


American Rescue Plan Act - FUNDING DISTRIBUTION

Bradley University has received grant funding in the amount \$5,542,391 from the American Rescue Plan Act - Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF III) for emergency financial aid grants to students. ARP - HEERF III requires that Bradley University prioritize students with exceptional need.

Distribution Methodology for Eligible Students

Bradley University has chosen a sliding scale based upon enrollment, the expected family contribution (EFC), and guidelines noted in the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund III Frequently Asked Questions provided by the U.S. Department of Education to prioritize students with exceptional need. Bradley University will issue HEERF III financial aid grants to students in the following increments based upon the need determination.

Each Bradley University student receiving a HEERF III financial aid grant will be notified in an email from cares@fsmail.bradley.edu. The eligible student must acknowledge the need for a financial aid grant and opt in to receive it. To opt in, the student will click (<https://forms.gle/9qNfix8769dU57aCA>) and provide the requested information and electronic consent. Students must opt in by Tuesday, December 7, 2021 at 5:00 pm. Once the student's electronic acceptance and consent is received, Bradley University will complete the HEERF III financial aid grant distribution process.

Students who select to have the HEERF III financial aid grant applied to their student account will see the grant amount added directly to their student account. Students who consent to receive a check will have the discretion to determine what costs should be covered with his or her financial aid grant funds. Checks will be mailed directly to the student at their home address of record.

Emergency financial aid grants may be used by students for any component of their cost of attendance or for emergency costs that arise due to coronavirus, such as tuition, food, housing, health care (including mental health care) or child care. Students determine how they may use their emergency financial aid grant within the allowable uses.
