

Join OLLI for a performance of *Bright Star*, a musical at Peoria Players community theater. Inspired by a true story and featuring the Tony-nominated score by Steve Martin and Edie Brickell, *Bright Star* tells a sweeping tale of love and redemption set against the rich backdrop of the American South in 1945-46 with flashbacks to 1923. A PT Experience Tour

Experience Bradley University's new Glen and Polly Barton Clinic for Fitness and Function, opened in fall 2025. Our tour will be led by Dr. Stacie Bertram, Bradley alum and the first faculty member hired for the Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) program. Discover how the DPT program's exceptional 100% graduation, licensure, and employment rates reflect its strengths in hands-on training, expert mentorship, and real-world clinical practice. The Barton Clinic is a pro-bono facility offering free, evidence-based physical therapy to uninsured and underinsured members of the Peoria community. Staffed by faculty and DPT students, the clinic provides high-quality care and gives students invaluable experience.

Peoria's Past Revealed:

A Guided History Tour

Led by longtime Peoria educator and community leader Mike Plunkett, this engaging bus tour uncovers the stories that shaped the city. We'll begin at Trefzger's Bakery, then travel along scenic Grandview Drive to admire its iconic historic homes and sweeping river views. We'll see the Dan Fogelberg Memorial, explore historic High Street, and stop at sites connected to Peoria's past as a once "wide open city," including the location tied to Bernie Shelton's murder. This tour traces Peoria's remarkable transformation from a rough-and-tumble river town into an All-American city.

Over the past three seasons, this nest has successfully fledged four eaglets. Spotting scopes provided by the Peoria Audubon Society will offer excellent views of the

anticipated 2026 arrivals. If you have them, bring your binoculars, and your enthusiasm for this memorable eagle experience

From its beginning in 1929, Gamma Phi has established itself as a unique performance troupe, supporting acrobatic and circus arts in higher education, and continuing the legacy of circus history in the state of Illinois. We'll also visit the Circus and Allied Arts Collection – which contains over one million items ranging from books (their oldest circus book dates to the 1500s), performance contracts, cashbooks/ledgers, correspondence, and still images in a variety of formats from glass plate negatives to Kodachrome slides. We will finish our tour with a unique opportunity to observe a practice session to see how collegiate circus performers learn their skills.

this guided tour, Dr. Lally will demonstrate key investigative techniques used in modern crime labs—including fingerprint analysis, ballistics testing, bloodstain pattern interpretation, and trace evidence collection. During this outdoor experience, we will take a guided walk through the "sugar bush" to learn the science and history behind tapping trees. We will visit the sugar shack to see the evaporator in action, watching the fascinating process of boiling clear sap into amber syrup. Of course, we'll finish with a tasting of Camp Wokanda's fresh, pure maple syrup.

Our host, Kendra Knobloch, will explain breeding, foaling, sourcing food, medical care, training to harness, showing, and even what happens to composted manure.

**Malvern Lane in the Spring with
Dan Callahan**

Explore early season flora on Malvern Lane, a vestige of Peoria's past located off Moss Avenue. Spring ephemeral wildflowers bloom in abundance on the hillsides flanking this brick

corridor. Catch a glimpse of dogtooth violets, trout lilies, Virginia bluebells, and white violets. The lane remains the most intact connector between the bluff and the valley of the half dozen originally built. We'll also stop by Westminster Presbyterian Church, an architecturally significant house of worship built in 1898 with many innovative features. Don't miss the opportunity to explore this mostly hidden street.

Springdale Cemetery 

Tuesday, May 5

8:45 a.m. – 1:30 p.m.

In the 1850s Peoria was a growing community and needed a new cemetery. Three gentlemen, who owned land along the river bluffs north of the downtown, felt their land was perfect for a park/garden style of cemetery then popular in the United States. Incorporated in 1855, Springdale Cemetery is the oldest chartered cemetery in Illinois. With over 70,000 burials, Springdale stories tell the history of Peoria. On this OLLI trip you will hear some of that history while also learning about the various styles of burial and cemetery art on display in Springdale. Our guide is Bernie Drake, OLLI member and Peoria Historical Society tour guide.

Root Cemetery with Dave Pittman ◇◇◇

Tuesday, May 26

8:45 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Root Cemetery offers a remarkable opportunity to explore geology, biology, and human history in one quiet, meaningful landscape. Guided by David Pittman, this walking tour invites participants to slow down, observe, and connect across time. Shaped by massive glaciers and catastrophic Ice Age floods, the land reveals evidence of moraines, wind-blown loess soils, and the former path of the mighty Mississippi River. As we walk, Dave will discuss how beneath our feet lies a rare 2.5-acre savanna ecosystem, once common across Illinois, now preserved with native grasses like big bluestem and Indian grass, wildflowers, and butterflies that tell the ecological story of the prairie's past and future. Interwoven with this natural history is the human story: Indigenous peoples, early French and American settlers, and nearly 150 pioneer burials dating back to 1833, including Civil War veterans whose lives shaped early Chillicothe.

Greater Peoria Sanitary and Sewage Disposal District ◇◇◇

Wednesday, May 27

8:45 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

The Greater Peoria Sanitary and Sewage Disposal District (GPSD) is a special governmental unit organized in 1927 to treat sewage before it is discharged into the Illinois River. During our visit, we'll learn how wastewater is collected and treated in the 700 miles of pipes, find out how the plant treats an average of 25 million gallons annually*, and take a look at how the laboratory monitors the treatment process in order to meet the federal requirements.

Earthmoving Legacy Center in Elkader, Iowa with Pat Sullivan ◇◇◇

Wednesday, April 29

6:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m.

Join Peoria's very own Pat Sullivan as we travel to the quaint Midwestern town of Elkader, Iowa where the Irish Kelleher family immigrated in the 1700s. We will begin our tour at the Earthmoving Legacy Center, a 38,000 square foot facility that showcases the rich history of earthmoving. Their collection spans from the 1880's to 1940, focusing primarily on the evolution of the Caterpillar Company and showcases early tracktype tractors from Caterpillar, Holt Manufacturing and C.L. Best Manufacturing. Next, we'll stop at Mobile Track Solutions (MTS) to get a behind-the-scenes look at their construction-grade equipment solutions and learn more about how they design, research, test, produce, and assemble their products all in-house. We will also have the opportunity to meet John Moyna, owner of Mobile Track Solutions.

Perhaps without fully realizing it, we in the United States are fortunate to have many healthcare experts who write clearly and thoughtfully about issues that affect us all. Atul Gawande, MD, a professor of surgery at Harvard Medical School, is one of them. In *Being Mortal*, his most recent book, Gawande reflects on an era in which the relationship between doctor and patient is “increasingly miscast in retail terms.” He asks how difficult it is for doctors—trained to solve problems and to succeed—to acknowledge when no cure is possible. Even more poignantly, he asks how many physicians, accustomed to telling patients how to live, are prepared to talk with them about how to die. Our group will meet with students from Methodist College enrolled in a gerontology course to explore *Being Mortal* alongside additional resources to deepen our understanding of the profound intimacy of life’s final stage.

**First, Fearless, and Faithful:
Learning from Jeanette Rankin**

Jeanette Rankin was a suffragist, peace activist, workers' rights advocate, and champion of democratic reform. She ran for Congress twice as a Republican and was elected 34 years apart—a remarkable achievement. Rankin remained faithful to her beliefs, no matter the personal cost, even while serving within what was then the largest "old boys' club" in America. She was the first woman elected to the U.S. Congress. Rankin voted against U.S. entry into both World War I and World War II; during the latter, she was the only member of Congress to oppose going to war with Japan. During her first term, she introduced legislation that later became the 19th Amendment to the Constitution, granting women the right to vote. We'll learn more about this pioneering woman as we read and discuss *Winning the Earthquake: How Jeanette Rankin Defied All Odds and Became the First Woman in Congress* available online, through local libraries, and booksellers.



In this class, we will look at the tools in an archaeologist's "toolkit," how archaeologists choose where to excavate, and the techniques they use to determine the dates of their discoveries. This basic introduction to archaeology will help you better understand archaeologists and their work. Many of the examples in this class will come from the instructor's own excavation experiences in Israel

Breaking the Surface: Female Marine Scientists and their Deep Sea Discoveries

Writer Zora Neale Hurston called research "organized curiosity." Throughout history, the ocean has been a constant subject of curiosity, speculation, and imagination because until very recently, it has been all but inaccessible. Water covers 70% of the earth, yet we know more about surfaces of other planets than we do about the seafloor. In this class, we will encounter the work of several scientists who have peeled back layers of that mystery to reveal incredible discoveries across a range of fields such as marine biology, hydrology, geochemistry, coastal ecology, animal behavior and cognition, and marine engineering and technology. Across four sessions, we will cover notable trailblazers, as well as lesser-known figures whose insights have changed the way we think of the ocean and its systems.

Follow in the footsteps of R. E. Lee and U. S. Grant in the last sixteen months of the Civil War. Understand their challenges and opportunities - their strategies, tactics and resulting battles - from the Wilderness to Appomattox. Also, while in the neighborhood, side tours to the Fredericksburg battlefield, Hollywood Cemetery (Richmond), and other bonus surprises. To quote the Duke of Wellington - The worst thing in life is losing a battle - the second worst is winning a battle!" Or, a quote Yogi Berra wished he said - "Total war is okay - in moderation." This class is based on the extensive study of the Civil War by Peter Barclay, a Brit among us Yankees, who will also share insights from a week-long guided tour focused on events at the end of the Civil War. \$30 – Class instructor is Peter Barclay, amateur historian with focus on the American Civil War.

U.S. Stock Markets – The Lost Decade (2000–2010) – Will it Repeat?

This class will focus on what happened during the tech bubble and valuations of the markets between 2000-2010 and contrast current market valuations and environment. As we move into an era of AI (artificial intelligence) and robust technology advancement- will the stock markets react in a similar way they did during DOT COM Era and the Tech Bubble bursting? Will AI truly add the productivity many investors have priced in? We will learn different market valuation tools and compare these metrics of the past tech bubble to today's environment. What will you conclude about the next decade of stock markets.. Will the lost decade repeat, or will we continue to see new market highs?

Vivandière, Spies, Nurses and Others: Women's Roles in the American Civil War

Delve into the diverse roles women played during the American Civil War, moving beyond traditional battlefield narratives to uncover the critical contributions of women on both sides of the conflict. From nurses, spies, vivandières, and camp followers to abolitionists and even disguised female soldiers, women shaped the war's course and legacy in ways too often overlooked. We will begin with the U.S. Sanitary Commission, staffed with women who provided services and provisions to the troops. We will spotlight well-known figures such as Clara Barton and Harriet Tubman, as well as the stories of lesser known but equally courageous women, such as Susie King Taylor and Kady Brownwell. We will also cover African American women's experiences as they faced both racial injustice and war.

One hundred years later, these debates continue. This course explores why the trial happened in Dayton, how Bryan and Darrow became involved, what occurred in the courtroom, whether *Inherit the Wind* reflects reality, who won and lost, and why it still matters today.

You can find OLLI's new offices on the first floor of Westlake Hall, the stately building with the clock tower. It was the second building constructed on campus by Lydia Moss Bradley in 1897. There is a reserved OLLI visitor parking space on Tobias Lane (behind the building) and you'll find it's a short walk from on-street parking along Bradley Avenue. I hope you find it welcoming and convenient. This home is temporary until the University decides on a new location. We are hopeful OLLI will land in an even better space for members and staff. Stay tuned.

Membership hit a record number in 2025 – nearly 1,300 participated in a wide variety of our programs. That is a phenomenal testament to your engagement and the hundreds of volunteers who work to develop the offerings. If you've got an idea for a class, a study group or learning trip, please pass it along.

Your commitment to OLLI is also demonstrated by your giving. In the last year, 41% of our members made a contribution, either through participating in Trivia Night, buying OLLI socks, a nametag, or a T-shirt, or making a direct gift – the highest percentage ever. That support is the envy of Bradley University and OLLIs across the country. Thank you for making our OLLI the best in the country.

Last year we kicked off our inaugural Voices & Visionaries speakers series with Dr. Robert Ballard, the oceanographer who found the Titanic. PROGRAM DETAILS and PARKING

For all programs an email will be sent prior to the event regarding specific details on times, location, and parking. For learning trips, we provide reserved parking in the CampusTown Shopping Center, 1200 W. Main. Study groups meet at locations throughout the Peoria area and have ample parking.

PARKING FOR CLASSES

We offer a "park-and-ride" option so you can park in large lots near campus and enjoy drop-off service at the front door of the Michel Student Center. You may choose to park at Shea Stadium, located near the Ag Lab at the corner of University and Nebraska avenues or Westminster Presbyterian Church, 1420 W. Moss Avenue, and the OLLI shuttle will transport you to and from campus. OLLI provides park-and-ride service, because OLLI members are not allowed to park anywhere on campus, including the Visitor's Lot. If you park on campus and receive a ticket, you will not be eligible for an appeal and will be required to pay the fine.

CLASS PARKING PERMITS

For our members taking classes who have state-issued handicapped placards or license plates AND are physically unable to utilize our door-to-door shuttle service from Shea Stadium and Westminster Church, we have a very limited supply of handicapped-accessible parking permits for use during classes. At a cost of \$10 each, these permits allow you to park in a handicapped or white-lined space on campus for all four class dates. All requests must be made via telephone to (309) 677-3900 three weeks prior to the first day of in-person classes. When you call, please be prepared to provide your license plate number, your placard number and expiration date, and the make, model, year, and color of your vehicle.

SCHOLARSHIPS

You now have an entire week to request as many programs as you'd like, "no hurry, no stress."

- Instead of immediate registration, **you will request programs at any time throughout the Registration Request week**, and later pay for those for which you've been registered.
- NO Payment due** during registration week!
- IMPORTANT NOTE:** February 10, you should **receive an email with your list of programs** and directions for payment. This email will come from Bradley Cont Ed: continue@continuing.bradley.edu
- When registering online**, instead of clicking "Add to Cart," **you'll click "Request Program."**
- IMPORTANT:** The order in which you request programs will determine their priority. As you check out, your cart will say "remove from waitlist" (rather than "remove from cart") as you are technically on a waitlist until after the allocation has been run.

- Need help prioritizing your programs?** Consider the maximum number of participants for each program (listed in the description) and follow the general order of the registration page. For example, if you're excited about a trip, a movie, and a seminar, we recommend prioritizing the trip first because it has fewer seats available.
- After Registration Request Week, the system will be temporarily closed** while requests are processed. Once participants are notified of their program status, **registration will reopen on Wednesday, February 11**. At that time, registration is open as usual on a first-come, first-served basis by selecting "Add to Cart" and paying at checkout.

CANCELLATION POLICY

OLLI's cancellation policy was designed to encourage our members to carefully consider their personal availability for events. This thoughtful scheduling will allow peers who wish to participate a chance to do so. Extenuating circumstances will be handled on a case-by-case basis. Membership fees are non-refundable.

- \$10 minimum cancellation fee.

Learning Trips

- \$10 minimum cancellation fee.
- If you cancel the day before or day of trip, entire fee forfeited.
- Local trips: if you cancel and your spot is filled from waitlist, remainder of fee refunded. If you cancel and your spot cannot be filled, entire fee forfeited
- Regional trips: partial refunds may be given, less any expenses prepaid by OLLI.
- Multi-day trips will abide by their own cancellation schedule, given at the time of payment.

OLLI Originals and OLLI Online

- OLLI Originals and OLLI Online over \$15 will follow the learning trip cancellation policy. There are no refunds for programs \$15 or under.

Study Groups

- \$10 minimum cancellation fee.
- The remainder of the study group fee will be refunded if you cancel at least 7 business days before the start of your group.
- Entire fee will be forfeited if you cancel less than 7 business days before the start of your group.
