3. Waitlist Policy Proposal

Discussion:

- (1) Issues with present wait list policy:
 - 1. Freshman has less time to work out their schedule since early registration opens to them at a later date.
 - 2. For those with registration HOLDs, they cannot register until the HOLD is removed. No quality schedule for them. These are likely to be students at risk. It is an equity problem as well.
 - 3. For those who change schedule or major, they cannot even get on the wait list.
 - 4. The wait list information is not transparent or clear to students and departments

(2) See the wait list proposal for details.

Summary: Timeline: Students can be added to the wait list until billing date; departments process their waitlist by study day; Recommendations: 19 hours cap for wait list; Financial HOLD should be not be a registration HOLD;

Discussion: These are recommendations to C&R. (Financial HOLD recommendation may not be under the purview of senate; (it is financial service related). Departments Process wait list and communicate with students. Need more transparence and communication. Shannon from IT helped a lot so that the committee knows what the system can do.

This message directs you to the administration's response to the Senate Resolution passed in December of 2021. We believe the most efficient way to convey the background and current state of the transformation is through a narrative, Bradley University – Response to Senate Resolution which is available on the Strategic Plan 2021 resources website. Within the body of the narrative, you'll find hyperlinks to two Huron authored documents. The first one is to the Huron Report Summary February 2021 document we shared some months ago and has been available on the Strategic Planning website for some time. The second, Huron Report Summary March 2021 document comes closest to providing the information requested by the Senate. Please note that Huron has shared their work product with Bradley in PowerPoint (pptx). There is not a single document that could be referred to as the "Huron Report." Finally, we plan to review and discuss all of these documents in detail with the Senate Resources Committee as soon as we can find a mutually agreeable time.

2. Motion: Add a Shared Governance Committee as a standing senate committee. (see attached, p.38)

The motion was on the floor in last meeting.

Discussion:

Jenny Burge, Wendy Schweigert, Meg Frazier, Ahmad Fakheri, Kristi McQuade, Simon Petravic, Eden Blair, Dan Matisa, Danielle Glassmeyer participated the discussion.

Motion to allow Jenny Gruening Burge to speak on the senate floor The motion carries unanimously.

(1) Concern on the name of committee

- (2) High learning commission criterion 5: shared governance at the institution engages its internal constituencies including its governing board, administration, faculty staff and students through planning, policies and procedures
- (3) Remove the staff portion from the committee charge. The committee only responds to faculty handbook, which does not include staff. Not to mention that there are on-going work from staff advisory council.

Other discussions notes:

(1) If there concerns about handbook, there are already committees to address that. If something requires a greater attention, those committees can deliver that to senate, senate exec and senate president. Questions can be brought to university administration during the senate meetings as well.

Amendment Motion: change the name to faculty governance committee (remove "staff", "shared", "senate" from the name) and remove "staff" from part c.

Eden Blair (motion), Zach Gorman (2nd)

Amendment discussion:

There was a comment to change the name to university governance committee. There was a suggestion to reconsider it, instead of amending it many times.

There was a comment that: during the pandemic, there were discussions that the senate should be university senate.

The majority voted NO to the amendment. The amendment does not carry.

- Continue the discussion of motion on the floor to add the committee
- (1) There was a suggestion to redraft the proposal to consider things discussed in this meeting.
- (2) Other comments: Support staff on presence in senate. At one point, the senate attempted to include staff. The negotiation broke down. Urge to send it back to the drafter, and find ways to unify, rather than fragment, the employee sectors within the university. Should provide equality and equal access to governance.

Motion: Yield the floor to Kim Berhll Nathan Thomas (motion), Andy Kindler (2^{nd}) The motion carries unanimously.

Appreciate the concerns to have more inclusive for staff in the university. Staff advisory council is tasked by President Standifird to look into options to give staff more shared governance. Understand the issue occurred in senate about a year ago. We are hoping to create something in parallel. Appreciate if the committee proposal can be redrafted.

Motion to refer this to the senate exec committee Meg Frazier (motion); Wendy Schweigert (2nd) The motion carries unanimously.

Q&A:

Megan Remmel, Molly Gribb, Daniel Glassmeyer participated the Q&A session.

Q: ISU opens college of engineering. what does that mean to our college of engineering and resource allocation?

A: President Standifird: That was no surprise. We knew it is coming. It means that we need to make sure we differentiate our programs. We have very high-quality programs. Convergence is very unique. That's not something ISU can do it easily. Graduate engineering program is growing. Just need to be very thoughtful about how we differentiate our engineering programs from other programs. I am very optimistic about engineering programs. We already have the challenge with U of Illinois. That challenge exists. They open up their enrollment pipeline. We are aware of that.

Molly Gribb (Dean of CCET and FCB): Creating new engineering programs is something happens all the time. The biggest differentiator of our programs is that we have a much broader suite, and we are working in integrating engineering and business in a very meaningful way. That would be really powerful. Industrial partners have been asking for that for some time now. Yes. It is a challenge, but it is also an opportunity. I am here to help.

Q: Faculty are very grateful for the completion of salary initiatives;How about exempt employee and adjunct faculty? All categories employeesA: 2% salary increase was for all full-time employees except senior leadership. We are very

enrollment dependent. It is 100% under our radar. We continue looking into it. How to address this issue really depends on financial stability of university. Right now, the trend is pretty good. Application and admitted numbers are up. It looks very positive. We will pace it out.

B. Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs Zakahi

(1) First day complete from B&N

Some students have to make decision on textbook vs food or other spending. Through this program, all students have their textbooks on the first days of their classes. It will be built into tuition. About \$23/credit hour; it is also a part of financial aid. Adopting more expensive textbooks will drive price as

well. The earliest year to adopt the B&N program will be Fall 2023, if we go with the plan.

(2) Incentive-based budget.

Deans have developed and already turned in their budget. It is grounded in the incentive-based budget. I made presentations to chairs in each college about the incentive-based budget. I had a face-to-face forum this week and will have a virtual forum for all including online faculty members.

The outcomes of incentive-based budget:

- Unprecedent level transparency (colleges, departments, and cross the institution)
- More college level decision making than we had. Deans will be regional CEOs. They have more control on faculty and staff positions.
- PRC (personnel review committee)
- College level carry forward if they outperform their budget (assuming university is not in RED): less spending, or generating more (bring more students)
- College should have a thoughtful plan in a strategic way
- A designated pool for institution deferred maintenance
- \$1.2 1.5 M for institution strategic investment
- A budget committee to make recommendations about spending in the institution (committee members: Chair of university resource committee, 1 senior leadership, academic Deans)

O&A:

Kristi McQuade, Ahmad Fakheri, Danielle Glassmeyer, Meg Frazier participated the Q&A session.

Q: Is there any other textbook model?

A: We have an existing long-term contract with B&N; in the future could be someone else

Q: Averaged cost. It might be a disadvantage to some students. Also questions about physical copy or electronic copy.

A: Don't have a solution to resolve it. It is an averaged cost to be fiscally feasible.

Q: Is there any survey students from which college have problems in buying books?

A: attracted to the idea that all students have textbooks in day 1.

Comments: There are some complementary programs existing. For example, Illinois has an open-education resource network.

It is also suggested that the Provost will give a presentation to provide details of incentive-based budge to the senate.

Some time around the Fall 2018 semester, the Committee on Contractual Arrangements received the following charge:

On behalf of the Executive Committee of the Senate, I request that you make a recommendation to the Senate regarding the academic rights of non-tenured or non-tenure track faculty. They normally do not participate in the tenure and promotion deliberations, and do not vote on the chair election. What rights they are extended to seems to vary across the campus, for example do they have the right to attend faculty meetings and/or vote on academic matters?

In response to this charge, the Committee carefully reviewed the Faculty Handbook for any language relevant to the rights of full-time non-tenure track faculty, and found such language to be largely absent. The committee therefore collaborated to draft a proposal to modify the Faculty Handbook to clarify the rights and responsibilities of full-time non-tenure track faculty, and this proposal was presented to the University Senate in March of 2019. The proposal generated considerable debate on the Senate floor, and the issue was sent back to the committee for further consideration.

The Committee's progress on revising the proposal was delayed by other pressing issues as well as the COVID-19 pandemic, but we now submit a new proposal to the senate that, we hope, eliminates the concerns expressed in March 2019.

b. Full-time and part-time positions not eligible for tenure, consisting of the following ranks (removed for editorial reasons):

The workload for non-tenure track faculty, including teaching, scholarship/creative production, and service, should be the result of a mutual agreement between the faculty member, Department Chair, and College Dean (see Section II.B.2.D).

Full-time non-tenure track faculty are expected to deliver quality instruction, and as such, have the right to participate in curricular development if they so wish. If enfranchised by 2/3 of their department's tenure-track and tenured faculty, a full-time non-tenure track faculty member who agrees to be enfranchised may also participate in other departmental shared governance proceedings (see Section III.A.3). The nature and duration of the enfranchisement are determined by the faculty member and the department. Full-time non-tenure track faculty cannot evaluate, nominate, or vote for the tenure or promotion of tenure-track and tenured faculty.

Full-time non-tenure track faculty can be granted permission by the Dean of their college to participate in shared governance at the college level.

Full-time non-tenure track faculty are eligible for membership in the University Senate (see I. E. Article II) and can be granted permission by the Senate Executive Committee to participate in other forms of shared governance at the University level.

Requirements For The B.S. Degree

In order to receive the Bachelor of Science degree, students must successfully complete at least 15 hours of courses selected from mathematics, computer science, and the natural sciences. Meeting the requirements to graduate in 8 semesters is a challenge for many of our students. There is hardly any wiggle room. Not counting MTH 109 for B.S. credit creates an added hurdle. In particular, this creates a challenge for our students who start as STEM majors but switch to non-STEM majors and for our students who cannot afford to take summer classes.

It sounds like we have been using Degree Audit Exceptions for some time to address this issue on a case-by-case basis. Even though these are rare instances, a formal policy is preferred. The policy should be consistent with our current practice.

It remains the case that MTH 109 students will need to take a BCC QR course, since MTH 109 does not count toward QR. A College Algebra course and a QR course together meet the mathematics requirement described in the Illinois Articulation Initiative.

The department of economics along with the Foster College of Business Executive Committee request that ECO 335 - Managerial Economics count as a Bachelor of Science (B.S.) credit. Currently, ECO 335 is the only FCB Core Requirement for Quantitative Skill Building (https://www.bradley.edu/academic/undergradcat/20212022/fcba-fcba.dot) not to be credited with B.S. status.

ECO 335 was added as an option for the Quantitative Skill Building requirement starting in the fall of 2017, but was inadvertently not added as B.S. credit like ML 353 and QM263. Due to this oversight, students who take ECO 335 as their Quantitative Skill Building requirement do not meet the minimum hours of B.S. credit for graduation.

Other economics department courses that count for B.S. credit include ECO 221, ECO 222, QM 262, QM 263, and ECO 319.

- Online participants must scan and submit exams on their own.

Shared Governance Committee of the Senate

- 1. The function of the **Shared Governance Committee of the Senate** shall be to:
 - a. To promote the enhancement of shared governance, through enhanced collaboration between faculty and administrators and propose specific suggestions to the senate to achieve its charge
 - b. Receive reports from the Senate Tenure Promotion and Dismissal Committee, the Grievance Committee, and the Faculty Ombuds, with particular focus on issues related to compliance with the Faculty Handbook on the cases they handled, and the outcomes of those cases
 - c. Receive reports from faculty and staff related to compliance with the Handbook, including concerns about both ambiguous Handbook language and suspected violations of the Handbook
 - d. Thoroughly investigate all the reported violations including holding hearings whenever the Committee judges hearings advisable
 - e. Provide a detailed annual report to the Senate in the first Senate meeting of each academic year's Spring semester describing the instances where the committee believes handbook violations have occurred, and when necessary forward recommendations for Handbook change to the University Senate.
- 2. The **Shared Governance Committee** of the **Senate** shall consist of three tenured faculty members. Members shall be nominated and elected by and from the full-time faculty. Members shall be elected for staggered terms of five years. If a vacancy occurs prior to the completion of a term, the Senate EC shall appoint a replacement member to complete that term. The members may not serve on the Tenure, Promotion and Dismissal Committee, the Faculty Grievance Committee or as Faculty Ombuds simultaneously.
- 3. This Committee shall select its own Chairperson and shall establish its internal operating procedures and these procedures shall be made available to all full-time faculty.
