Curious about how Artificial Intelligence can support your learning journey? We'll start with ChatGPT, a conversational AI that can answer questions, explain complex ideas, and even help brainstorm creative projects. Along the way, we'll look at other recent advancements and share practical examples of how these tools can spark curiosity, make research easier, and open up new ways to keep learning at any age. No technical background is required - just bring your curiosity!

The Islamic Foundation of Peoria (IFP), established in 2000, serves the religious needs of the growing Muslim community in the Peoria and Dunlap areas. 

Under the direction of the Catholic diocese, Sophia's Kitchen is located next to historic St. Joseph's Church. After our visit with Sophia's Kitchen, we'll visit St. Joseph's Church, a house of worship built in 1878 that features an 1896 Lancashire Marshall organ.

Their revolutionary sound reshaped the way we think about sex, politics, art, drugs, work, and everyday life. Together we'll explore the lesserknown history of the band, uncovering the cultural forces that gave rise to their worldwide phenomenon. With the clarity of hindsight, we'll consider how England shaped the Beatles, and how the Beatles, in turn, reshaped England and the world. But this isn't just history - it's also personal. What do the Beatles mean to you? Bring your thoughts, memories, and reflections to enrich our discussions as we dive deep into the songs that defined a generation. Kennedy vs. Nixon: Power, Politics, and the Battle for America

Born just a few years apart, they entered Congress together in 1946, rose from starkly different backgrounds, and eventually faced off in the 1960 presidential race, where the first televised debates and one of the closest popular-vote margins in U.S. history forever changed American politics. Their careers left legacies that still shape the nation today. We'll go beyond the familiar headlines to uncover the men behind the myths: Nixon, scarred by poverty and family loss, and Kennedy, wracked by hidden illnesses and private struggles. Together, their stories reveal not only how power is won - and lost - but also the human cost of ambition. From their first campaigns to Watergate, we'll revisit an epic struggle that still reverberates more than fifty years later.



The Harpers Ferry Raid: John Brown, Ardent Abolitionist

After a history of violence to promote abolition in Kansas in 1856, he and his followers undertook a daring raid on the federal arsenal in Harpers Ferry, Virginia, to obtain weapons to carry out his plan. This raid, considered one of the key events leading to the U.S. Civil War, failed and yielded many questions: Why did some friends refuse to participate? Who were the "Secret Six" who provided financial support? Why were the New England intellectuals supportive at the time? History has, for the most part, treated Brown like a martyr rather than like a villain, and we will explore why.

Online Fees and Details:

- National Osher Online \$65 per class.
- Each class consists of six 90-minute sessions which meets six consecutive weeks.
- These are live lectures via Zoom and are NOT recorded.
- The Osher NRC manages the courses and will communicate directly with registrants. You will receive an email that will include an Osher Online username and password as well as a link to the Osher Online Website, through which you will access your classes.
- Space is limited per Osher Institute be sure to register early.

The American Revolution Beyond the British Empire Saturdays, January 17 - February 21 12:00 - 1:30 p.m.

This course reframes the American Revolution as a global event shaped by imperial rivalries and geopolitical forces. Each session focuses on a different group - Germans, French, Spaniards, South Asians, and others - revealing how their experiences intersected with the collapse of British rule in North America.

\$65 - Richard Bell, PhD, is Professor of History at the University of Maryland and author of Stolen, a finalist for the George Washington and Harriet Tubman Prizes. His latest book, The American Revolution and the Fate of the World, was published in 2025.

Invisible Intelligence: The Unseen Algorithms **Reshaping Your Daily Life** Thursdays, January 15 - February 19 4:00 - 5:30 p.m.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) shapes our daily lives in subtle, yet powerful, ways. In this non-technical course, we will explore six case studies that reveal how AI systems work, the ethics behind machine decision-making, and the impact of these technologies on our world.

\$65 - Eliot Bethke is a Ph.D. candidate in computational bioengineering at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

Judaism, Christianity, and Islam: A Comparative Exploration Thursdays, January 29 - March 5 12:00 - 1:30 p.m.

Explore the rituals, beliefs, and writings of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam through a comparative lens. This course examines where these Abrahamic religions overlap and diverge, offering insights into their shared monotheistic roots and unique traditions.

\$65 – Jeremy Fackenthal, PhD, is an independent filmmaker and nonprofit director. He holds a PhD in Philosophy of Religion and Theology from Claremont Graduate University.

Einstein without Tears: His Theories Explained without Math and in Everyday Language Tuesdays, January 27 - March 3 4:00 - 5:30 p.m.

Explore the fascinating world of Albert Einstein's theories—no math or science background required. This course introduces key ideas like time travel, warped space, black holes, and gravitational waves, all in accessible terms. We will discover how modern science continues to confirm Einstein's predictions.

\$65 - Andrew Fraknoi is the former chair of the astronomy department at Foothill College. He is lead author of OpenStax Astronomy, the most widely used free introductory astronomy textbook in North America.

Pharmaceuticals and Poisons: Chemistry at the Edge Thursdays, January 22 --February 26 2:00 – 3:30 p.m.

Some substances heal, others harm—and some do both. This chemistry-rich (but non-technical) course explores the fine line between pharmaceuticals and poisons. We will examine drug development, venom-inspired medicine, and the history of FDA regulation shaped by scandal and reform. From aspirin's industrial roots to Gila monster hormones, participants will uncover the fascinating, sometimes unsettling chemistry behind what we choose to swallow.

\$65 – Johnnie Hendrickson, PhD, a Professor in the School of Molecular Sciences at Arizona State

University.

History of Sicily Mondays, January 26 – March 2 12:00 – 1:30 p.m.

Sicily has been a mythic crossroads of heroes, conquerors, and culture for over 3,000 years. From Odysseus and the Arabo-Norman Golden Age to the Mafia and modern mythmakers like Garibaldi and Coppola, Sicily's story is rich, complex, and central to Western history. This course explores its pivotal role in shaping civilization.

\$65 – Douglas Kenning, PhD (University of Edinburgh), has taught world wide and offers dynamic lectures on Mediterranean civilizations and leads small-group tours exploring history, myth, and culture.

Seats available: 13

Japanese History through the Lens of Shōgun Tuesdays, January 20 – February 24 6:00 – 7:30 p.m.

Inspired by the 2024 FX mini-series Shōgun, this course explores Japan's transition from civil war to peace between the 15th and 18th centuries. We will examine the rise of key unifiers, the roles of diverse social groups (like merchants, peasants, women, and outcasts), and the era's political, cultural, and artistic shifts. For fans of the series or those new to Japanese history, this course offers a rich, accessible introduction.

\$65 – Megan McClory is a doctoral candidate in history at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. A Global Research Fellow at Kokugakuin University, she has spent years living and studying in Japan and holds a BA from Brandeis University.

How the US Immigration System (Usually) Works Fridays, January 16 – February 20 10:00 – 11:30 a.m.

Immigration has always been a complex and emotional issue in US history. This course explores how the immigration system has evolved and how it works today. We will examine key questions about identity, belonging, and national responsibility while engaging in thoughtful, constructive conversations about the future of immigration policy in the United States. \$65 – Michele Waslin, PhD, is Assistant Director of the Immigration History Research Center at the University of Minnesota–Twin Cities.

Seats available: 13

Post Impressionism and the Birth of Abstraction Mondays, January 26 – March 2 4:00 – 5:30 p.m.

This course explores Post-Impressionism's bold departure from naturalistic light and color, focusing on the expressive use of form, symbolism, and vivid, often unnatural color. Through the work of Cézanne, van Gogh, Gauguin, Seurat, and Matisse, we will trace the movement's challenge to artistic norms and social value.

\$65 – Lauren Weingarden is Professor Emerita of Art History at Florida State University. Her work explores the intersections of literature and visual art in 19th-century culture.

Osher Integrative Health: Navigating Chronic Illness in a Complex Healthcare System Fridays, January 30 – March 6 2:00 – 3:30 p.m.

This course, presented in partnership with the Osher Collaborative for Integrative Health, features expert speakers from their upcoming national conference, Navigating Chronic Illness in a Complex Healthcare System. Participants will explore how integrative health approaches can address the challenges of living with chronic conditions and help individuals make informed choices within today's increasingly complex healthcare environment. Topics will focus on whole-person care, patient empowerment, and practical strategies for managing long-term health concerns.

\$65 – The Osher Collaborative for Integrative Health is a national network of academic health centers dedicated to advancing whole-person care.

It is important to reserve this privilege for those who haven't yet experienced OLLI classes.

PROGRAM DETAILS and PARKING

For all programs an email will be sent prior to the event regarding specific details on times, location, and parking. For learning trips, we provide reserved parking in the CampusTown Shopping Center, 1200 W. Main. Study groups meet at locations throughout the Peoria area and have ample parking.

PARKING FOR CLASSES

We offer a "park-and-ride" option so you can park in large lots near campus and enjoy drop-off service at the front door of the Michel Student Center. You may choose to park at Shea Stadium, located near the Ag Lab at the corner of University and Nebraska avenues or Westminster Presbyterian Church, 1420 W. Moss Avenue, and the OLLI shuttle will transport you to and from campus. OLLI provides park-and-ride service, because OLLI members are not allowed to park anywhere on campus, including the Visitor's Lot. If you park on campus and receive a ticket, you will not be eligible for an appeal and will be required to pay the fine.

CLASS PARKING PERMITS

For our members taking classes who have state—issued handicapped placards or license plates AND are physically unable to utilize our door—to—door shuttle service from Shea Stadium and Westminster Church, we have a very limited supply of handicapped—accessible parking permits for use during classes. At a cost of \$10 each, these permits allow you to park in a handicapped or white—lined space on campus for all four class dates. All requests must be made via telephone to (309) 677-3900 three weeks prior to the first day of inperson classes. When you call, please be prepared to provide your license plate number, your placard number and expiration date, and the make, model, year, and color of your vehicle.

SCHOLARSHIPS

OLLI class scholarships are available for persons who cannot afford membership fees, but who have an interest in learning and wish to participate. WAITLISTS

Many of our programs, especially learning trips, fill quickly. If you find a program full at the time of your registration, please ask to be placed on a waitlist so you can be called when another member cancels or if we are able to increase the program's seating capacity.

In the rare case that Bradley University is closed due to inclement weather, all OLLI programs scheduled for that day will also be cancelled. Please refer to local television and radio stations for closing information.



WINTER 2026 REGISTRATION

What Do I Need to Know About the New Registration Request Week?

- Instead of immediate registration, you will request programs at any time throughout the Registration Request week, and later pay for those for which you've been registered. When registering online, instead of clicking "Add to Cart," you'll click "Request Program."

 IMPORTANT: the order in which you request programs will determine their priority. As you check out, your cart will say "remove from waitlist" (rather than "remove from cart") as you are technically on a waitlist until after the allocation has been run.
- Waitlist placement is assigned by priority level. For example, if 40 people have selected "Trip 1" as their first choice but there are only 28 seats available, the remaining 12 people will be placed on the waitlist.
- When prioritizing your programs, consider the maximum number of participants for each program (listed in the description) and follow the general order of the registration page. For example, if you're excited about a trip, a movie, and a seminar, we recommend prioritizing the trip first because it has fewer seats available.
- At any time during Registration Request Week, you can log into your account, go to My Account > Course Priorities, and update the priority order of your list. Be sure to click "Save Priorities."
- After Registration Request Week, the system will be temporarily closed while requests are processed. Once participants are notified of their program status, registration will reopen on **Wednesday, November 12**. At that time, registration is open as usual on a first-come, first-served basis by selecting "Add to Cart" and paying at checkout

CANCELLATION POLICY

OLLI's cancellation policy was designed to encourage our members to carefully consider their personal availability for events. This thoughtful scheduling will allow peers who wish to participate a chance to do so. Extenuating circumstances will be handled on a case-by-case basis. Membership fees are non-refundable.

Classes

- \$10 minimum cancellation fee per person.
- The remainder of your class fees will be refunded if you cancel before first day of classes. No refunds will be processed if cancellations are made after the start of classes. Extenuating circumstances will be handled on a case-by-case basis.

Learning Trips

- \$10 minimum cancellation fee.
- If you cancel the day before or day of trip, entire fee forfeited.
- Local trips: if you cancel and your spot is filled from waitlist, remainder of fee refunded. If you cancel and your spot cannot be filled, entire fee forfeited
- Regional trips: partial refunds may be given, less any expenses prepaid by OLLI.
- Multi-day trips will abide by their own cancellation schedule, given at the time of payment.

OLLI Originals and OLLI Online

 OLLI Originals and OLLI Online over \$15 will follow the learning trip cancellation policy. There are no refunds for programs \$15 or under.

Study Groups

- · \$10 minimum cancellation fee.
- \$35 will be refunded if you cancel at least 7 business days before the start of your group.
- Entire fee will be forfeited if you cancel less than 7 business days before the start of your group.
