class we'll learn not only about Bach, but also about the lives of those with whom Bach worked and lived including Handel, Zelenka, Telemann, and others. Thanks to the wonders of technology, emeritus professor Michael Dicker of Illinois State University will share a series of inspiring performances.

12. Peoria Zoo 101

What goes on behind the scenes at Peoria Zoo? This class will cover what it takes to care for over 250 animals! From husbandry to training, to veterinarian care, we'll cover it all. During our final week, class participants are invited to an optional on-site tour of Peoria Zoo, to see firsthand what they have been learning about. Transportation is not included.

\$30 – Class instructor is Julie Brunton, Peoria Zoo Educator.

13. Science and Pseudoscience: A Historical Perspective

Over time, the boundaries of what constitutes science have shifted. For example, groundbreaking giants of science like Isaac Newton and Robert Boyle practiced alchemy as well as modern chemistry and physics. In this class, we will explore how and why the boundaries between science and pseudoscience have changed and how modern scientists define what they do in counterpoint to the fads, fallacies, and hoaxes of pseudoscience. We'll explore the practices, methods, institutions, norms – and even the taboos and exclusions – of science today that are a direct result of the history of pseudoscientific movements. We'll conclude with a discussion where we will try to determine how those boundaries are changing today and why. \$30 - Class instructor is Kathryn Eissfeldt, frequent OLLI instructor and freelance science writer.

14. The Boomer Years: 1945 - 1970

In this class, we'll discuss the various events and changes in the United States during the time period between World War II and 1970, including the multiple civil rights movements, their causes, and results. We'll also explore the growth of the U.S., both military and economic. Finally, we will dig into the impact the "Boomers" had on the country.

In this course, Dr. Elena Gabor introduces the principles exemplified in high reliability organizations by sharing case studies from aviation, wildland firefighting, medicine, and the energy industry. She will discuss the ingredients you can use to build a culture of high reliability based on mindfulness, continuous learning, simulations, and honest reporting, not just for these high-risk industries, but for your life, family, and community.

Independent bookseller Cheryl Langley operates The Book Nook and has consistently made changes to the business model as Amazon and other online sellers disrupt the book industry. She'll discuss how she manages Facebook marketing, book repairs, appraisals, and how independent bookstores have been able to survive the changing market. She will also discuss the history of book selling and book banning. Class instructor is Cheryl Langley, owner of The Book Nook in Peoria.

October 18 - The Leland Report

Jim Burnham brings you a presentation on The Leland Report (lelandreport.com), a website that has collected thousands of dedicated followers over the past 22 years. The Leland Report was started by Jim's father, Keith in 2001 as a family email featuring photos from his new home. With Jim's help, it quickly grew into a "cult" website and book highlighting everything about beautiful Leelanau County, a beloved vacation destination in the upper lower peninsula of Michigan. We will discuss the origins of the website and the creation of the 120-page coffee table book. Class instructor is Jim Burnham of The Leland Report.

October 25 - The Roller Coaster of Retail: A Look Inside a Small Local Business

This class will take an inside look at RC Outfitters/ Running Central's 45-year history in Central Illinois. In doing so, we will candidly discuss the waves of retail highs and lows that have propelled and challenged this company's goals to evolve its customer base and product offerings over the past 15+ years. In May 2023, thirteen Bradley students majoring in Animation, Theatre Production, and Mechanical Engineering spent eight days in Las Vegas for an intensive study in their area of focus: scenic automation, projections, or costumes and props. The class sessions will be centered around Bradley University student experiences with Cirque du Soleil in Las Vegas, where they had the opportunity to learn about these advanced uses of technology. During this class Bradley professor Chad Lowell will provide a history of the program and details of what is involved, and Bradley students will share their specific experiences from the trip, including an overview of some of the most state-of-the-art technology currently being used in the live entertainment field.

Over 400 years ago, English Pilgrims landed in Plymouth, establishing the second permanent English colony in North America. The first colony, Jamestown was started 13 years prior in 1607. Over the next 100 years, 11 more English settlements would be established eventually forming the 13 original colonies. In this class, we will look at reasons the English settlers came to North America, their difficulties in getting here, hardships they faced, issues encountered in settling lands already occupied by others, and how these colonies grew and eventually prospered. We will primarily focus on the first colonies of Jamestown in Virginia, and Plymouth and Massachusetts Bay in Massachusetts. We will also learn how their success led to the establishment of the other 11 colonies.

Barbara Kingsolver was named one the most important writers of the 20th Century by Writers Digest. She was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for her most recent novel *Demon Copperhead*. Kingsolver was born in 1955 and grew up in rural Kentucky, spent two decades in Arizona, then moved to southwestern Virginia where she currently resides. Class instructor is Jennifer Jacobsen-Wood, Peoria Public Library.

October II - Terry Pratchett

Sir Terence David John Pratchett was an English humorist, satirist, and author of fantasy novels, especially comical works. He is best known for his Discworld series of 41 novels. Pratchett's first novel, *The Carpet People*, was published in 1971. Class instructor is Sarah Couri, Peoria Public Library.

Alyssa Cole is an American author of historical, science fiction, and contemporary romance novels. Her stories include diverse casts of characters with a variety of professions, from Civil War spies to modern day epidemiologists. 



3. The Five Things You Need to Know About Volcanoes
Cascades Volcano Observatory
Thursday, November 16

As eruptions at Mount St. Helens in 1980 and 2004-2008 have taught us, Cascade volcanoes can reawaken quickly and erupt, with significant consequences for people, communities, and the environment. The United States Geological Survey (USGS) Cascades Volcano Observatory (CVO) in Vancouver, Washington, monitors ten volcanoes along the Cascade Range. Scientists develop a baseline for what it means when a volcano is at normal background levels of activity and are ready to act if they detect early signs of unrest. What happens when a volcano reawakens? What hazards should we expect? What steps can we take to be prepared? USGS geologist Liz Westby will talk about her work at CVO to monitor volcanoes, understand and communicate hazards, and build resilience in communities likely to be affected by the next big event. DRIVING ON TRIPS

We encourage all of our trip participants to use OLLI's shuttle transportation, as many of our trip sites have limited parking and require the group to arrive at one time. Plus, traveling as a group allows for more socializing!

GUESTS/INVITE A FRIEND

We encourage members to bring a friend to enjoy an OLLI class for one session at no charge. If you have a friend who has never been to OLLI classes and would like him or her to attend as your guest for one session, please contact our office at (309) 677-3900 at least one day in advance so we can have a list of available classes prepared for the visit. It is important to reserve this privilege for those who haven't yet experienced OLLI classes.

PROGRAM DETAILS and PARKING

For all programs an email will be sent prior to the event regarding specific details on times, location, and parking. For learning trips, we provide reserved parking in the Campustown shopping center, 1200 W. Main (across the street from Bradley). Most study groups meet at locations throughout the Peoria area and have ample parking. We have a park and ride option for classes (see parking for classes).

PARKING FOR CLASSES

We offer a "park-and-ride" option so you can park in large lots near campus and enjoy drop—off service at the front door of the Michel Student Center. Information will be mailed with your class schedule.

If you choose to park at Shea Stadium, located near the Ag Lab at the corner of University and Nebraska avenues, an OLLI shuttle will transport you to and from campus. If you park at Westminster Presbyterian Church, 1420 W. Moss Avenue, the OLLI shuttle will transport you to and from campus. Volunteer parking coordinators are located at both sites to assist you with your parking needs.

Because OLLI provides park-and-ride service, OLLI members are not allowed to park anywhere on campus (including the Visitor's Lot) or in Campustown. If you park in these areas and receive a ticket, you will not be eligible for an appeal and will be required to pay the fine.

CLASS PARKING PERMITS

For our members taking classes who have state—issued handicapped placards or license plates AND are physically unable to utilize our door—to—door shuttle service from Shea Stadium and Westminster Church, we have a very limited supply of handicapped—accessible parking permits for use during classes. At a cost of \$10 each, these permits allow you to park in a handicapped or white—lined space on campus for all four class dates. All requests must be made via telephone to (309) 677-3900 three weeks prior to the first day of in-person classes. When you call, please be prepared to provide your license plate number, your placard number and expiration date, and the make, model, year, and color of your vehicle.

SCHOLARSHIPS
