Andy Kindler: I move to approve the minor addition for Electrical and Computer Engineering.

Ahmad Fakheri: Can somebody speak to the requirements, who is eligible, etc?

Dean Kris Maillacheruvu: This is not the first minor we've had in the College of Engineering. We had the construction minor approved last year.

Suruz Miah: There is demand from students for this. They would like to take these courses. There are three courses they need to take for this minor. It is well defined in the documentation that was submitted.

Ahmad Fakheri: There is a particular level of rigor required for these courses, and I worry that the rigor isn't there. Is differential equations required?

Suruz Miah: No

Ahmad Fakheri: This is my concern. This is a slippery slope.

President Stern: Any further discussion?

Ahmad Fakheri: I move to postpone the minor in Electrical and Computer Engineering to the March 27, 2025 University Senate meeting. (motion seconded)

Andy Kindler: What is the rationale for the postponement?

Ahmad Fakheri: I cannot articulate the rationale well now but when I see an electrical engineering major, I know the rigor that individual has been subjected to. I want to ensure we have the same rigor with the minor.

President Stern: According to our handbook, a postponement can be made by two members. It can also be overturned by a 2/3 vote. As of right now, we are postponed.

Suruz Miah: I motion to cancel the postponement.

Jim Muncy: Second.

President Stern: Any discussion to not postpone?

Kristi McQuade: What is the impact of postponing?

Suruz Miah: It won't impact much. We have been noticing demand for this minor. We went through several meetings, and we determined differential equations is not essential for the minor. Students can take basic courses to get some hands-on experience.

President Stern: All those in favor of reversing the postponement say aye. All those opposed, signify by saying no. (call for a hand vote, need 2/3 to reverse the postponement)

President Stern: Any discussion to the adjustment on the 2027-2028 Academic Calendar? Seeing none, we will vote. The amended 2027-2028 Academic Calendar was approved by unanimous voice vote.

Andy Kindler: The other item is the 2028-2029 Academic Calendar. This is not in our catalog yet. No changes for this, it's identical to past catalog listings.

President Stern: Any discussion to the 2028-2029 Academic Calendar? Seeing none, we will vote. The 2028-2029 Academic Calendar was approved by unanimous voice vote.

## **VII. Unfinished Business**

### **A. Proposed changes to Section D Internal Operations in Faculty Handbook**

Originally submitted for consideration in November. Please see attached document.

Kristi McQuade: The handbook rewrite committee put together a series of proposed changes to Section D and presented those in November. Travis is displaying that document which was sent out with the agenda. This is an updated version of the document shown in November with a third column describing the motivations/explanations for changes. This was shared with Jon Michael, Daniel Moon, and Erin Kastberg, among others. On Monday, Mat Timm, Libby Tronnes, Travis Stern, and I met with the members of the handbook committee and Jon, Daniel, and Erin to go over their requests to modify our proposal. Because they are away at the Board of Trustees meeting, we agreed that we would make some of those requests as amendments. It's a little confusing but we had a short turnaround time to put this together. I'd like to go through our proposed changes and then address the amendments.

I'll propose the first amendment. The goal of these changes is to better align with the AAUP guidelines. To appease administration, we amended our proposal as shown in green.

David Daye: Second

Danielle Glassmeyer: Can you shed some light on why they requested the softer language used in the green highlighted text?

Kristi McQuade: I don't want to comment without administration here.

[Allowing non-senator Mat Timm to speak (no objection)]

Mat Timm: I want to emphasize something that Kristi said. When we were asked by President Jon Michael and Erin Kastberg to present these amendments, we made it clear we would not speak to those amendments.

Kristi McQuade: We were not asked to make these amendments. We offered to make these amendments to move the proposal forward and make the compromise rather than delaying by another month.

Jim Muncy: What is the consequence of delaying this another month?

Kristi McQuade: The handbook rewrite is working on another set of changes we would like to propose but this will further postpone those changes we would also like to make.

David Daye: I know you all say you won't speak to the amendments. I'm curious how we are being asked to consider this without administration here. You won't speak to the amendments. Did you have issues with the things you are amending here today?

Kristi McQuade: I agreed to only make amendments that I would agree to. We aren't proposing every amendment they requested, we are presenting the amendments we are okay with.

Ethan Ham: I can't digest this. I wish this had been circulated so I could look at it and absorb it.

Kristi McQuade: This document has been circulating since November. There are only a few changes in green we are putting forward as amendments.

Mat Timm: The administration gave us 45 hours to try to digest what they proposed as amendments. We were able to meet for 45 minutes yesterday to try to massage their language into something that we could in good conscious present to this body. The delay is not on the faculty side.

David Daye: We recognize the fault is not on the faculty and we do not want to delay anymore. I just don't see how we can decide to amend when no one can speak to the changes or answer questions about the process.

Kristi McQuade: We are not doing the bidding of the administration. We are presenting amendments that are minor in nature.

Danielle Glassmeyer: I think there may be guidance in Robert's Rules. If I wanted an amendment made and I wasn't here to speak to it, I would expect you all to not take it seriously. In terms of that issue, I would say this is a minor reversal. I was on the handbook committee at one point. It was so incredibly slow and so many delays. The process of delaying could be a sign of disrespect for this faculty body. This is a simple amendment. We don't want to go back to what was in the handbook.

Mat Timm: It's not the Handbook Committee or Senate Exec that controls the handbook. It is up to this body to decide what is in this document. Once the body makes the decision, I am willing to abide by that decision.

Kristi McQuade: If this body approved all the changes, the President and Board of Trustees still have the right to reject our changes. It seems clear why they won't want the first change we proposed. Our group thought it was best to move forward to get the amendments approved.

Ahmad Fakhri: If we accept all the changes in green, will the handbook be better than what it is currently?

Kristi McQuade: Absolutely, or our group would not have agreed to work on this and get a vote today.

President Stern: Any further discussion to accept the language in green? This is an amendment to the original motion. Any Discussion? Seeing none, we will vote to accept the language in green for Amendment 1. All those in favor of accepting this amendment, signify by saying aye. All those opposed, signify by saying no. The amendment passes.

Kristi McQuade: I motion to approve Amendment 2 as signified in green.

President Stern: Do we have a second for this motion? (Megan Rimmel seconded). Approved by unanimous voice vote.

Kristi McQuade: I motion to approve Amendment 3 as signified in green.

President Stern: Do we have a second for this motion? (David Daye seconded). Approved by voice vote.

Kristi McQuade: I motion to approve Amendment 4 as signified in green.

President Stern: Do we have a second for this motion? (Megan Rimmel seconded).

Megan Rimmel: What does “other key stakeholders” mean?

Kristi McQuade: I think it’s just a replacement for “others who are appropriately interested”. That’s all I can say.

Landon Williams: Shouldn’t there be language saying specifically the Board of Trustees, the faculty, the staff, and the student body president should be brought on to the process?

Adalia Yeung: I motion to amend the amendment to state “the faculty, staff, students, and other key stakeholders”. (seconded)

Libby Tronnes: Elsewhere in the handbook it talks about the selection of the President. Is what we are doing now conflicting with that language? Changing language in one area means we have to think about how that impacts other areas. If we vote on the amendment to the amendment, it will impact other parts of the handbook.

Kristi McQuade: This section of the handbook is about joint effort and joint determination which is focused on faculty. I am unsure if we want to be so prescriptive here.

Ahmad Fakheri: The original amendment is more broad. This change forces them to something specific.

President Stern: All those in favor of the language in blue, the amendment to the amendment, signify by saying aye. All those opposed, signify by saying no. The amendment to the amendment fails. Back to the original amendment. Any discussion? We will now vote on this amendment. Approved by voice vote.

Kristi McQuade: I motion to approve Amendment 5 as signified in green.

President Stern: Do we have a second for this motion? (David Daye seconded).

Jacqueline Henderson: Is that language “the Board of Trustees has full power” in their bylaws?

Kristi McQuade: That’s what we were told.

Megan Remmel: The top part is just moving location. So if we voted against it, it is still in the handbook?

Kristi McQuade: Right, we just proposed to move it, not delete it.

Ahmad Fakheri: I wonder if the second sentence will conflict with another part of the handbook. That, at any time the Board can decide to reject any change we make.

Libby Tronnes: They already have plenary power.

Ahmad Fakheri: I motion to delete the second sentence.

David Daye: Does that language exist somewhere else in the handbook? Is it new language?

Kristi McQuade: It does not exist somewhere else in the handbook.

Jim Muncy: It seems to me that this would give the University lawyers a lot of ammunition to hurt the faculty, to give the Board full power.

David Daye: Does the Board already have this power somewhere in our governing documents?

Kristi McQuade: In the faculty handbook, no.

President Stern: Any further discussion to the amendment to the amendment? Seeing none we will vote. The amendment to the amendment passes by voice vote. Let’s vote on the original amendment. The amendment passes by voice vote. We are back to the motion for the overall handbook change approval now incorporating the language in green. Any discussion? The handbook changes are approved by voice vote.

## **VIII. New Business**

President Stern: Any new business for the order?

Rustin Gates: I would like to put forth a resolution to this body.

Megan Remmel seconded.

David Daye: Is our goal that they would include a faculty representative on every board committee or on board committees? I think that’s an important distinction.

Ahmad Fakheri: I think it’s an aspiration to have a representative on all committees but even one is better than what we have now.

Danielle Glassmeyer: Would it be possible for the Senate President or Senate Vice President to discuss recent changes so we are aware of what is happening to give a little bit of the history?

President Stern: I can speak to my experiences, but the recent Past President is on sabbatical. I have not been given access to most materials at board meetings. I am provided with an agenda, board reports from the staff council and student body president. During the meeting I can see what is projected or discussed. That is all I have access to.

Mat Timm: When I first started on Senate, Gary Roberts was coming in as the new President of the University. At that time, only the president of the University Senate attended Board meetings. Due to lack of communication between the campus community and the Board under the President prior to Gary Roberts, the Board adopted a new structure. Board meetings used to be two days long. The first day was subcommittee meetings. I as Senate President and the Student Body President used to be witness to those subcommittee meetings and we could provide input. In effect, when I was Senate President the first item, we had faculty input on every single subcommittee on the Board. I did not get to go to the Executive Committee meetings, unfortunately. Gary Roberts did eventually agree to invite the Vice President of the University Senate to the Board meetings. Gary Roberts also regularly held parties, social events, dinners, as part of the Board meetings. My wife was allowed to attend with me, if she desired. Also at those parties were a large group of invited faculty. So, there were more opportunities for faculty engagement with the Board members. When Steve Standifird came in, the structure of the Board meetings changed almost immediately. They became one day affairs, and the Senate President would only attend for a half day and not attend the subcommittee meetings. This resolution is asking to return, at least in part, to past practice.

President Stern: All those in favor of accepting the resolution, signify by saying aye. All those opposed, signify by saying no. The resolution passes. Any further new business?

Melvy Portocarrero: I am here to read a resolution on behalf of Jackie Hogan: Senate Resolution Regarding University Communications

Adalia Yeung seconded the motion.

President Stern: All those in favor of this resolution, signify by saying aye. All those opposed, signify by saying no. This resolution has passed by voice vote.

## **IX. Open Forum**

Discussion for the common good without attachment to a motion. Meeting rules of Decorum still apply. Items discussed are recorded for the meeting minutes.

President Stern: Any discussion for the good of the body?

[Allowing non-senator Ryan Reed to speak (no objection)]

Ryan Reed, Chair of Political Science and International Studies: Any issue regarding academic freedom has recently arisen in my department. One faculty member received 65 media requests

during the first Trump Administration to explain complex issues to the public. In the past two weeks, the University seems to be restricting media access to faculty. A member of our faculty agreed to a routine request to interview with a local TV network. The faculty member let Libby Derry know they did an interview, but Ms. Derry responded to the producer that the interview was not to be aired and no member of Bradley faculty should be contacted for comment. She said some topics “are a bit too hot to touch”. Another instance occurred a week later when another faculty was contacted by a reporter to explain another topic as a subject matter expert. Ms. Derry responded enthusiastically to the email but contacted the reporter later to explain that she should be contacted first to approve who can be contacted. I urge you all to consider the seriousness of this issue with the media policy.

Mat Timm: There have been a lot of recent announcements from the Trump Administration. Some of that has to do with monies reaching Universities. What is our exposure to federal funding sources?

Kristi McQuade: I think it’s important that people should be aware of the breadth of the impact. I’m a PI on a federal grant that we are unsure will be funded.

Ahmad Fakheri: What authority does Libby have over the faculty? What sanctions can we impose on the faculty for expressing our views?

Jessica Nigg: Is there any update on pictures on AcInquire?

Ethan Ham: This was brought up at the last academic council. IT is trying to find something to solve the issue.

Kristi McQuade: This is a response to Ryan coming from a different perspective. We should all think about what the role of Bradley University should be right now in terms of educating our community. This may be a good topic for our next open discussion.

Melvy Portocarrero: Can we request an update on the communications policy for the next meeting?

President Stern: We certainly can.

David Daye: Can we request Libby Derry to come to the Senate?

President Stern: We can request. I do expect the Interim President, the Interim Provost, and CFO will be at the next meeting.

[Allowing non-senator Patricia Saleeby to speak (no objection)]

Patricia Saleeby: As an extension, not only talking to the press, but many of us serve on many international and global committees. My work has been immediately affected. I was recently asked for comment and I did not provide comment. Should we censor ourselves? This is of concern to me.

Jim Muncy: It seems unwise to me that we would limit our media exposure, even if we say something controversial. Some companies build their entire reputation on controversy. It contributes to the revenue crisis. Limiting media exposure is bad for the brand.

Cyle Metzger: To speak publicly, at least for me, a scholar who is centered on trans-studies, with a President who said these people cannot exist, there is also an obligation of the University to have some stance on what kinds of protections scholars like myself need. There is a need to protect a particular group or protect different groups uniquely. What is the University willing to do to protect faculty in particular?

**BU Senate Resolution to Increase Communication Between Faculty and the Board of Trustees**

WHEREAS: Establishing mechanisms for and a culture of communication between University stakeholders encourages transparency, builds trust, and promotes collaboration.

WHEREAS: Effective communication among stakeholders is necessary to establish and enact a shared vision and mission for the University.

WHEREAS: The Bradley University Faculty Handbook states that “It is the responsibility of all constituent elements of the University to strive to fulfill its educational goals, and it is equally the responsibility of all constituent elements to prescribe a method for reviewing objectives and to cooperate in implementing any changes in objectives.”

WHEREAS: The Bradley University Faculty Handbook states that “Primary responsibility to establish educational goals and to initiate action to change goals rests with the Faculty.”

WHEREAS: The American Association of University Professors (an authority on standards for higher education) describes communication between the Faculty and the Board of Trustees as a critical component of shared governance whose absence can result in “serious misunderstanding between campus constituents and in significant governance failures leading to flawed decision making” and recommends that every standing committee of the Board should include a faculty representative.

WHEREAS: Restricting communication between the Faculty and Board members limits the Board’s ability to recognize and strategically address problems facing the University.

WHEREAS: Until very recently, the President of the Bradley University Senate was provided a copy of the agenda and relevant material discussed during the general Board of Trustees meeting and/or access to the online database, BoardEffect.

WHEREAS: Until very recently, the President of the Bradley University Senate attended all Board of Trustees meetings in person (regardless of location) and was invited to attend Board meeting dinners.

WHEREAS: Until very recently, a second faculty member (either the Immediate Past President or the current Vice President of the University Senate) was invited to attend Board of Trustees meetings, and additional faculty were invited to Board meeting dinners.

WHEREAS: These recent changes have resulted in a decrease in meaningful interactions and communication between faculty and the Board of Trustees.

BE IT RESOLVED that we, the Bradley University Senate, respectfully request that the Board of Trustees agree to

1. Include a faculty representative on Board committees
2. Restore the University Senate President’s access to Board meeting agendas and other relevant materials
3. Include the Immediate Past President or Vice President of the University Senate in Board meetings in addition to the Senate President

**Senate Resolution Regarding University Communications**

Whereas, many students, faculty, and staff are experiencing heightened anxiety and uncertainty amidst recent national events; and

Whereas, heightened anxiety has a negative impact on student learning and retention and on student, faculty, and staff wellbeing; and

Whereas, many other institutions of higher learning across the nation have issued non-partisan messages of support to their campus communities; and

Whereas, Bradley's Mission, Vision and Values recognizes that "our differences are our strengths;" that we are committed to creating a "diverse, caring, and inclusive environment;" that "our community [is] built upon the valued relationships we find in each other;" that we empower students to build "lives of purpose and advance a better world;" and that "alongside our dedication to students, we embrace the generation, application, and interpretation of knowledge;" and

Whereas, some in the Bradley community interpret the administration's silence as a failure to live up to our stated Mission, Vision and Values;

Be it resolved that the University Senate calls on the administration to issue a campus-wide communication affirming Bradley's values and upholding our commitment to support all of our students, faculty, and staff, and to defend academic freedom, which is the bedrock of Bradley's educational excellence.
