IX. New Business A. Proposed University Policy on Awarding of Posthumous Degrees

Upon the request of the deceased student's family, a posthumous baccalaureate degree may be considered by the Academic Regulations and Degree Requirements Committee, if at the time of death, the student was enrolled in a degree program, was in good academic standing, and had entered his or her senior year.

Upon the request of the deceased student's family, a posthumous graduate degree may be considered by the Academic Regulations and Degree Requirements Committee, if at the time of death, the student was enrolled in a degree program, was in good academic standing, and had completed two thirds of the credit hours required for graduation.

The Academic Regulations and Degree Requirements Committee will consider the family's request, verify eligibility for a posthumous degree, and forward its recommendation on granting the degree to the Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs for approval.

Upon the Provost's approval of granting the degree, the appropriate commencement program and the student's academic record will note that the degree was awarded posthumously. The diploma will be presented to the deceased student's family by the President of the University.

Death that results from unlawful activity on the part of the deceased student may result in disqualification for a posthumous degree.

I. Call to Order

II. Announcements

- A. The Senate President attended the two-day Board of Trustees meeting, except the strategic planning meeting between the Board and Keeling & Assoc. He participated in all sessions and had good discussions. The student representative and Nathan Thomas brought concerns to the Board as well.
- B. Since the last meeting, the Senate President has met with the University president and provost and athletic director.
- C. Request to faculty, please post mid-term grades when requested. About 65-70% of the faculty post mid-term grades.
- D. Jobie Skaggs has additional administrative duties and will be stepping down as Bradley's IBHE faculty member. The substitute will be Matt O'Brien. We will vote on this matter under new business.

III. Approval of Minutes

A. Senators Jean Marie Grant moved to approve the minutes of the First Regular Meeting of the 2016-2017 Senate, September 15, 2016 and Thomas Palakeel seconded. Minutes were approved.

B. The Second Regular Meeting of the 2016-2017 Senate was canceled.

IV. Reports from Administrators

- A. President Roberts
 - a. Letters will be going out informing some Bradley employees that they are being reclassified as non-exempt due to changes in the rules and regulations of the Fair Labor Standards Act. Those making less than \$47,476 must be classified as non-exempt. About 100 people will moved from exempt to nonexempt status. Those employees will have to keep track of their time and will be entitled to overtime if they work more than 40 hours per week. No one is valued any less and there is no change in compensation. The president will send an email to the entire campus explaining this to everyone after letters to affected staff go out.
 - b. Some people contacted the president shortly after the election to remind people to remain respectful of everyone, etc. The president drafted something but hasn't sent anything yet. There were only three incidents reported of inappropriate behavior: two were off-campus, one was in the library. The President's experience is that sending a message might cause people to question why they are being reminded about behavior. If incidents occur, the university will take steps to discipline.
 - c. Convergence Center update. This is a huge project and will be the largest in Bradley's history. The architects are in the process of completing construction

drawings. The President and Gary Anna will be meeting on December 6, 2016 with J.P Morgan and PNC Bank. The Board must decide in February whether this project is approved. If so, the process should begin in May 2017. People will be relocated, Baker demolished, construction beginning near the end of summer, with the hope of completion in summer of 2019.

- d. Founder's Room. The former president had use of this room pretty restricted. The President would like to be less restrictive, but it should be used for something truly special. Please don't encourage people to inundate the President with requests.
- e. Financial picture. The President thinks we are in pretty good shape, factoring in the Convergence Center construction. We need to keep enrollment numbers up. The assumption is at least 1080 freshmen each year. The President will talk about financial projections more in spring 2017.
- f. No questions were asked at the end of the President's report.
- B. Senior Vice President of Academic Affairs and Provost Zakahi
 - a. "Coffee with the Provost" was held on Wednesday, Nov. 9, 2016. About 20 people attended. The Provost will hold this on different days of the week. There is no particular format, but the first coffee resulted in Q&A with the Provost. One topic was Baker Hall transition. A memo was distributed a few weeks ago to campus. We will be losing the second busiest classroom building for two years. Campus town space will become available and will offer three additional classrooms. Media will be added to a couple of rooms in the basement of the Alumni Center so they can be used as classrooms. There is also some room available in the Markin Center. Not all space will be replaced so we will have to use the full schedule of the day, including some classes as early as 7:30 a.m. Everyone will have to bear some pain for this process. Every college has a liaison working with Linda Pizutti.
 - b. The Provost handed out hard copy of the 2012-17 Strategic Plan Accomplishments Summary, which had been sent previously as a digital file. Bradley has had some very meaningful accomplishments as a result of the current plan. We are just beginning a new strategic planning process. Bradley has secured the services of Keeling & Assoc., a consulting group for higher education that the Provost has worked with before. Several companies were asked to send proposals and the Strategic Planning Committee recommended hiring Keeling. The creation and writing of the next strategic plan will be a inclusive and transparent process. Keeling & Associates have been on campus once. They will be back in late November. Senate Executive Committee has been asked to identify some senior and junior faculty members to meeting with Keeling. They will be here a total of five times. There will be other groups of faculty, staff, students, and department chairs meeting with Keeling. The third or fourth visit will be a campus-wide forum to provide feedback on work-todate. Keeling will develop a set of themes determined from the visits with constituencies and will share at the forum. The Strategic Plan developed should guide the institution for next five years.
 - c. Educational Advisory Board [EAB], will be helping us with student advisement and student success. This is a three-year pilot which can be

expanded to five years. We will share our data with them. EAB will take an analytics approach to data and provide guidance for advisement for students and will provide us with some data we have a difficult time assembling. Andy Kindler has been instrumental in providing data for this project. The Provost believes strongly in data based decision-making. A lot of change is being worked on now and Provost knows it creates uncertainty. Faculty and staff are urged to reach out to chairs, dean, and provost if necessary. Timeline for hiring EAB was too short to engage in as much consultation and transparency as the Provost would like.

Jenna Dellaria was in class so Nathan Thomas gave her report. First, the Student Senate continues to work on a smoke-free referendum. Student Senate sought feedback from a number of constituents. They are working with students on some transgender issues and will be preparing some recommendations on that. Student Senate is also working on a joint cabinet meeting between Student Senate and President Roberts' cabinet.
